Nutrition, Mental Health and Hygiene: for Mothers and Children



On July 9, the Rotary Club of Léogâne and the Maternal and Child Health Centre (CMI) joined forces for a special day dedicated to the health of mothers and their children. More than 60 mothers attended.



Dr. Bazelais, Director of the CMI, opened the event by praising the longstanding partnership between the center and the service club, which have worked together on several occasions to address the community's healthcare needs.



Two topics shaped the morning's discussions. The first was nutrition. Darline Armand, a nurse with the family planning department, explained the food pyramid and reminded mothers why proper nutrition is essential for both children's growth and maternal health.



The second focused on a subject rarely discussed in Haiti: the mental health of pregnant women and new mothers. Horidine F. Réjouis, Chair of the activity, highlighted an often-overlooked issue—

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the mother's psychological well-being and how it directly influences her child's development. Her presentation left a lasting impression.

Rotary Club of St. Martin Sunrise Highlights Maternal & Child Health with Inspiring Community Information Session

As part of Rotary's Maternal and Child Health Month, the Rotary Club of St. Martin Sunrise proudly hosted a community information session featuring Mr. Gesner-Orlando Simon, an experienced midwife and passionate

advocate for family-centered healthcare. His presentation, "Every Family Needs a Midwife: More Than Delivering Babies – Building Healthier Families & Stronger Communities," offered attendees a fresh and inspiring perspective on the

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invaluable role midwives play in our communities.

Many people traditionally associate midwives with childbirth alone. However, Mr. Simon challenged this perception by highlighting that midwives provide comprehensive care that extends far beyond the delivery room. They are trusted healthcare professionals who support pregnant women, newborns, fathers, and families throughout pregnancy, childbirth, the postnatal period, and beyond. Their work includes health education, emotional support, breastfeeding guidance, family planning, early detection of complications, and promoting healthy lifestyles for both mother and child.

Throughout the evening, attendees gained a deeper understanding of how midwives contribute to healthier families by empowering parents with knowledge, encouraging preventive healthcare, and advocating for safe and respectful maternity care. Mr. Simon emphasized that investing in maternal and child health is an investment in stronger families and healthier communities, aligning perfectly with Rotary's commitment to improving lives through service.

The session also highlighted the importance of collaboration between healthcare professionals, community organizations, and service clubs to ensure that every mother and child has access to quality care and support. Participants

A Summer of Hope: Transforming Young Lives in Lalue



For many children in Haiti, summer is not a season of camps, games, or discovery—it is simply another chapter of daily hardship. In Lalue, however, nearly 200 children experienced something different this year: a place where they felt safe, valued, and full of hope.



For the second consecutive year, the Rotary Club of Pétiön-Ville partnered with the Sisters of Saint Rose of Lima to organize a summer camp for children from some of the country's most vulnerable communities. Together, they created an environment where children could learn, play, build friendships, and simply enjoy being children.



The camp was made possible through the generosity of Rotarians, local businesses, and community partners who answered the call to serve. Donations of food, financial support, and logistical assistance ensured that every child received nutritious meals and participated in educational, cultural, recreational, and sports activities throughout the program.



The project demonstrates the power of collaboration. Rotary members worked side by side with the Sisters of Saint Rose of Lima, while corporate partners—including Karyna S.A., Caribbean



Supermarket, Épi d'Or, Plasteck, and JBS Lab—provided invaluable support. Their collective commitment transformed an idea into a meaningful experience that will leave a lasting impression on every child who attended.

Yet the Rotary Club of Pétiön-Ville views the camp not as the end of its service, but as the beginning of a longer journey. During the coming year, the club has committed to providing medical follow-up for approximately twenty children and will

The evening was filled with fellowship and service as members sorted, packed, and organized the essential items. On July 30, in partnership with Nassau Agencies Limited (NAL), RCOF donated the care packages to the NICCU. The

The presentation brought together RCSEN leadership — including President Candice Smith, Esk., Immediate Past President Kent Forbes, Past President Dr. Bridgette Rolle, J.P., Past President Montgomery Penn, Secretary Dr. Davone Rolles-Smith, and Youth and Literacy Director Pam Culmer — alongside senior administration and medical staff from Sandilands Rehabilitation Centre.

