





Seven Habits of Highly Effective Rotarians

1. ATTENDANCE

Effective Rotarians always try to attend their club meetings or make up at other clubs as much as possible. They are aware that regular attendance is an important part of their membership commitment and do not miss a chance to attend. They participate on committees which they are members of, plus others if invited. They are keen to attend all club events and district functions. They participate in the District Assembly and District Conference each year, and have attended a recent Rotary International Convention.

2. FELLOWSHIP

Effective Rotarians enjoy meeting other members and often feel this fellowship is as important to Rotary as the actual business part of a meeting. They go out of their way to talk to those whom they do not know and believe a stranger is just a friend they have not met yet. Outside of Rotary they also enjoy meeting people and getting acquainted with them. At large Rotary gatherings they make an effort to meet others, rather than just fraternizing with friends from their own club.

3. VOCATION

Effective Rotarians respect every vocation and understand how the classification system is the basis of Rotary. They firmly believe that each vocation provides a cog in the wheel and is important, however insignificant it may appear. They firmly believe each member should try to excel in their job and they try to support and help others to reach their full potential.

4. DISCIPLINE

Effective Rotarians understand the value of self-discipline and know that productive accomplishments are hard to achieve without it. They realize that both inner and outer discipline must be maintained in a proper balance and can enforce both disciplines when and where required.

5. TIME, MONEY & ENERGY

Effective Rotarians know they have a purpose in Rotary and fully realize they must earmark a certain amount of time, money and energy to maintain this commitment. They also realize these three things should be shared in proper balance between their family, vocation and community.

6. EMPATHY

Effective Rotarians put themselves in the position of the other person, especially if that person is in difficulty. They know that mere sympathy may not be enough, can be empathetic and feel compassion for the difficulties of others. They believe that what they are doing for their community is merely returning a small part of what they have already received from it. While they may appreciate recognition for their efforts they do not hanker for it.

7. IMAGE OF ROTARY

Effective Rotarians may sometimes feel that all is not right with Rotary or there are too many 'politics'. They know some elements in Rotary need improvement but rather than be negative they use a positive approach to help rectify things. They maintain a positive attitude and portray a good image of Rotary, both inside and outside the organization.

ROTARY PEACE CENTERS

Rotary Peace Moment:

Approximately 180 people attended the Rotary Peace Forum in Manhattan, Kansas, on February 23, 2013. The Peace Forum was co-hosted by the two Manhattan Rotary Clubs and co-sponsored by nine other District 5710 Rotary Clubs.

Keynote speakers were past RI Director Philip Silvers and People to People CEO Mary Jean Eisenhower. Concurrent sessions focused on student and citizen exchanges, humanitarian assistance, conflict in schools and communities, peace studies, service abroad, military and diplomatic careers, and advocacy and community mobilization.

Presenters included Rotary Peace Fellows Summer Lewis (by distance media from Australia), Katrina Lewis, and Vibhavari Jani, as well as representatives of Peace Corps, Community Service International Teams, Numana, the Institute for Civic Discourse and Democracy, the Manhattan Alliance for Peace and Justice, and other organizations.

Participants ranged in age from a children's choir to senior citizens. All of this was in response to RIP Sakuji Tanaka's call for Rotary Clubs to host peace forums.

Recently, the Haiti Prime Minister, Laurent Lamothe, came to the Lycée Philippe Guerrier des Cayes to inaugurate the High Speed Internet system the Haitian government will put in all public schools in Haiti.

They started with the Lycée Philippe Guerrier des Cayes, which is the District 7020 Project started by PDG Errol Alberga, continued with PDG Diana, and officially completed last year by PDG Guy Théodore. Attached are pictures of this event.

During their speeches, Rotary was publicly thanked by the Principal of the school, Mr. Alex Dorvil; the head of the Education for the South of Haiti, Mr Ary Louis; and also the Prime Minister himself, Mr Laurent Lamothe, who really appreciated the work done by Rotary in the Lycée. All media local and national were present which permitted great visibility of the work done by Rotary in the Lycée.

The Prime Minister Laurent Lamothe was so impressed that he asked: "Can Rotary do this in other part of the country?"

Another important member of the government's delegation close to the Prime Minister asked me, "How can't you go to Jérémie to do a similar work?"

I learned afterwards that he was the Délégué of Jérémie (who is the official representative of the President Martelly). He was impressed, but sad to know that Jérémie once had a Rotary Club that was terminated. He asked me the name and telephone of the last President of the Rotary Club of Jérémie. This achievement made us all proud to be Rotarians!

Rotary Donates \$52,500 to My Brothers Workshop

The Rotary Club of St Thomas, Rotary Club of St Thomas Sunrise, Rotary District #7020, Rotary Club of New Bern, North Carolina, Rotary District #7720 and the Rotary Foundation collectively donated \$52,500.00 for the purchase of all necessary carpentry equipment for My Brothers Workshop.

My Brothers Workshop takes young men from the world of crime and teaches them a trade – they have placed 187 graduates in the construction work force on the island over the past several years. Rotary's contribution will allow My Brothers Workshop to expand allowing more young men this opportunity. The founder, Scott Bradley, has been the moving force behind this program and after training the first group of students has drawn his supervisors and mentors from that group and now has these graduates training new members.

There were 66 homicides in the Virgin Islands in 2010. This is the highest murder rate per capita in the United States. My Brother's Workshop is a non-profit Virgin Islands charitable corporation.

