

WHAT IS A GLOBAL GRANT FOR VOCATIONAL TRAINING?

Vocational training teams are groups of professionals who travel to another country, either to learn more about their profession or to teach local professionals more about it.

The Rotary Foundation funds some vocational training teams in our areas of focus through global grants. This training is often carried out in conjunction with a humanitarian project.

A team should include at least three people. The team leader needs to be a Rotary member, while the other participants can be members or nonmembers who have experience in the area of focus.

Rotary previously had a program called Group Study Exchange, which promoted international understanding and offered person-to-person opportunities for participants to learn how their vocation was practiced in other countries. It was phased out when we updated our grant model and placed this activity within global grants.

Budget for global grants minimum \$30,000 USD

District 7090 can help with up to \$15,000 DDF for a Global VTT grant.

This will be matched 80% in world fund



Rotary Club of Brantford - Sunrise provides grant for LTC memory boxes

Thanks to a grant from the Rotary Club of Brantford - Sunrise, memory boxes have been installed outside of each resident's room on Bluebird Terrace. Shelley Murray, Life Enrichment Manager at St. Joseph's Long-Term Care Home says that with community support, the home hopes to have memory boxes installed for every resident across all eight home areas.

Memory boxes are specific to each resident. They contain items that are relevant to the individual, such as precious family photos, instruments and tools that relate to the individual's past work life and their favourite hobbies and other unique items.

For those living with Alzheimer's disease, dementia, or other forms of memory loss, a memory box can function as more than just a link to the past. It can stimulate the senses, trigger recall, or even help residents make new friends. A memory box paints a picture of a person's past.

"For new people joining the care staff, the items contained in a memory box can serve as topics to engage the resident in meaningful conversation," says Shelley.

"This puts the resident's interests front and centre, creating instant common ground. Every time a memory box is filled we learn new and wonderful things about the individual," Shelley added.



Pictured above is the memory box of Katie Hunt, a resident of Bluebird Terrace who has been diagnosed with Frontotemporal Dementia. Katie's husband Doug filled his wife's memory box with images from significant events and activities in their life together. This includes photos of raising their daughter Megan and spending time with their grandson Seth.

Several items pertain to Katie's work as an accomplished face paint artist. Katie wrote articles for several family entertainment magazines and International Face and Body Art magazine. She served on the board and was an organizer for the annual Face and Body Art Conference, held in Orlando, Florida.

Other photos include memories from Doug's work as a stilt walker. Doug's achievement of Guinness World Record holder as World's Tallest Stilt Walker was a significant event in the couple's life that connected them to the community on a large scale.

What is Legacy?

Rotarians believe in Rotary's Guiding Principles which have been the foundation upon which our values and traditions stand. The Rotary Foundation Mission statement and the concept of Doing Good in the World is why we are Rotarians. By creating a legacy through your Endowment Fund ensures your vision for the future supports Rotary's causes today and into the future.

The impact of Rotary programs that you have designated through your gift has an immediate effect, while legacy focuses on the long term consequences and benefits that stems from those programs. By supporting Rotary's Endowment Fund is an opportunity to begin creating your own Legacy.

To create this Legacy can be done either through a bequest or gift. A bequest is a gift planned for the future through a Will or Estate plan, Life insurance beneficiary or Residual Retirement funds. World Immunization Week, April 22-30, 2024

The global vaccine drives of the second half of the 20th century are one of humanity's greatest achievements. Immunization campaigns have enabled us to eradicate smallpox, nearly defeat polio, and ensure more children survive and thrive than ever before.

It's a time for Rotarians to celebrate, as we're at the threshold of eradicating Polio. It is also a time for us to recommit to see the job done.

With case counts in Afghanistan and Pakistan totalling 3 so far in 2024, it's often asked, "Why do we need to continue to support the Initiative?"

While it appears simple, it's not. It's complex.

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative Rotary is a Founding Partner) has estimated the cost to eradicate polio will be US \$4.8 billion. A fully funded polio eradication effort means over 400 million children will be vaccinated each year for the next five years. It also means continuing global surveillance in 50 countries to detect any poliovirus from any source.