ROTARY CLUB OF ST. ANDREW NORTH COMES TO THE RESCUE OF SCORES OF CHILDREN IN CENTRAL AND WESTERN JAMAICA

The Rotary Club of St. Andrew North, in partnership with several stakeholders, has invested \$510 million to repair schools and replace equipment damaged by Hurricane Melissa, bringing relief to hundreds of students across central and western Jamaica.

Partners included Korey Rowe, principal of KR Method (USA); Apex Foundation (USA); and United Way of Jamaica.

On Saturday, June 21, club members travelled from Kingston to inspect restoration work completed at three early childhood institutions: Morgan's Pass Basic School in Clrendon, which serves 26 students; Sanquinetti Early Childhood Institute in Trelawny, with 64 students; and Middle Quarters Early Childhood Centre in St. Elizabeth, with 50 students

Morgan's Pass Principal Stacey McCall said the school had been on the verge of closure following the hurricane. "This assistance saved the school and preserved an important institution for our community," she said. The club has also committed to securing replacement furniture.

At Middle Quarters, Principal Pauvine Barrett explained that classes had been limited to 9:00 a.m. to noon because tarpaulins offered little protection from the heat and afternoon rain. Project oversight was provided by Father David "Tony" Reid, an Angloan priest in the area, who described the intervention as timely and invaluable.

Sanquinetti Principal Diane Douse-Benjamin presented the club with a Plaque of Appreciation, noting that students had frequently been sent home

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because of rain. "When no one else showed up, the Rotary Club of St. Andrew North did," she said.

Past President Nakia Rowe introduced KR Method, headed by his brother Korey Rowe, to the relief project. The partnership was formed to help rural communities recover, particularly in St. Elizabeth, where both brothers have roots.

"The visits reinforced the power of partnership and Rotary's commitment to 'Service Above Self,'" Wilson said.

The club and its partners also donated neonatal equipment valued at approximately US\$20,000 to Black River Hospital; \$1.5 million to Munro College; printers to Petersfield Primary and Friendship Primary schools; and funded the re-roofing of a family home in St. Elizabeth.

ROTARY CLUBS OF KINGSTON & ST. ANDREW SCORE BIG FOR COMMUNITY THROUGH SUCCESSFUL CHARITY PICKLEBALL TOURNAMENT

The Rotary Club of Kingston and the Rotary Club of St. Andrew have hailed their inaugural Rotary Charity Pickleball Tournament as a resounding success after more than 80 players and supporters came together for an exciting day of competition, fellowship and community service at Pickle & Chill on Saturday, July 18, 2026.



The tournament brought together Rotarians, corporate partners, seasoned athletes, first-time players and recreational pickleball enthusiasts, all united by a common goal—to make a meaningful difference in the lives of others. From the opening serve to the final serve, participants embraced the spirit of friendly competition while supporting causes that will have a lasting impact on communities across Jamaica.

The event raised an impressive \$740,000, with the proceeds being shared equally between the Rotary Club of Kingston and the Rotary Club of St. Andrew to fund two impactful community initiatives.

The Rotary Club of St. Andrew will use its share of the funds to support the installation of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED), helping to strengthen emergency response capabilities and improve access to life-saving equipment.

Meanwhile, the Rotary Club of Kingston will direct its proceeds towards the Home for the Homeless Initiative, implemented in partnership with Food For The Poor, providing support for underserved children and families by helping to create safer and more dignified living conditions.



The tournament was conceived as a collaborative service project that would harness the growing popularity of pickleball while encouraging healthy lifestyles, fostering fellowship and creating opportunities for corporate Jamaica and the wider community to support meaningful charitable initiatives.

The success of the event was made possible through the invaluable support of an outstanding group of sponsors whose commitment to community development helped bring the tournament to life. TRUSTEE CHAIR'S MESSAGE

Leading with Gratitude

I love the idea of a gratitude journal. The practice is simple: Write down three things each day that you are grateful for, and watch how it shifts your mindset, your energy, and even the way you move through the world. To me, gratitude is more than a feeling; it is a force.

And in Rotary, gratitude is a reflection of who we are. When we thank our donors, we are acknowledging their contribution and honoring their belief in a better world.

