USA Ride for Polio

The day dawned clear and bright and the Proudly Bi-National Rotary Club of Lewiston, NY & Niagara-on-the-Lake assembled at Hennepin Park to prepare for the US leg of Pedal for Polio

The civic government embraced the event and had erected signage prominently welcoming the participating Rotarians, and the Club Rotarians assembled at the crack of dawn to erect Rotary related signage and welcome representatives from Clubs from all over District 7090

The route for the ride was developed with the cooperation of the Greenway, who in conjunction with PDG Kevin Crosby, as part of the District's Wellness Initiative is developing a trail of bike paths between Lake Erie to Lake Ontario. The last leg of the trail, from the Village of Lewiston to the shores of Lake Ontario, is in the process of being developed and the Greenway is in negotiations with civic authorities to bring this to fruition.

19 participants arrived to ride, and were given gift certificates entitling them to an after ride meal at the locally famous Como Italian Deli by Lewiston/NOTL Rotary Club President Leslie Scibilia, generously provided by the Club.

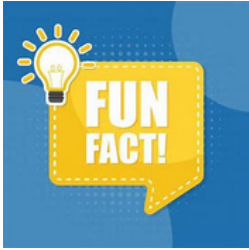
After meeting and greeting, PDG Bob Artis gave a stirring address reminding the group of the Legacy of Dr. Ron Mergl (who was the AG of Area 8 in the past).The present AG of Area 8 (Tommy) introduced Gregory Stevens of the Greenway and NY State Parks) who led the group (including 80+ year old PDG Bob Artis) on a scenic route through the Village and then turned Northward and, after a brief stop for a photo opportunity at the Lighthouse at Old Fort Niagara, at the junction of the mouth of the Lower Niagara River and Lake Ontario, and then returned to the Village of Lewiston. Grand Island Rotarian (and also a Greenway/NY State Parks Employee) Michelle Lockett "brought up the rear" to make sure no one was left behind and to ensure that all was well.

Members of the Lewiston/NOTL Rotary stood by at the park, ready to respond to pick up riders should they get into distress, and welcome the group back, show them where to eat, find the restrooms, and find adult beverages. PDG Bob gave another emotional address, a group photo was taken by District Social Media "Star" (and AG) Michele Starwalt-Woods and, after a wonderful display of Rotary Fellowship, the event came to a close.

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What is a Rotary Foundation Benefactor?

A Rotary Foundation Benefactor is a person who has notified The Rotary Foundation that they have made provisions in their final estate plans to Rotary for US\$1,000 or more, or who has made an outright gift of US\$1,000 or more to The Rotary Foundation's Endowment Fund. Benefactors receive a certificate and insignia to wear with a Rotary or Paul Harris Fellow pin. They are listed in the Benefactor Report and identified in the Club Recognition Summary.

Clubs with 100% member support of Rotary's Endowment are eligible to request a Rotary's Promise Club electronic certificate. Qualifying support may be a commitment for a future gift to The Rotary Foundation in an estate plan or an outright gift of \$1,000 or more to the Endowment Fund.

A US\$1,000 gift to The Rotary Foundation creates a legacy of helping people live better lives around the world. Today there are over 100,000 Benefactors worldwide.

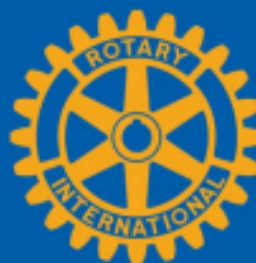

What is a Major Donor?

Major Donor – The Rotary Foundation recognizes individuals or couples whose combined giving reaches US\$10,000, regardless of the gift designation. This recognition level can be achieved only through personal contributions. Major Donors may elect to receive a crystal recognition piece and pin(s) commemorating the gift at each new recognition level. Since Rotary's Major Donor recognition began there have been over 30,000 Major Donors. Thank you to the 68 Major Donors in our District



CLUB ROTARY FOUNDATION COMMITTEE CHAIR JOB DESCRIPTION



Your chief responsibility as chair of your club's Rotary Foundation committee is to inspire your club's members to give to the Foundation and participate in its activities. Find more information about these duties in the accompanying documents.

