
We believe that positive peace embodies the attitudes, structures and institutes that support and sustain a peaceful society.

. 1914 Houston RI Convention

Delegates at the 5th RI Convention resolved that Rotary should "lend its influence to the maintenance of peace among the nations of the world" 1921 Edinburgh

"To aid in the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional men united in the ideal of service". – Fourth Object of Rotary 1940 Havana

Resolution calling for "freedom, justice, truth, sanctity of the pledged word and respect for human rights". Led to United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights How to promote cross-cultural understanding to avoid future conflicts?

1942

London

Led to formation of **UNESCO** – United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization. I 1945 San Francisco United Nations

49 Delegates at the charter signing were Rotarians! Some of original SG were Rotarians. Rotary was one of only two NGOs initially accredited to the UN Economic and Social Committee RI/UN Ambassadors Rotary Day at the UN

Humanity is nearing a tipping point and facing challenges unparalleled in its short history.


Global in nature, such as climate change, ever decreasing biodiversity, depletion of the earth's freshwater, and overpopulation.

How to Become A Peacebuilder Club

Choosing the designation of "Peacebuilder Club" begins with a declaration of commitment to promoting Rotary's focus on Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution.

Peace Builder Clubs' Commitments

-Designate at least two members (one to serve as Chair) who will coordinate the club's peace-related activities and programs.

- This person will serve as club's contact person for Peace related communications

- -Ensure that at least one Club program/education is Peace-focused
- -Involve Youth in Peace-focused activities
- -Promote Rotary Peace Centre and Scholarships

We just need the direction to make it happen. B.S.




