On May 17th, Sabrina Paez, who is originally from Venezuela in South America, spoke to the students in my Interact Club. People in her home town of Maracaibo speak Spanish. Although Venezuela is wealthy because of oil, it is also a place where a lot of violent crime takes place.

Sabrina said that it is unsafe in Venezuela. Even riding a bicycle can be dangerous, for bicyclists can be assaulted by robbers, who then resell the stolen bikes for high prices.

After a brief introduction about Venezuela, Sabrina talked about her experience as a Rotary Youth Exchange student in Springfield Illinois. She said that she had amazing homestay families, and that the experiences she got from being an exchange student continues to support her mentally. Her memories were contained within the Rotary pins on her youth exchange jacket. Sabrina also talked about her family's decision to move to Oakville, becoming a member of Rotaract, and then being co-host of the Milton Rotary Youth Summit!

Many questions regarding the situations in Venezuela, Sabrina's exchange experience, and her involvement in Rotaract were asked during the Q&A section. Students enjoyed Sabrina's eye-opening presentation, and greatly appreciate this opportunity to learn from her.