RESPONSIBILITIES	
GENERAL	CLUB ROTARY FOUNDATION COMMITTEE
Attend your district training assembly.	Promote Foundation grants and activities and help members participate in them.
Work with the president-elect to select and prepare your committee members.	Inspire club members to give to The Rotary Foundation.
Create subcommittees as needed (e.g., global and district grants, fundraising, annual giving, PolioPlus, Rotary Peace Centers).	Attend the grant management seminar to ensure that your club qualifies for Rotary Foundation global grants.
Meet regularly and plan activities.	Oversee the global grants qualification process.
Set committee goals that will help achieve the club's annual goals, and monitor progress toward them.	Conduct inspirational, Foundation-focused club programs at least four times a year.
Manage your committee's budget.	Work with your treasurer to manage any Rotary grant funds your club receives.
Work with your club's other committees and your district committee on multiclub activities or initiatives.	Work with your district's international service chair and service projects committee to develop and fund projects.
Provide committee updates to your club, including the club president and its board of directors.	Work with your treasurer to submit donations to the Foundation in an accurate and timely manner.
Determine what your club expects of your committee.	Work with your club's membership committee to ensure a positive club image and experience.

Action Plan for 2021-2022 Rotary Year continued...

Strategy #4: Increase Member Support for the Foundation

- A. **Create an inspirational presentation on the work of The Rotary Foundation** and share with at least 50% of Clubs.
According to May 2020 survey, they seek one more focused on impact of contributions and less on mechanics of giving.
 - June 30, 2022 Goal: 33 club presentations have been given
- B. **Educate Rotaract Clubs on how to get involved in district and global grants to inspire participation**
 - June 30, 2022 - Goal: 1 Rotaract club actively participates and 20 Rotoracters giving to TRF
- C. **Help members to better understand the Annual Fund and how it helps change lives locally and globally**
 - June 30, 2022 – Achieved a 10% increase in the number of Rotarians in our district giving to the Annual Fund
- D. **Develop a “plug-n-play” campaign that clubs can use to educate and celebrate Foundation month**
 - November 30, 2021 Goal – the plug and play campaign has been shared with and used by 40% of clubs

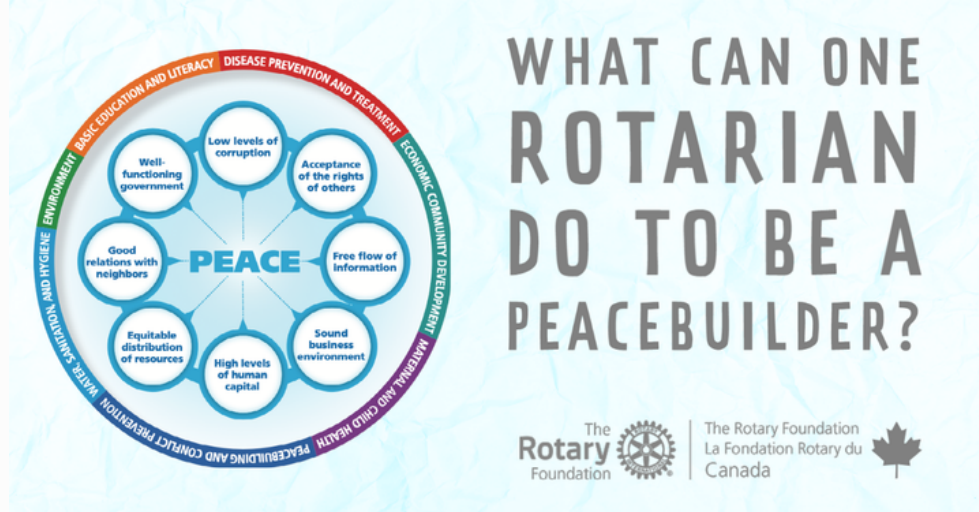
