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On August 18<sup>th</sup>, 2017 the Rotary Service and Engagement Staff at Rotary International shared the following few paragraphs: "Rotary is founded on the ideal *Service Above Self*. It is rooted within our guiding principles and at the core of club activity. Every day, you take on service projects and initiatives to address community needs. Although members come from diverse backgrounds representing a cross-section of professionals and business leaders, Rotarians work together to advance international understanding, goodwill, and peace through **service**.

To plan effective projects, it's important to understand community needs and leverage project resources. Take advantage of the Rotary assets below to help strengthen your initiatives:

• Collaborate with subject matter experts from a **Rotarian Action Group (RAG)** or lend expertise to empower Rotary members to make their service projects more impactful. RAG members help clubs and districts plan and implement high-impact projects within their respective area of expertise. To get involved, check the group directory or view a list of action groups and contact the one you're interested in. Read about their inspiring service in the <u>Rotarian Action Groups annual report</u>.

• A Rotary Community Corps (RCC) can enhance community engagement and ensure project sustainability by empowering local leaders to pioneer change. RCCs are teams of non-Rotarian community members – men and women who may be farmers, teachers, shop owners, or even retirees – who work in partnership with Rotary clubs to improve their communities. They are committed to their communities' long-term development, and bring enthusiasm, creativity, and sustainability to the projects they design and carry out. By organizing an RCC, you can make a tremendous, long-term impact in a community.

• The **Avenues of Service** are part of Rotary's guiding principles and are the foundation of club activity. District committees for **community, international**, and **vocational** service are great resources to help you plan successful humanitarian activities and implement projects. District committee chairs are well-positioned to help fellow Rotarians by suggesting innovative approaches to address community needs, identifying service-related resources, linking clubs to mentors or subject matter experts, and publicizing initiatives undertaken by clubs.

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#### An Interesting Service Opportunity in Honduras

The **Rotary Club of Peterborough's** World Community Service committee is seeking District members to join a team of 16 to 18 Rotarians and/or friends of Rotary on a Rotary project in Honduras. We have eight committed people already. Rotarians from our club and district have travelled to Honduras many times without any issues related to personal safety. We are considering travelling from approximately Feb. 10 to Feb. 23, 2018. The plan is to work on Rotary projects for 8-9 days followed by 3 days of fun in Roatan.

We plan on building community gardens in two villages utilizing sustainable agricultural practices. The gardens will serve as a training centre for the municipalities. We would work with a local expert for general agricultural training. We plan to facilitate training sessions on burn prevention for adults and children, oral health, first aid and more!

#### Haitian Humanitarian Assistance and Relief Team (HHART)

HHART has exciting news for all Rotarians interested in a WCS project! HHART missions are supported, organized and led by Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Wasaga Beach, Rotary District 7010 (central Ontario). The Team's mission is to improve the lives of poor and disadvantaged people (primarily of Haitian heritage) living near Puerto Plata, Dominican Republic by providing much needed medical, dental and other forms of humanitarian assistance.

The dates and cost for *HHART* missions #10 and #11 have been set. HHART 10 departs Toronto on Sunday 28 January, 2018 and returns on Sunday February 4. HHART 11 departs Toronto on Sunday 4 February 2018 and returns on Sunday February 11. For a limited time, the cost to participate in one of these meaningful overseas humanitarian service missions is set at just \$1,600. This fee provides for an 8-day, 7-night excursion that includes return airfare from Toronto, all ground transportation in the Dominican Republic and accommodation (double occupancy), meals, taxes and gratuities at the all-inclusive Sosua-by-the Sea Resort.

Only 25 spots are available on each mission, each of which will be reserved on a first-come, first-served basis. A \$100 deposit submitted before 31 September 2017 will reserve your place on the team. Following the deposit, three equal payments of \$500 (due 1 Oct, 1 Dec and 1 Jan) are required.

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#### Rotary Wheels for Learning (RWFL) Bicycle Distribution Program in Cambodia

The Rotary Club of Gravenhurst has once again committed to supporting this international humanitarian project from January 26<sup>th</sup> to February 18<sup>th</sup> 2018. The RWFL is in its seventh year; its aim is to provide bicycles to disadvantaged rural children in Cambodia so they may have the opportunity to attend school. To date, this worthy project has built and distributed more than 5500 bicycles. This year's goal is set at 800 bicycles!

