It's absolutely amazing what 6 months in a new country can do. The time here has flown on by, and I looking back, I realize how well I have embraced my new life here in Germany. I had so many misconceptions about Germany before coming here, but now I love being a part of such an amazing, vibrant and friendly culture. December and January did not really bring any special trips like my first portion of the year, but I think it was really nice to be able to see more of the region where I live, spending even more time with the locals, and being a little bit more independent. Unfortunately, since writing my last beaver tale, I did have to say goodbye to my first host family, the Kleins.

I spent the Christmas holidays with the Kleins, and it was absolutely amazing. I sang in the choir of my small town during the Christmas Eve Mass, and then we went home and had a nice meal with the family, as well as exchanging gifts.