I write in my gratitude journal often - not every day but enough to keep me grounded. I want to share with you an entry from January, written during the International Assembly. The assembly is more than our annual learning event for district governors-elect; it's a gathering filled with inspiration and moments that stay with you long after the lights dim.

My first entry was in gratitude to Debbie and Russell Doby. In 2022, Debbie, then a district governor-elect, missed out on that inspiring assembly experience because of the pandemic. Then, a year later, just a few days before the district conference she was excited to host, Debbie and her husband were in a head-on collision. The other driver was

created an endowment fund for their district at the Arch Klumph Society level, choosing to transform pain into purpose.

My second entry reflected on Ravishankar and Paola Dakoju from the Rotary Club of Bangalore, India. At the assembly, the couple pledged \$50 million to The Rotary Foundation, an extraordinary gift representing 85 percent of their wealth. Ravishankar said, "When you give more than you think you can, life returns to you more than you can ever imagine." That single sentence captures the heart of Rotary.

My final entry was in gratitude to Moh Eid and Chuck and Carol Stocking. After Moh's brother, Ibrahim, a humanitarian aid worker, was killed while helping victims of war, Chuck was moved to create the Ibrahim Eid Fund to support Rotary Peace Fellows. Their leverage gift was \$100,000 toward a million-dollar goal. That is what it looks like when grief becomes hope.

And today, my gratitude entry is for you. For longtime members and brand-new faces, for those who give year after year and those preparing to make their first gift. Thank you.

Let gratitude be our compass this year.

A MESSAGE FROM DISTRICT DISASTER

As the Rotary District 7020 Disaster Chair (DDC), my remit is to encourage the Presidents of the District's Rotary Clubs to ensure that their club and its members are prepared and able to respond to the possible and serious threats that may endanger their club, their country and its population.

It is vital that the clubs have a viable Disaster Management Plan (DMP) and that their DMP is updated as necessary on an annual basis.

The intention of the plan, complete with Appendices and Checklists, is to provide operational procedures to prepare clubs to respond effectively to any potential emergency and to implement systems for business continuity and recovery. Consideration has been given as to which disaster scenarios clubs are most likely to encounter. All kinds of natural, human, and

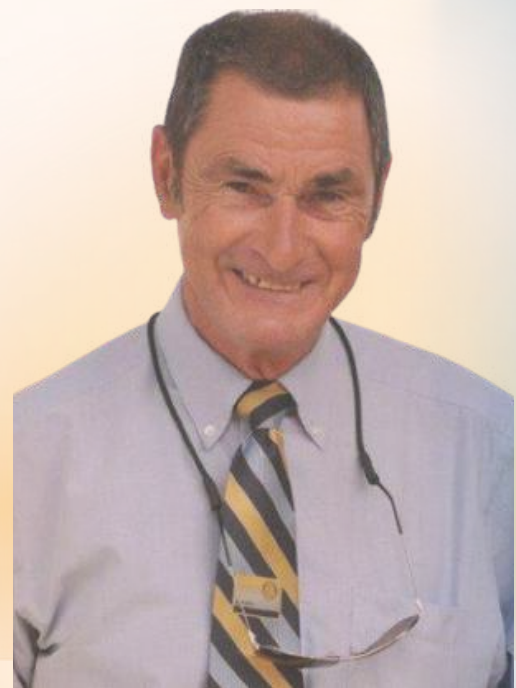
accidental disasters are possible, however those more relevant to Rotary Clubs are as follows:

- Fire
- Natural disasters (earthquake, flood, hurricanes, pandemics, severe lightning, tsunami, etc.)
- Power failure beyond 24 hours
- Internal Communications/ Network/Computer equipment failure beyond 24 hours
- Cyber risks

The procedures will increase the potential to minimise the effect on clubs, their continuity, property, membership and their families.

Developed in phases to cater for actions required in the event of an emergency, the plan should contain distinct sections as follows:

- To safeguard and protect personnel and families.
- To allow continuity of business operations.
- To protect property, buildings and other assets.
- Return to normalcy



The present District 7020 Governor Lindsey Cancino has prioritized Disaster Preparedness and Mental Health for his year in office.

