Henry Ford II Interact Club honored for sponsoring life-saving blood drives

The American Red Cross recently honored Henry Ford II High School students and staff for sponsoring the most successful blood donation drives in Southeastern Michigan over the past year.

The drives were organized by students in the Henry Ford II Interact Club and their adviser, math teacher

Matt Trombley. Interact clubs are youth organizations sponsored by Rotary clubs. The Sterling Heights Rotary Club is the Ford II Interact sponsor, and Rotarian Mike Saigh is the liaison between the adult and high school clubs.

"They are students who are very excited about doing community service and they do pull together," Saigh said. "It is life-changing for them when they realize how it feels to be doing something good, accomplishing something for others."

A total of 241 units of blood were donated at the school's fall 2011 and spring 2012 blood drives. They were the most successful school blood drives in Macomb, Oakland, St. Clair, Wayne and Washtenaw counties.

Red Cross regional representative Bridget McCormick presented an award at the school praising the students and donors. There were 167 first-time donors at the drives.

"The students are amazing," McCormick said. "They accounted for 90 percent of the donors." Because a single donor can potentially save three lives, as many as 723 people were aided by their efforts, she said

"The students not only host the most successful Red Cross drives, they do so with precision," Henry Ford II Principal Steve Beyer said. "Mr. Trombley and his students are so well-organized that even with so many people involved there is very little disruption to the school day."

Ford II senior Madison Fullmer, an Interact student leader, said she enjoys helping people in the community but that she has a special reason for working particularly hard on the blood drives. Her late grandfather became seriously ill and required transfusions.

"He was able to live longer and visit us more because of the people who donated," Fullmer said.

Donation drives hosted by businesses, churches and schools are "the life's blood" of more than 40 local hospitals.

The club held another drive this past week, is organizing a UNICEF Halloween collection, a Linus Project blanket drive, and a cupcake sale to benefit cancer research.

"They are pretty elated about receiving the Red Cross recognition," Saigh said. "They are enthusiastic because of the leadership of Mr. Trombley. They like and respect his leadership. He's a humble man and they just follow him very well."

Saigh said Interact students assist his Rotary club at holiday parties for disabled children. The club would like to establish more Interact clubs. Contact Saigh at 586-226-5985.

He is hoping that more teenagers from the area will take advantage of the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, a spring weekend of training and inspiration in Canada, paid for by his club, the next one scheduled for May 11-13, 2013.

"They come back from RYLA totally overwhelmed with a different outlook on life, family, school, community; it's almost like a transformation," Saigh said.

Texan Steve Melton, a major in the U.S. Army Reserve, has been a counselor at RYLA events for about two decades.

"My high school counselor had me fill out an application," Melton said in an interview for The Rotarian magazine. "I was not going to go. I was a football player looking for a scholarship, worried about missing a week of working out. It is one of the top three decisions I have ever made."

He said he learned how to put the right people in the right position in the military and, once, when given a squad of people considered incorrigible, Melton turned them into one of the best squads

his higher-ups had ever seen. RYLA includes ethics and team-building and Melton said many students become team captains and student council presidents after the RYLA experience.
