

Message From District 7080 Interact Committee Chair For Rotary District 7080

When I was appointed Chair of D7080 Interact Committee, in a new reality where there are more virtual activities and almost zero physical activities, and where most High Schools are shut to extracurricular activities, I wondered how a service organization will survive. I also wondered what will become of our Interact Clubs, but I knew that our Interactors had to be kept engaged.

We have endured certain challenges as well as enjoyed certain successes. Despite the restrictions

- 1. we started a monthly Newsletter,
- 2. established the first community-based Interact Club and started/resuscitated one other,
- 3. met and communicated regularly,
- 4. adopted a cluster system for better management:
 - a. Brampton & Mississauga,
 - b. Oakville & Burlington
 - c. North Halton & Dufferin Erin Caledon
 - d. Guelph Wellington & Cambridge
 - e. Kitchener Waterloo & Woodstock Oxford and
- 5. had visibly active clubs, whose activities are mentioned here in this Newsletter.

With 36 Interact Clubs in the District (12 terminated, 24 active), only about 20% are currently having one form of activity or the other. While we understand the situation, we have to do better, as we have to get and keep our younger youth active and enthusiastic about Rotary. As a start, we need the help of Rotary Clubs to update their Youth/Interact Chair/Advisor contacts and contact information for Interact Club(s) in their community and share with us. Next, reach out to the club(s) you sponsor, find out how they are doing and support them to remain vibrant. Once the pandemic subsides or is over and extracurricular

activities begin to return, we also need to be strategically positioned to hit the ground running in encouraging and supporting the return of Interact Clubs.

We have quite a task ahead of us, but I cannot remember a time in history where something failed when a team put their heart into it. With support from the District through the Youth Services Director, Ed Fowler, and your cooperation, we will make Interact the choice club for High School students. Remember, Interact is Rotary's best membership investment, with the purpose of bringing self-governing and self-supporting young people together (ages 12 to 18) for an opportunity to participate in fun and meaningful service projects while encouraging the development of leadership skills. Rotary Clubs guide Interactors to take action, build international understanding, and make new friends around the world while discovering the power of Service Above Self as Rotary Opens Opportunities.

1) Central Peel Secondary School Interact Club, Brampton is dedicating their online platforms and weekly discussions this month to celebrate and raise awareness about Black History Month.


Interactor Binalpreet Kalra:


2) Nelson High School Interact Club, Burlington





"The Rotary Club of Burlington Lakeshore Charitable Foundation offers 12 Scholarships worth \$2,500 each", said Russ Taylor, Chair of the Foundation. "These awards may be used for enrolment fees, program supplies or training costs". Currently the Charitable Foundation offers Academic Scholarships, Leap Forward Awards (for individuals facing financial or other barriers), Vocational Studies Award, and Specialty Scholarships/Awards to individuals demonstrating leadership and a commitment to community. The Club also offers an Athletic Scholarship for students pursuing high level Athletic training at the Post-Secondary Level.

"This year Milton Rotary is offering three scholarships worth \$1,500 each," said Rod McLachlan, Director of Public Relations and Community Service. "Applicants can put forward their name no matter what high school grade they are in — Grade 9 to 12 students are all eligible to apply for a 2021 Milton Rotary Youth Volunteer Scholarship." Awards are to be used towards tuition for post-secondary education or training programs and funds will be sent directly to the post-secondary institution. The application deadline is April 17th. Milton Rotary also offers \$250 bursaries for five local students, whose names are put forward to Rotary by the schools themselves.