The "RWFL Team Cambodia 2018" will be led by MaryAnne Marshall, Lee Johnson and Mike Cole: this will be their fourth trip to Cambodia and the third as team leaders. This year's trip will see us complete eight bicycle distributions in six provinces of Cambodia; Takéo, Kampong Cham, Siem Reap, Battambang, Kampong Speu, and Kampot. At this point, the leaders are actively looking for team members (both Rotarians and friends) with a strong sense of humour, ability to "go with the flow" and the willingness to immerse themselves into the local customs and culture. While the main focus of the program is bicycle distribution, the members will have plenty of opportunity to experience the cultural wonders of Cambodia. We will be visiting the temples in Angkor Wat, visiting a floating village on the Tonlé Sap Lake, paying our respects at one of the killing fields (Choeunk Ek), taking a cooking class, and enjoying the sandy beaches of Kep to name just a few.

#### RWFL Team 2018 Overview:

Location: Cambodia, SW Asia from January 26<sup>th</sup> to February 18<sup>th</sup>, 2018 (some flexibility in dates is possible). Approximate Costs: \$3300.00 Canadian (includes airfare, lodgings, meals, in country transport, spending). Team size: 18-20 members (Rotarians and Friends).

### Adventure in Understanding (A project of the Rotary Club of Peterborough Kawartha)

What do you get when you put 20 youth, aged 16 to 18 in three canoes with 5 leaders and supplies to last a week in the Kawarthas? ... COMMUNITY!

It all began with a "community cup". The group deemed it wasteful to each have their own cup and decided to drink from ONE cup. Now that they are all headed back to their homes from Yarmouth (NS) to Pelican Narrows (Sask) they will be sharing their adventures using the hashtag #communitysquadgoals .

Their final day – Friday, August 31<sup>st</sup> – landed them in Curve Lake, where they... celebrated a successful trip at a feast hosted by Chief Phyllis Williams, and planted a ceremonial Silver Maple tree they had brought with them from Peterborough's Ecology Park.

The group boarded a bus from Curve Lake to the Canadian Canoe Museum in Peterborough, (General Manager, Carolyn Hyslop) toured some of the paddlers through the museum collections and storage facilities. Here, they had an opportunity to learn about the rich history of the canoe, the kayak and other ancient water vessels. After a week on the water, the group expressed a much deeper respect for our early ancestors whose only means of transportation, hunting, fishing and gathering was a canoe. They also developed newfound respect for one another's cultural differences and unique personalities. Finally, they agreed, an enriched respect for the land and the environment is something that will stick with them always.

"This trip would not have happened without Rotary and Don Canoe", said Mai lee from Mississauga. "Even though Don wasn't on the trip with us, we could feel his presence behind the scenes, pulling strings." She was referring, of course, to Don Watkins, initiator and Chair of the Adventure in Understanding program through the Rotary Club of Peterborough Kawartha.

This is the fourth year the Club, in co-operation with the Canadian Canoe Museum, Camp Kawartha, and Curve Lake First Nation, has offered the experience to local, national, and international students.

When asked if this adventure has changed them, their unified response was "DEFINITELY!" Libardo, a 19 year old International Student from Colombia, South America currently studying at Fleming College had this to say; "These people opened my heart!"

Once the paddlers have had an opportunity to return home, bathe, sleep in their own bed and prepare to return to school, the organizers will be conducting an in-depth questionnaire, designed to get feedback for continuous improvement. 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#### **Update about District 7010 District Grants**

Kim Giffen, Chair of District Grants, has prepared a brief summary about this year's District Grants:

During this 2017-18 Rotary year the District Grants Committee has seen all and reviewed a number of the completed 36 grant applications and I am hopeful that we will be able to approve them all. Two of the applications were projects that were not completed last Rotary year which is one of the requirements of a District Grant. This would be an increase of approximately 25 percent over last year's number of grants. We also saw an increase in the number of clubs and individual Rotarians that became certified and eligible to apply. Offering the grants webinar was helpful to many. Eight clubs applied for 2 grants: this is on par with last year. We also saw an increase in clubs applying for grants who have not applied before. Next year the deadline for grant application will be earlier than this year. Please ensure you watch for notices about criteria and deadlines related to next year's grants, especially when information is circulated about the April 20-22 Rotary weekend.
