PDG Horace reminded us of his long association with the RCV, for example, his years as ADG with responsibility for the RCV, and the fact that he first came to the United States from his native

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Jamaica on the basis of an exchange visa issued in Kingston by then-Vice Consul David van Valkenburg.

Please join the Caribbean Partnership! PDG Horace thanked the RCV for its past and present sponsorship of projects in Haiti and Jamaica, and asked us to join in the Caribbean Partnership. A Short History of Trinidad and Tobago

When Trinidad was explored by Columbus in 1498, it was inhabited by the Arawaks; Carib Indians inhabited Tobago. Trinidad remained in Spanish possession, despite raids by other European nations, until it was ceded to Britain in 1802. Tobago passed between Britain and France several times, but it was ultimately given to Britain in 1814. Slavery was abolished in 1834. Between 1845 and 1917, thousands of indentured workers were brought from India to work on sugarcane plantations. In 1889 Trinidad and Tobago were made a single colony.

Partial self-government was instituted in 1925, and from 1958 to 1962 the nation was part of the West Indies Federation. On Aug. 31, 1962, it gained independence and on Aug. 1, 1976, Trinidad and Tobago became a republic, remaining within the Commonwealth. While the country is a stable democracy and enjoys the highest living standards in the Caribbean thanks to oil revenue, tension between East Indians and blacks has underlined much of political life. In 1970 the tension was the underlying cause of riots, protests, and an army mutiny for the end of foreign influence over the economy. These events prompted a state of emergency which lasted for two years.

Eric Williams, "Father of the Nation" and leader of the People's National Movement (PNM), which is largely supported by blacks, governed from 1956 until his death in 1981. In Dec. 1986 the multiracial National Alliance for Reconstruction (NAR), based in Tobago, won a parliamentary majority, promising to sell most state-owned companies, reorganize the civil service, and reduce dependence on oil.

In 1990, to protest the NAR government, some 100 radical black Muslims blew up the police station in an attempted coup, in which the prime minister and other officials were held hostage for six days. The NAR was defeated in 1991, and the PNM returned to power. In 1995, the East Indian–based party, the United National Congress (UNC), led by Basdeo Panday, formed a coalition government with the NAR. In 2000, Panday narrowly won another term.

In Dec. 2001 elections, the governing UNC Party and the PNM Party gained 18 seats each. The two parties agreed to allow President Robinson to select the prime minister to end the impasse. But when Robinson chose Patrick Manning of the PNM because of his "moral and spiritual values," the opposition angrily called for new elections. In the Oct. 2002 elections, Manning's party declared victory. Maxwell Richards, a university dean, was selected president by parliament in 2003.

In April 2006, former prime minister Panday was sentenced to two years in prison for committing fraud in public office. Richards, running unopposed, was re-elected in February 2008.

SHELTER BOXES TO PERU

ShelterBoxes en route to Peru for mudslide survivors

224 ShelterBoxes were being sent to Peru to bring shelter, warmth and dignity to families who have been made homeless by recent mudslides.

A ShelterBox Response Team (SRT) has found a need for emergency shelter in the mountainous area of Cuzco in southeastern Peru. Much of the region had been evacuated, but many people remain in the more isolated areas.

US-based SRT members John Cordell and Gary Boe travelled to Abancay, a city in Apurimac District, where a landslide occurred on March 18.

"We arrived in Abancay to find around 150 families homeless after heavy rains on Sunday caused the hillside to let go, which produced a mudslide that buried their homes," said Boe. "Our priority is to get emergency shelter to them as soon as possible."

There were reports of similar problems in a town called Choccepuquio in Chincheros District, in the same region where 60 homes have been destroyed. Several more homes had also been damaged in the area surrounding the capital of Lima.

The SRT is coordinating a response with the national disaster management office, the National Institute of Civil Defense (INDECI), and other officials of the regional area while the ShelterBoxes are being transported to the South American country.

Heavy rains have caused rivers to burst during Peru's rainy season over the past few months, flooding fields of crops and producing landslides that have damaged hundreds of homes.

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
ROTARY CLUB OF TYSONS CORNER, Virginia and WeCareToShare, Chantal, Inc.

The Rotary Club of Tysons Corner, Virginia, recently welcomed a special guest speaker - Dr. Sarah A. John of WeCareToShare, Chantal.

