# <u>Literacy Recognition Awards – 2010</u>

The District Literacy Committee's mission is to support District Club literacy efforts and to inspire clubs to be more involved in effective literacy projects.

Illiteracy is an international scourge of the first magnitude. The ABCs of Rotary reminds us of the scope of this challenge: "An estimated one billion people – one-fourth of the world's adult population – are unable to read." Moreover, according to a long-awaited national research study, 1 out of 7 adults living in the United States is unable to read this story.

The District 6440 Literacy Committee celebrates District Club efforts in literacy by giving Excellence in Literacy Awards and Literacy Certificates of Appreciation to clubs in the district that demonstrate an involvement in literacy activities. Awards and certificates will be presented at the District Conference.

Nurturing Literacy in Our Own Backyard — Sixteen volunteers supported literacy programs with their time, devoting a record number of hours – averaging 70 hours per week -- throughout the year. In addition, the Club continued its "adoption" of the library and media center at Olive-Mary Stitt Elementary School, including listening to students read each Wednesday morning. Moreover, 44 adult ESL (English as a Second Language) students are receiving Club tutorial assistance at the Arlington Heights Memorial Library and the Forest View Educational Center. The Club also raised funds for the Read to Learn Adult Literacy/Volunteer Program and donated 482 books to the Women's and Children Center.

The Gift of Reading — This program is designed and implemented by Waukegan Rotarians to provide books as gifts to all pediatric patients from birth to 18 having scheduled procedures at Vista Health Systems East and West in Waukegan. Many of the books are bi-lingual, and all come with a bookmark and letter encouraging the child/family to visit the library. Bookcases are stocked in the consultation room and the main waiting area. Signs encourage guests to select a book for reading pleasure and let them know they can take books home if they like, compliments of the Rotary of Waukegan. Twenty-five Club members have been involved in the project. The Club received a District 6440 grant of \$1,000 for this program and plus added Club funds. The program reaches 1,025 pediatric patient families and thousands of friends.

**Annual Book Drive** — Eight members of the Wilmette Noon Club collected 17,000 gently used children's books from Wilmette K – 8 public and parochial school families and school libraries. The Wilmette Public Library and the Lake Bluff Public Library contributed general interest books geared to high school students. Volunteers sorted the 17,000 books by grades and boxed them for distribution to eight charter and parochial inner-city Chicago schools.

Reach Out and Read (Reachoutandread.org) — In fall of 2009 the District 6440 Literacy Committee voted to adopt Reach Out and Read by providing information and presentations to Clubs who wanted to know more. Reach Out and Read, a project of the American Academy of Pediatrics Illinois Chapter, trains doctors and nurses to talk to parents about the importance of reading aloud to children from six months to five years of age. The children receive a new book to take home at each of their annual check-ups, and clinic waiting rooms are transformed into literacy-rich areas with volunteer readers modeling techniques of reading aloud. One-third of eligible at-risk Illinois families receive Reach Out and Read's services.
