





I am very thankful for all of the news articles from District Committee Chairs and very impressed with clubs that create a newsletter every week!



One of my goals this year is to celebrate clubs! Here goes, let's celebrate!!

- Per capita giving. In third place is the Elkhart Morning club with \$411 per member, the Kentland Rotary Club was in second place with \$435 per member, and the Granger Sunrise was 1st with \$520 per member.
- ➤ Total giving per club annual fund Number 3 was Kendallville with \$16,200, in 2nd place was Fort Wayne at \$21,330 and ranking first was the Elkhart Club with \$26,327 in annual fund giving.

- Total giving to all foundation Accounts have some amazing numbers. Number three club was Elkhart with \$28,377, second place was Anthony Wayne with \$31,222 and Fort Wayne with an amazing number of \$404,667.
- Total Giving for the District to all programs including polio was \$\$735,692, that's almost three quarters of a Million dollars.

Foundation Gala

Thanks to all who joined us for the Foundation Gala. There was over \$12,500 in online donations that evening. Our goal for total giving this year is \$800,000.00! You support is requested and will be needed.

This goal can be reached by each member giving \$1.00 per day, every day, all year.

ON TO MORE OPPORTUNITIES

December's Rotary theme is Disease Prevention and Treatment

Yes, go ahead and use this as a Sargent's question! This past month Rotary has given me the opportunity to consider the funding of Global Grants with the funds that Rotary Foundation returned to us from your donations to the annual fund three years ago. I had to make choices regarding a maternity ambulance in Uganda, a dialysis lab in India and an autism program for children in Mexico. There are also requests for support of a Mother's Milk Bank in India and an operating lab in Sringeri.

All of these requests focus on Disease Prevention and Treatment. It is time to begin planning <u>YOUR</u> District Grant Application.

Each year clubs apply for District Grants and do amazing projects in their communities and around the world. Grant Applications will be available on District <u>website</u> January 1, 2021.

Examples include:

Water Supply Village in Ecuador, Home Roof Repair thru local non-profit, Repairs to Sunny Meadows Home, Environmental Education Book for Elementary Kids, Educational Software for Elementary Kids, Pocket Constitution for 5th Graders, Shoes for Kids, Phase 2 Duffle Bags for Kids, PPE for Mathew 25 Clinic, Equipment for Disability Network, Park Benches at Splashpad, Cultivate Real Services at St. Margaret's House, Picnic Tables for Parks, Cargo Trailer for Volunteer Fire Dept., Preschool Classroom Equipment, Baby Box for Fire Dept. Kohl's Vouchers for Clothe Our Children, Memorial Bench at Hospital, Food Backpacks, Seating Wall at Local Park, Classroom Equipment for Entrepreneur Program, Equipment for Elementary STEM Program, 4 Community Projects, Equipment for Mobile Library, Rotary Reading Corner at Library Plaza.

During the month of December, each club should be electing their President for the 2022-2023 year. Here is the resolution from the 2019 Rotary International Council on Legislation.

Term of President. The president shall be elected as provided in the bylaws, not more than two (2) years but not less than eighteen (18) months prior to the day of taking office and shall serve as president-nominee

upon election. The nominee shall take the title of president-elect on 1 July in the year prior to taking office as president. The president shall take office on 1 July and shall serve a period of one (1) year. In cases where a successor has not been duly elected, the term of the current president shall be extended for one year only.

Why is this important?

We are currently preparing our training for the Presidents in 2021-2022. I will be sending a letter mid-December with all the dates for PETS, PrePETs and Leadership Training so I need to have names and contact information readily available in Club Runner. GLRPETS is virtual this year as MEGA PETS with Midwest PETS from Illinois from March 11-13. I am hoping we can still meet in person as a group with our District PEs later in the Spring. I really want to have our interaction and opportunities to meet District Presidents in person.

What a fun, fast moving evening was this year's virtual fundraising gala on Thursday, November 12th! A very special thank you to all who attended and to our district leadership who made it all happen.

Continue the giving through December and not only get a tax deduction but matching points! The instructions and online fillable form are on our website: www.rotary6540.org. On the home page, click on Matching Points 2020 for the instructions. To the left of that page a menu (Points Page) will appear which will include the following downloads: Understanding Foundation Points, IRA Rollover Form, 2020 fillable Points Form, and the Promo (campaign details). We have 90,000.00 points available, so let's use them all!



Even though vaccines soon will be available for COVID-19, the effects of this pandemic will linger well into 2021, There still will be basic needs to be met for many—food, household items, clothing, school supplies, etc. A **District Grant** would be one of the ways your club could help. Up to \$3,000.00 may be awarded for a grant.

