Meet the Governor Night on June 29, was our kickoff event for 2016-17 and a great example of what can happen when we keep a beginner's mind. This event was handled a bit differently this year:

- The event took place out of district
- We gave it a hip name Meet the Governor Night or MTGN
- The event was hosted by the assistant governors
- Instead of being sponsored by one club, MTGN was sponsored by 19 clubs
- Attendance was 165 people
- Our emcee, Ian Anderson, welcomed all to a "fun party with minimal pretense"
- This was a public event sponsored by Rotary (15 of the attendees are not Rotarians, yet)
- We promoted MTGN using am overlapping messaging (different modalities such as bulk e-mail, Facebook, and AG visits at the same time)
- Best of all, feedback has been FANTASTIC
- Business professionals call these kinds of results "proof of concept."

I'm encouraging the twelve AGs, 52 presidents, and all other Rotarians to communicate using Facebook (for our more social Rotarians), LinkedIn (for our business professionals), Twitter (if you want media attention, e.g., #DetNews), email (for longer, more involved messages).

Of course, I also recommend good old-fashioned phone calls so that people know you're a real person and not just a bulk emailer.

Multiple communication modalities will improve your reach and ultimately, make you an even more successful Rotarian.

The easy way to get your club a Presidential Citation

It's the highest honor a Rotary Club can achieve.

It's not that difficult to get this award, but a surprising number of clubs do not usually make the grade in any given year.

It's called the "Presidential Citation" because it comes from the @John Germ, President of Rotary International for 2016-17. Here are three great tips for having your club receive this important award:

1) Know what the Presidential Citation is.

The citation is really just a checklist for all the things a top-performing club should do during a Rotary year. Check off all the items and your club will earn the Presidential Citation.

2) Use TOMA to keep everyone thinking about this award.

TOMA means "Top of Mind Awareness." Print copies of the Presidential Citation and circulate them to your Rotarians – especially the board of directors.

Update everyone on your club's progress every quarter.

3) Start early.

Some of the items on the checklist will take a while to achieve.

4) Bonus tip: Focus on the hardest task.

One of the items on the President Citation may be extra challenging for your club. If so, don't be shy about giving it some extra attention. You can, for example, form a committee or special task force to make sure that this task receives some extra attention.

District Governor Club Visit Schedule

his year, in keeping with our district theme of "Go Public With Rotary," I'm asking you to make this year's governor visit a public event sponsored by Rotary.

A NEW KIND OF GOVERNOR VISIT

As a professional motivational speaker who never charges Rotary for talks, I've done hundreds of programs like this for Rotary clubs all over North America. Even small clubs have been able to attract 200+ people because of its appeal. Many clubs actually raise money from these events. You can, for example, charge visitors a bit more because you're offering more value and your club keeps the money. Most clubs are able to sign up new members as a direct result of my motivational talk.

Behind the scenes, we call this program "M & Ms" or "Members + Money."

The idea is to at least double your normal your club meeting attendance the day I visit. In fact, I'd like you to plan on having at least 100 people in the room when I come to your club.

Together, we'll promote a fun program with a great title: "How to Engage Anyone in 15 Seconds."

This content is perfect for customer service teams, salespeople, and leaders of all stripes. It's an easy way to lure community leaders to your club meeting on this special day. My talk will still contain Rotary content, but non-Rotarians and Rotarians alike will be very pleased with what they hear, I promise.

THIS IS EASIER THAN YOU THINK

Rotarian René Pothetes, in my office, has provided you a paint-by-numbers guideline for ensuring our success.

- Pre-written emails to send out to your members and friends of Rotary
- A high-resolution photo and sample video so people know what to expect
- A road-tested timeline of what to do when
- Tips for attracting media attention for your club
- Ideas for motivating your club members to get involved with this event
- Marketing tips that you can use for future club events and even at work

I'll be asking a few of our smallest clubs to attend my visit at a neighboring club so that they can benefit from some new energy and a fresh batch of ideas. This type of cross-pollination is happening with governor visits across the country.

Most other Governor visit traditions will remain in place, such as:

- Official salutations and news from the district
- Your assistant governor will attend the event and introduce $\ensuremath{\mathsf{me}}$
- I will meet with you and your club's board of directors in the hour before or after the meal

THIS IS THE BEST TIME TO BE IN ROTARY

I encourage you to "go public with Rotary" throughout the year such as when planning events (your Presidents dinners, new member inductions, picnics, etc.) and when sharing information online.



"United in Liberty" was the theme for this year's Independence Day Parade in downtown Brighton. The Livingston Sunrise Rotary Club pulled off another stellar celebration with thousands participating in the day's festivities. The 10th Annual Hungry Duck Run half marathon and 5K kicked off in the wee hours of the morning, followed by the darling Duckling Dash where children raced their little hearts out in a two-block run for fun and prizes. At 10 a.m. the main event got underway. The parade down Main Street was greeted by, well, more people than we could count.
