Birth of a New Club: McHenry- Sunrise

n the Fall of 2009, the Rotary Club of McHenry opened up discussion about sponsoring a morning Rotary Club. The club felt that giving potential Rotarians an

On December 17, 2009 the Rotary Club of McHenry voted to sponsor a new morning Rotary club in McHenry. On Wednesday January 13, 2010 The Rotary Club of McHenry – Sunrise began their initial organizational meetings at the MCC/Shah Center in McHenry. The new morning club, with an advisory team of seven Rotarians, laid out some ambitious goals.

The Sunrise Club's three month goals, by the end of April 2010, were to:

• Have 20 Active Members • Adopt Bylaws and Constitution

• Elect Officers • Receive their official charter from Rotary International

In the first three months the Provisional Rotary Club or McHenry – Sunrise was able to accomplish their three month goals and was awarded their club charter from Rotary International on April 28, 2010. The enthusiasm shown by all the members of the new Sunrise club, support from District Governor Bill Ferreira, assistance from our special representative Sue Dobbe, and encouragement from the Rotary Club of McHenry, made this a true team effort. The Sunrise Club is having a **Charter Night** Celebration on June 2, 2010 at the McHenry Club in McHenry IL.

Getting the Rotary International Charter was only the first step in a long journey for the McHenry – Sunrise Club. The Sunrise Club has set 5 year goals to:

- Have 50 Active Members Do 12 Community Service Projects per year
- Have \$100,000 in fund raising per year

Because of the energy, vision and dedication the new members have shown so far, the future for the Rotary Club of McHenry – Sunrise is bright.

Membership Growth - It's All Our Responsibility

Based on an article written by Past Rotary International Director William B. P. Cadwallader, summarized by DGN Carlos Frum, District Membership Chair.

We should emphasize the positive results of membership growth in many areas of the world as examples of what can be done.

Most often the cause of declining membership is that Rotarians do not invite young people to become active part of Rotary. This must change.

Rotarians, as leaders in their communities and well-connected, should invite other business and professional leaders, young and old. Rotary clubs must provide constant, weekly Rotary information to their members to allow their membership to have confidence and pride in the reasons they choose to be Rotarians. Rotary clubs should have a club information committee and a mentor program for new members and to help sponsors. New members should be adequately educated about Rotary so they can explain Rotary to other prospective new members. Club membership chairs should have a checkoff list that indicates that each club member has invited someone to join their club; someone preferably less than 50 years of age. All Rotarians must be involved in inviting young people to become Rotarians. Club presidents should have a club Rotary information chair to give a "Rotary Moment" each week for Rotary Education. Members should tell why they remain active in Rotary and what they have done in Rotary.

New members also have a responsibility for membership. Each new member must be expected to invite someone to join the club during the first year. New members are enthusiastic and that enthusiasm could be contagious. New members should have a strong influence on the future direction of club activities. Every club meeting should be fun and a desirable place to visit weekly.

More Than 200 District 6440 Rotarians Greet RI President John Kenny

More than 200 District 6440 Rotarians greeted Rotary International President John Kenny at an April 9 dinner in Palatine, hosted by District Governor Bill Ferreira and the Schaumburg/Hoffman Estates club.

President Kenny was fresh from a tour of Eastern Europe, where he became the first RI President to visit Latvia since Paul Harris. His busy year has included a February visit to Haiti to demonstrate support for local Haitian Rotarians.

In his remarks, President Kenny underlined the theme he chose for his

Rotary year: "The Future of Rotary is in Your Hands." People will want to be part of Rotary if they see Rotary doing good things in the community.

"The club is where Rotary happens. In the club, friendships are forged. When every member looks forward to the next meeting, that's when a club grows and prospers," Kenny said.

"The very best Rotary projects—the truly life-changing ones—can only happen in a strong club. Rotarians who enjoy being Rotarians will attract recognition for their good works," he said.

"What happens in weekly meetings is most important, and it is up to each one of us to make the clubs better. The future of Rotary will be decided by each one of us. It will be decided by every man and woman who has chosen to make Rotary a way of life," he told District 6440 Rotarians.

"Many hands make light work. None of us alone can make a great contribution to the health and welfare of the world. But each club, working through its District, all

through the 200 countries where we have Rotary clubs, can achieve great glories," he said.

Governor Bill presented a check for \$142,300.00, representing the District's pledge to polio this year, prompting Kerry to say, "You can't build a reputation on what you're going to do. Success of District 6440 is just one more indication of Rotary's determination to eradicate polio."

John Kenny, a graduate of Glasgow University, is a past dean of his law school faculty, a judge, and a notary. Queen Elizabeth II appointed him the deputy lieutenant in his district.

Why Am I a Rotarian?

I know I'm not the only one...*don't <u>you</u> love to help others?* The feeling you get when you are a part of a team that plants a tree, or cleans up a park...isn't it gratifying?

When someone has an obstacle and it is within your power to take down that obstacle, easily...*doesn't it make you feel good?*

Nine years ago, someone reached out to me, inviting me to visit Rotary. I did not know much about the organization. I had heard of the local club's activities, reading about projects in the local paper. The couple who invited me knew me and knew how I attacked projects, volunteered in the community and appreciated fellowship, so they invited me and I visited.

In the past nine years of my membership in the Carol Stream Rotary club, I have thoroughly embraced and enjoyed the local, regional and international reach of this fine organization. Welcoming a new youth exchange student each year is filled with excitement, as is witnessed in the smiles on our club members' faces when they listen to weekly updates from him. Getting to know other local clubs and hearing about their projects helps me learn what we have in common, and what potential assistance we can give to others.

Several memorable moments for me have involved Rotary. One was international, and one very local.

In 2005, as the Rotary International Convention came to Chicago, the 'home' of Rotary, for the 100th anniversary celebration, I signed up to help. There were many slots to choose from, both in preparation and at the event itself. My love of language and international flavor led me to sign up as greeter to those who were arriving for the convention. I chose to be situated at O'Hare Airport in the International Terminal. I held high the sign that beamed out the Rotary logo, for any arrivals from clubs abroad. As I watched faces, I saw their eyes move up to the sign, and smiles wash over their faces. While I couldn't speak some of the languages of the Rotarians – some in the most impressive native garb – smiles and gestures usually helped to make their 'landing' in our country a bit smoother. I had signed up to help with a Rotary event and I was happy to help. I was in the perfect place for me --I loved that job! And there were many moving moments that day, seeing people from all corners of the world arriving in Chicago.

The other most memorable moment was last October. Our club was in the middle of a community-wide food drive, modeled after a drive I had done in my neighborhood for 11 years. It was a leap of faith to see if it translated to this larger scale. Twenty 'neighborhood partners' - like pinwheels all spinning at the same time - raced around their subdivisions, as I had done, collecting bags filled with food items, bags they had delivered empty just days before. Now, these partners were delivering the success of their individual drives, converging upon the drop-off location. At the same time, residents who saw the huge electronic sign were also pulling up and unloading cases of paper goods, boxes of canned goods. Local businesses and restaurants stopped and dropped off collected items from incentive-driven collections done earlier in the week. It was at that moment, surrounded by Interact club students, Rotarians, their families and volunteers that the scope of success hit me. Our efforts were multiplied and the magnitude of positive results was overwhelming. Individuals pulled together and because of that cooperation, the end result was great!

Rotary is an organization in which we can help others, but it is the Rotarian himself or herself who benefits from the learning and growing experiences.