Dr. Sarah John is the lead physician for WeCareToShare, Chantal, Inc., a nonprofit medical relief team that provides medical care for the mountain villages of Chantal and Canon in Haiti. Recently, WeCareToShare made its sixth trip since the 2010 earthquake and treated about 1,000 patients per day.

Chantal is a remote agricultural village 300 miles southwest of Port-au-Prince with no permanent doctors or clinics. WeCareToShare workers are all volunteers who pay their own way and treat patients free of charge. The group hopes to build a permanent clinic in Chantal at a cost of \$300,000, with help from Rotary.

Dr. John was born in Chicago, attended Brandeis University and New York Medical School, and works for Urgent Care in Mount Vernon.

Some information about WeCareToShare, Chantal from http://chantalhaitimission.wordpress.com/

Our last Haiti Medical Mission trip is now completed and was conducted Sunday, April 15 through Sunday, April 22 2012.

- Our team consisted of 26 members working in the specialties of dentistry, gynecology, pediatrics, and adult medicine.
- We had a fully functioning pharmacy in 2 locations staffed by a licensed pharmacist.
- We spent 4 days in Chantal and divided the team in half so 2 days could be spent in Canon Haiti.
- Each day we saw approximately 400-600 patients.

We were supported by 22 staff members, including 5 laboratory technicians, interpreters, security guards, cooks and drivers. Fr. Yves Francois coordinated the many support services including transportation, lodging, and food for all of us and we are indebted to him.

We are also grateful to the sisters who kept us nourished physically and spiritually with their quiet and joyful presence.

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Currently dates for the next trip are not set, but we are hoping one can be conducted in the Spring of 2013. Keep posted to the blog or subscribe to it to be keep up with the latest details.

Requirements for acceptance into the team include the following:

- 1. Paying all transportation costs associated with flights to/from Port Au Prince (PAP) and from PAP to Les Cayes if that option is taken.
- 2. A \$500 minimum donation to cover the costs of all ground transportation, all meals, lodging, payment of interpreters and provision of medications and supplies for clinic days.

This donation will be due prior to the start of the trip and is tax deductible. Checks must be made out to "Knights of Columbus Share Program" with notation "Mission to Haiti" in the memo field. See the Donation tab for address information. (This sum of money can be raised through donations you acquire from others. Each person who donates will receive a letter verifying the tax-deductible donation.) Additional fund-raising efforts are also highly encouraged to optimize the support we can provide in terms of medications and feeding the waiting patients.

- 3. A completed trip application submitted to Juliet Geiger at julietgeiger@aol.com
- 4. Any costs associated with personal trip preparations (immunizations, passports, personal belongings...)

Where is Chantal and why do we go there?

Chantal is approximately 250 miles southwest of Port Au Prince - a very rural community which has subsistence farming and rice agriculture.

It is normally a small community of approximately 1500 people, but now has almost doubled with refugees from Port Au Prince because of the earthquake. The surrounding mountain villages and seaside villages result in additionally many hundreds of more folks coming to the clinic, often walking 4 -5 hours to be seen.

There is no doctor or dentist or pharmacy within hours of Chantal by vehicle. Two nursing sisters at the local Church run a small dispensary and are providing us with a site.

Currently there are more than 2 million Haitians who are displaced since the earthquake and the recent hurricane. Many are relocating to more rural areas. The government there is asking NGO's to focus on these areas because they remain underserved

Rotary Club of Vienna, District 7610 Helps Jamaican Hospitals

"Committed to Service" is part of the motto of The Rotary Club of Vienna, Virginia. Their volunteer work and monetary support of over 50 local charities annually has been an inspiration to the Vienna community for many years. It is not surprising, then, that when the Club heard about an urgent need nearby, they reached out to help.



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Not long before, at the Kingston Public Hospital in Jamaica, Past Assistant District Governor Bobby Young (*pictured at left*) had reviewed clinic records and he recognized that a problem was emerging. Requests for prostate cancer screenings were increasing over time, but the two hospitals

responsible for screenings, Kingston Public Hospital and Mandeville Regional Hospital, had no dedicated equipment to meet the growing need.

mobilized his Rotary Club, St. Andrew North, and reached out to mainland Clubs through PDG Horace McCormack, incoming Chair of the Caribbean Partnership Program.

The Caribbean Partnership helps to facilitate projects between Rotary Clubs in the Eastern and Southeastern United States and Rotary Clubs in the Caribbean. Through the relationships he had developed over the years, PDG McCormack was able to connect the Rotary Clubs of St. Andrew North and Vienna. Together, they pooled their resources, requested additional funding from Districts 7020 and 7610, and finally requested additional funding from Rotary International.