Polio remains endemic in two countries – Afghanistan and Pakistan. Until poliovirus transmission is interrupted in these countries, all countries remain at risk of importation of polio, especially vulnerable countries with weak public health and immunization services, and travel or trade links to endemic countries.

This requires that we continue:

immunization activity in the two remaining endemic countries,
ongoing surveillance and containment in 43 non-endemic countries
when polio outbreaks occur,
☐ producing and maintaining a stockpile of oral poliovirus vaccine,
🗆 conducting awareness and education campaigns,
☐ identifying and addressing gender-related barriers to immunization
and disease surveillance,
☐ political advocacy to ensure support for immunizations and outbreak responses,
☐ funding of staffing at WHO and UNICEF country, regional and
neadquarter offices to support eradication efforts

Economists have estimated that this investment in polio eradication may cumulatively save an estimated US\$33.1 billion in health care costs by 2100. Each year, Rotary International commits to raising US\$50 million to end polio. This is matched by US\$100 million from the Bill &; Melinda Gates Foundation (BMGF). RI and BMGF have agreed to maintain this combined support at least until 2026. However, last year's fundraising efforts saw us fall several million dollars short of our \$50 million target, and the balance had to be made up from the Rotary Foundation's World Fund.

There is still a great deal of work and investment needed to succeed.

We need your help. We need your Club's support.

A group of Rotarians in US D7090 have been researching and meeting with various organizations in order to determine what is the need and how as Rotarians of Action we can support this cause. These are the words we heard, over and over again as those with babes in arms and young children in tow, would approach the polio vaccination volunteers. They would hold the child up to receive the oral drops, and often many other children would be gathering around watching very intently. Polio vaccination was an annual community experience, "National Immunization Days".

Older children pointed to the purple pinky of the younger ones just vaccinated, and then point to themselves, to say that they were vaccinated in the past. We didn't speak the same language, but gestures and eye contact conveyed the message of appreciation and friendship, and happiness in the moment. Everyone had a little story to share and enjoyed smiling and laughing and singing. One of our group was asked what they ate to get their skin so white? My red hair was touched often by those who were curious.

I am so happy to share with you, my first hand experience from my recent NID (national immunization days) trip to India February 23- March 5, 2024. We were a group of 17 Rotarians. I was the only Canadian on this tour. I met my roommate in person after I arrived in Delhi from my 17 hour non-stop flight from Toronto. I certainly enjoyed telling people I was from Delhi, Canada. I typically said I lived near Niagara Falls, the heart of D7090.

There is so much to tell you about the two days of NID, and the many impoverished communities we visited. Rotary is there providing education, health care, nutrition, safety, housing and more.

They are providing dignity.

Everyone in our group had a strong call to service, and a commitment to Polio Eradication. Howard Tours organized the entire tour with a local tour company owned by a Rotarian in Delhi, India. I give them a 5 star rating! It was a fully escorted tour by motor coach, small tuk tuk bicycle taxis, and even an elephant ride up a hill to a 15th century palace. Our sightseeing included the Taj Mahal in Agra, the famous Pink City "Jaipur", many sites in Delhi, 5 Rotary clubs visits and 6 Global Grant programs. I was truly honoured to induct a new Rotarian at one meeting.

I was often in tears. The tears of gratitude that Rotary has given the gift of vaccination to underdeveloped countries. That the children we were vaccinating will walk, and not be crippled with Polio Myelitis. Those who contracted Polio in the recent past, have available to them corrective surgeries, prosthetic limbs, and skills training to be self reliant through programs funded by The Rotary Foundation grants.

I would love to come to your club or area visit (in person or virtually), to share stories, more photos and videos that capture the faces of gratitude. The funds contributed to The Rotary Foundation through fundraising, personal contributions, and corporate & government support has an incredible Reach, and lasting Impact.

As Rotarians, we all change lives through contributions of service, funds and grants that support the good work of Rotary through The Rotary Foundation.