Consequently, a Webinar spotlighting Disaster Preparedness is being arranged for Rotarians in Districts 7020 and 7030 on Saturday the 8th of August, commencing 9a.m. Eastern time (8a.m. Central).

A Webinar on Mental Health, including Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) is also planned for the near future.

A MESSAGE FROM THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Growing Rotary Through Belonging, Innovation, and Service.

District 7020 begins the 2026-2027 Rotary year with a clear membership focus: helping people who have not yet met Rotary find themselves in Rotary, while ensuring every member has a place to belong. Our work is aligned with the district's 3K-by-2030 goal to grow toward 3,000 Rotary members by 2030 while strengthening

the experience of current and future members.

This year, the District Membership Committee will work through four coordinated areas: Membership Attraction, Membership Engagement, New Club Development, and Prospective Member Management. Together, these teams will help clubs invite more people into Rotary, improve onboarding and mentoring, strengthen retention and belonging, and ensure prospective members receive timely, welcoming follow-up.

Key priorities include quarterly membership forums, monthly Membership Table conversations, and continued promotion of Voices of D7020. Clubs will be encouraged to test and share fresh ideas for attracting members through service experiences, community partnerships, flexible invitation strategies, and stronger public presence.

We will also focus on keeping members connected and engaged. Clubs will be encouraged to review member satisfaction, strengthen new member care, use mentoring and onboarding tools, gather exit feedback, and create experiences where members feel valued, heard, and included. In partnership with District DEI Committee, and Rotaract, we will support welcoming club cultures, strengthen belonging, encourage leadership opportunities, and highlight Rotaract pathways.

New club development will be another important part of the year ahead. District 7020 will advance traditional sponsor clubs, satellite and companion clubs, innovative formats, Impact Clubs, cause-based clubs, and a possible Passport Club. Our goal is to charter 6 to 8 new clubs while building a strong pipeline of sponsor clubs, founders, advisors, and community partners. Prospective



member follow-up will remain a district priority. Clubs will be encouraged to respond quickly and warmly to inquiries, with district leaders and Assistant Governors providing support when follow-up is delayed. By tracking inquiries monthly and sharing trends at the Membership Table, we can better understand where interest is growing and how to turn interest into lasting connection.

Our goals are bold, but achievable when every club plays a part. By focusing on retention, welcoming prospects, and adding at least two net new members annually, clubs can help build momentum toward 3,000 members while deepening Rotary's impact. This year, District 7020 is committed to growing Rotary not only in numbers, but in connection, purpose, and belonging.

That day was your day!*

- 1 In July partners and community leaders gathered in Cavaillon, Haiti, to officially inaugurate the city's rehabilitated drinking water system.
- 2 Cavaillon's original water infrastructure dates back to 1983 and has undergone several periods of rehabilitation. This latest chapter included major improvements to the network, solar-powered pumping, new piping, and strengthened local management.
- 3 **The result is significant:** more than 7,000 people now have access to safe water for approximately eight hours each day, compared with only a few hours before. But today was about more than infrastructure. Speaker after speaker emphasized that the system belongs to the community and that its future depends on local leadership, responsible management, and residents paying their water bills so it can be maintained and sustained.
- 4 **That is the heart of HANWASH's work.** A water system is not truly successful simply because it has been built. It is successful when the community has the capacity and ownership to keep it working.

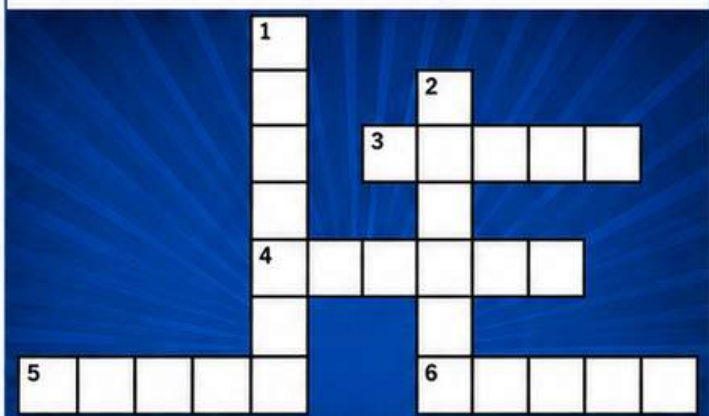