With a "thumbs up" from Rotary International through a Matching Grant Awarded in early May, the Rotary Clubs of Vienna and St. Andrew North are ready to roll. As a result of

their efforts, ultrasound machines, biopsy guns, and other supplies will soon be on their way to the two Jamaican hospitals. Congratulations go to the Rotary Club of St. Andrew North, to the Rotary Club of Vienna, and to the Caribbean Partnership for supporting early detection and treatment of prostate

Do you have signs of prostate cancer?

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Networking through the Caribbean Partnership - A Success Story

If "chance favors the prepared mind," then **PDG Horace McCormack**, incoming Chair of the Caribbean Partnership, must have a mind that is especially primed to make connections on behalf of families all over the Caribbean.

At a recent conference in the Bahamas, PDG Horace made the chance acquaintance of **Jennifer Torres**, Program Manager of Children's Place International in Evanston, Illinois. Children's Place International provides comprehensive services to families affected by HIV/AIDS in Chicago, Africa, & Haiti.

Immediately recognizing a worthy cause, **PDG McCormack** talked with **Ms. Torres** about two emergency needs – two roofs and two latrines – that were long-overdue for HIV/AIDS affected families in Haiti. He set to work with his contacts in District 7610 and in the Caribbean Partnership.

Before long, he received a favorable response from **Patricia Velkoff**, Major Grants Chair of the Rotary Club of Vienna, Virginia. Her Club was interested in both the Children's Place project and in the potential of developing other projects through the Caribbean Partnership.

PDG McCormack set to work, and before long, a flurry of contacts connected **Roland Saint-Cyr** with **Dr. Velkoff & Dr. Jean-Rony Boulin**, International Service Chair of the Rotary Club of Cap-Haitien, Haiti. An additional burst of activity started when **President Janet Brown** of the Rappahannock-Fredericksburg Club heard about the project. She was able to mobilize additional support from the **Rotary Clubs of Rappahannock-Fredericksburg, Fredericksburg, Stafford, North Stafford Co.-Garrisonville.** AG Dave Varrelman also contributed, and **Phil Lustig,** Treasurer of CP, assisted with advice and logistical help.

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Those contacts, along with the encouragement and shepherding from **PDG McCormack**, paid off. With excellent coordination, a Rotary contribution of \$3,500 will soon support this sanitation project in Haiti.

A great benefit of developing projects in the Caribbean is the availability of the established support network of the Caribbean Partnership. CP provides a network of people who can help Clubs foster cultural exchanges, develop relationships, and share their knowledge, ideas, and interests. Mainland Clubs and the 25 countries of Zones 33 and 34 can look to the Caribbean Partnership for help in pairing projects and sponsors, advice on developing Twin Club relationships, and overall expertise and experience in the region.

The Caribbean Partnership created a dream come true for families involved with The Children's Place. Beyond the support for sanitation, though, new relationships have been established, and The Rotary Club of Vienna has a new path toward partnership on future projects.



Port of Spain, also written as **Port-of-Spain**, is the capital of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago and the country's third-largest municipality, after San Fernando and Chaguanas. The city has a municipal population of 49,031 (2000 census), a metropolitan population of 128,026 (1990 unofficial estimate) and a transient daily population of 250,000.

It is located on the Gulf of Paria, on the northwest coast of the island of Trinidad and is part of a larger conurbation stretching from Chaguaramas in the west to Arima in the east with an estimated population of 600,000.

Port of Spain is Trinidad and Tobago's most developed city.

The city serves primarily as a retail and administrative centre and it has been the capital of the island since 1757. It is also an important financial services centre for the Caribbean and is home to two of the largest banks in the region.

The city is also home to the largest container port on the island and is one of several shipping hubs of the Caribbean, exporting both agricultural products and manufactured goods. Bauxite from the Guianas and iron ore from Venezuela are trans-shipped via facilities at Chaguaramas, about five miles (8 km) west of the city. The pre-lenten Carnival is the city's main annual cultural festival and tourist attraction.

Today, Port of Spain is emerging as a leading city in the Caribbean region. Trinidad hosted the Fifth Summit of the Americas in 2009 whose guests included US President Barack Obama and US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton.

Port of Spain also hosted the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting in 2009 and hosted a Commonwealth Business Forum in 2011.

It will host the 2012 CP Celebration in July - the 27th and 28th.

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