The program took 80 boys off the street. It has been organized to provide hope, faith and purpose to at-risk and high-risk young people in the US Virgin Islands by offering mentoring, counseling, paid job training, education and job placement. These efforts are being made in association with other local and national groups functioning with purposes consistent with those listed below.

The program focuses on youth, both boys and girls, ages 16-24 who have dropped out of school, are marginally literate and live in poverty or are homeless. Many of these youths have been involved in gang or gang related activities or/and have a juvenile criminal record.

The objectives of the program include:

- Mentoring the youth while they are in the program through positive reinforcement, moral values, respect and trust from the trainers, staff, volunteers and board of directors.
- Mental health counseling through human service's existing programs and volunteer counselors that can focus
 on identifying specific issues such as anger management, domestic violence, and substance abuse.
- Paid job training through specific industries that are proven economical outlets in the US Virgin Islands such as construction and small trade skills like woodworking, plumbing, masonry, and carpentry. Hospitality and tourism including: service, cooking, baking, housekeeping, maintenance, salon services, and retail.
- Education through GED tutoring, re-acclimate the youth back into traditional high school programs and consider non-traditional schooling such as a charter program that can be hosted on the MBW property and can be funded through educational grants and private funding.



With the rate of homicides going up in the Virgin islands, the community must join together to help our children. We cannot continue this downhill spiral of looking away when the youth of the Virgin Islands are caught up in such violence. My Brother's workshop's new location, a 12,000 square foot storage and work facility is at the TuTu Park Mall, at the former site of the Plant Depot. With Rotary's donation, a 40ft container of new tools was delivered to the facility. It is our hope to continue to promote this organization as one of hope for our youth's future.

Dear Patricia:

On behalf of Children's Place International, including staff in both Chicago and Haiti I would like to thank you and to thank your colleagues at the Rotary Clubs of Vienna, Cap-Haitien, Rappahannock-Fredericksburg, Fredericksburg, Stafford, North Stafford Co.- Garrisonville, as well as Janet Brown, Dave Varrelman, Phil Lustig, and Horace McCormack for the amazing support you have collaboratively provided to us to help four of our program families in Haiti with roofs and latrines for their homes.

As you know, these families are some of the most vulnerable in the world, made even more vulnerable as a result of HIV and AIDS. The goal of Children's Place is to keep children and their families together, despite the many challenges that they face and appropriate housing and sanitation are big challenges. Due to annual environmental catastrophes, our families commonly face leaking roofs and dangerous sanitation conditions which due to the health conditions of our families are even more severe situations than they would be for other families.

Your care and compassion will go further that you will ever know. The effort and kindness that you have demonstrated in a very concrete way means that four families can sleep in a dry and safe home and can use a basic toilet rather than plastic bags that they must secretly bury after dark at the fear of violence by those afraid of contracting HIV. You are lifesavers.

Although you have already received the majority of these items, I have compiled photos, receipts, and testimonials from this project. I hope seeing them gives you pride that you have made a big and important difference in the world.

Robyn Corbett is a new Rotarian, based in Australia D9710 (gidday!), who has been involved in community development work in Haiti for the past eight years. Robyn has partnered with Haitian leaders and networks in urban and regional Haiti, to establish schools and agri-businesses as well as micro-enterprise training and development for former street kids in their home in the city of Gonaives.

Together they have formed Viva Haiti Inc - www.VivaHaiti.org

An important current project is a literacy campaign, which has received endorsement from friend and collaborator, Haiti Congressman Sadrac Dieudonne:

"I personally support and endorse the efforts of the Kiko literacy campaign to facilitate reading and story-telling in Haiti, as well as awareness of Haitian culture in other countries. I have first-hand experience of the work my colleague Robyn Corbett, Founder of Viva Haiti Inc., is doing in my country in collaboration with members of my family and constituency, and I applaud this initiative."

The first in a series of children's story-books is about to be published. The stories are written in English and Creole, and illustrated by Haitian artist, Jean-Denis Ganthier. The literacy campaign is designed to share the joy of reading and story-telling with families and communities in Haiti; copies of the books will be donated to families to keep, share and enjoy.


Robyn is grateful for the encouragement and support offered by Rotarians, especially through the Caribbean Partnership program.

WE CARE TO SHARE, CHANTAL

We Care to Share, Chantal traveled to Haiti, January 13 - 20, 2013 with a team of 43 providers including 9 MDs, 4 pharmacists, 4 dentists with 2 dental hygienists and 3 dental assistants, as well as nurses and lay helpers.

Carried with the team was the durable dental and medical equipment supplied by the Rotary Club District Simplified Grant from District 7610. It was put to good use treating over 3000 people including over 600 dental patients.



Photos attached show the dental chairs in use. The dental delivery system provided by the grant meant that for the first time, children and adults in Chantal and Canon were able to have their teeth cleaned and sealed!

Patients for dental extractions were able to sit in the position most effective for the dentist, as well as more comfortable for the patient compared to lying down on a board laid across two church pews.

Patient extrication litters were in use within the first half hour after our arrival in order to carry patients from far away into the dispensary to be seen and cared for. The large pharmaceutical purchase allowed us to take care of every

patient with the most needed medicines without running out of critical items.

For the first time in 7 medical relief missions, the team made over 60 house calls to elderly and frail residents who were too ill for the trip into the dispensary, and provided them with the medicines they needed as well as the knowledge that they weren't forgotten.



The people of Chantal and Canon rewarded us with their friendship and by sharing their lives for a short time. We will return to Haiti June 13 -20, 2013, and are recruiting doctors, dentists, pharmacists, and nurses to join us!


