Zone Summit





Very, very few of us will have the opportunity to save a life from a burning building, Rotarians saves lives every day in so many ways, the standout being polio eradication.


The "why" we all share in our Rotary DNA, is alive, proactive and highly visible across the myriad programs and projects we conceive, develop and execute each and every day.

Youth Services

Every year brings new responsibility as we welcome a new group of young people into our Rotary Club programs. Per the District Youth Protection Policy, passed in 2016, your Rotary Club has a responsibility to perform a background check on ANY ROTARY member who regularly works with or transports youth to and from events.

If something happens to a youth while involved in a Rotary program through your Club, what will your Club's defense be? The best possible defense is that a routine background check is performed, at least bi-annually, on any Rotary member involved with our youth and that you have taken appropriate measures to assure youth safety. Period. Recognize that while all Indiana school Corporations do their own background checks, your Club is responsible for performing background checks on other involved Rotarians to ensure EVERY YOUTH is protected.

Contact your district committee chair for your program or PDG Lisa Waterman (<u>lisarotarybiz@live.com</u>) for information on how to initiate a background check program. Be advised that Rotary D6540 has a predetermined arrangement with InCheck to perform the background checks at a reasonable fee.

Please read the Youth Protection Policy to make sure you are doing everything possible to protect our Youth. You can find the Youth Protection Policy in the D6540 by-laws it's at the homes-superscripts. Volume 1 Policy in the D6540 by-laws it's at the homes-superscripts. Under "District Links" "District 6540 Bylaws Current" and it will prompt you to login before opening.