Clubs will need to contribute a minimum of 25% to the project and will be reimbursed for the project when it is completed. *The project for which you apply may not be started until July 1, 2021.*

The **deadline to submit** a District Grant application *for the Rotary year 2021-2022* is **March 31, 2021**. The downloadable grant application will be available on the district website January 1, 2021.

In January, 2021 there will be a District Grant Webinar to explain the process. It will be given on two different dates and times: Tuesday, January 12 at 7:00 p.m. EST, and Wednesday, January 13 at 10:00 a.m. EST. District Grant Chair, PDG Mike Crabill, will present the half hour webinar, you will need to register on our district website.

Global Grants

We often take for granted that if we dial 9-1-1 for an ambulance, an ambulance will actually show up at our house. And, it won't just show up, but that well-equipped ambulance will deliver us to a hospital staffed with experts and equipment and resources to solve our medical needs.

But the reality is that this experience is not true for much of the world.

At the first Rotary Convention in 1910, Rotarian Arthur Fredrick Sheldon delivered a speech to those gathered in Chicago and said that "only the science of right conduct toward others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."

And since that speech in the early days of our organization, this has been the Rotarian's creed. Everything we do in our local clubs is designed around the belief in *service above self*. So we invest in our local communities; we invest in our neighborhood schools; we invest in the youth down the street.

As a global organization, we work with Rotary International to tackle global issues collectively. We fight poverty. We find vaccines. We dig for clean water. We invest in people.

Whether we use our passport to cross international borders, or not, it's important to remember that we are a part of a global community and we must work as a local club to contribute our skills, expertise and financial support to the needs of our neighbors worldwide.

Global Grant Projects are opportunities for your local club to partner with an international club in supporting a community project somewhere around the globe. One club in our district has been working with a hospital in India to meet the medical needs of that community. This local club believes in the lasting impact that quality healthcare can have on a community and decided to tackle this project.

Another club in our district has discovered the need for an ambulance in a community in Uganda. But the size was too big for their club, so they partnered with another Rotary club in a neighboring district. Together they are working to supply a safe, well-equipped medical transportation for the people of that region of Uganda.

Sometimes when we hear of stories like these, it's easy to think, "Those must be big clubs to be able to afford funding a hospital or an ambulance." When the reality is - that is not always the case.

But through the combined efforts of the Global Grant Projects, local clubs are able to receive matching grants through the World Fund, Foundation Grants and Global Grants. There are, of course, requirements for each of these.

But it starts with a need.

It starts with a vision to fill that need.

It starts with asking a question.

It starts with one person caring about another person who happens to live on the other side of the world.

Perhaps it's time your local club decides to step up and tackle that need you've been talking about.

Maybe it will be a hospital, or an ambulance. Or just maybe there is a need out there that we don't even know about yet. Your club could be *just the club* to find out.


Don't let the size or the cost of the project; the paperwork or even the application process become a barrier for you.

I recently found some newspaper articles from the 2005 Pittsburgh Post Gazette that celebrated the 50th anniversary of the successful polio vaccine. You see, Dr. Jonas Salk and his team, working at the University of Pittsburgh, developed the vaccine that helped millions of children live normal lives. Franklin Roosevelt, our 32nd President, contracted the virus at the age of 39 and founded the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and soon the March of Dimes was generating millions of dollars to fight the disease.

Today, thanks to the work of Rotary and thousands of world-wide volunteers, we are getting ever closer to eradicating the disease. Fourteen years ago this week, I traveled to Niger in Africa to administer vaccine drops to children. It was a life-changing experience and I still think about the Interact students who helped me to translate French and maneuver the streets of Niamey. We need to continue to donate to the polio plus campaign and hopefully eliminate the virus from Afghanistan and Pakistan. Your dollars will go a long way towards achieving that goal.





CLUB NEWS

LOGANSPORT & KOKOMO-EARLY RISERS

The Logansport Rotary Club partnered with the Kokomo-Early Risers to submit an International grant with the host Rotary Club of Kabarole in Uganda. The project will provide a fully equipped ambulance for a rural district in Uganda. The ambulance will be used to provide care and transport for pregnant mothers and children from rural areas to Midas touch Hospital. It will also provide needed transport to and from peripheral health facilities for comprehensive maternal and neonatal care within Uganda. We have also raised enough funds to hold 10 health clinics.

The project is fully funded and it would not have been possible without the support of our District Governor John Frischie. District 6540 provided \$20,000 in funding. He also helped us partner with Jo Ann Heppermann, a District Governor in Western Kentucky, and Jessika Hane, a District Governor in Southern Indiana, who also have come on board to support this grant. The Laporte club donated \$500. They did not have it in their budget but they worked to reallocate funds so they could take part in the life saving global grant.

The Logansport Rotary Club held a drive through Pork Chop dinner to raise funds for the grant. This is the first time we have been a part of an International grant in a long time. We look forward to possibly partnering with Jo Ann and Jessika in the future.
