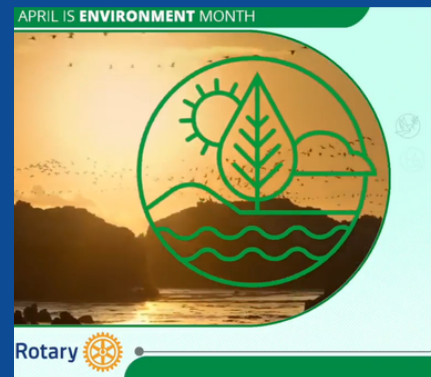

The Rotary Foundation is the engine that transforms and supports projects that change lives in our local communities and around the world.

Best Financial Practices

WHAT ARE THE BEST FINANCIAL PRACTICES FOR GRANT FUNDS?

Because grant funds come from donor contributions, it's important for sponsors to manage these funds prudently, transparently, and in accordance with Rotary Foundation policies.

Some good ways to do that are to:

- Follow your spending plan to distribute and use grant funds for their stated purpose and in a timely manner.
 - Make project-related payments by check or other traceable method.
 - If payments are made electronically by one person, maintain a paper record showing that the payment was approved by both signatories.
 - Maintain detailed receipts and record each transaction. Your ledger should list each transaction and note the date, the amount, and the reason for it.
 - Share information so you can manage grant payments smoothly and keep funds secure.
- Thank you for helping Rotary maintain the highest level of grant oversight.



WHAT IS THE ROTARY FOUNDATION CADRE OF TECHNICAL ADVISERS?

The Cadre of Technical Advisers is a group of Rotary members who offer their expertise and advice to clubs and districts that are planning and carrying out grant projects around the world. They also strengthen the impact of Rotary's grants by safeguarding Foundation funds.

Cadre members provide guidance about conducting community assessments, incorporating sustainability, setting up monitoring or evaluation plans, and properly managing the financial aspects of a project.

More than 550 Cadre members who speak more than 80 languages come from 75 countries. You can connect with Cadre members who have expertise in a specific area of focus or in a particular language, country, or district.

ITS THAT TIME OF YEAR TO COMPLETE YOUR INDIVIDUAL PROJECT REPORT

- If your project has been completed from 2025/26 and the club has not yet received your District Designated Funds please check the status of your project and complete the required Individual Project Report at your earliest convenience .
- The due date is April 15 but an extension can be negotiated if required for completion of the project.
- Please let Sue know that you have completed the Individual Project Report
- The report will be reviewed by the grants committee and a stewardship review will be completed
- Any other information required will be communicated to you by the Grants team
- Once approved a cheque will be initiated for the requested DDF and mailed to the club

THE GRANTS MODULE IS OPEN FOR GRANT REQUESTS FOR 2026/27

- Ensure that your club has been qualified for District Grants for 2026/27
- that the required training has been completed
- current District Grant MOU has been signed and returned to Sue Foster
- Foundation & Polio Plus goals have been entered in Rotary Club Central
- once your club is qualified the grants module will be opened to Submit a Grant Request

Rotary Peace Fellowship – Applications Close May 15

There is still time to apply for one of Rotary’s most prestigious opportunities — the Rotary Peace Fellowship, with applications open until May 15.

Each year, The Rotary Foundation awards up to 170 fully funded fellowships for leaders committed to peace and development. Fellows study at leading universities around the world, gaining the skills needed to prevent conflict, build sustainable change, and strengthen communities.

Two program options are available:

Master’s Degree Programs (15–24 months)

Professional Development Certificate (1 year, for experienced professionals)

The fellowship covers tuition, living expenses, travel, and field study, making it a life-changing opportunity for emerging and mid-career leaders.

Since its launch, more than 1,800 Rotary Peace Fellows are now working in over 140 countries — leading change in governments, NGOs, education, and international organizations.

What is the Endowment Fund?

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) is the engine that drives all the good that Rotarians do in the world. Rotarians provide the imagination and the sweat equity required to solve some of the world's most complex problems. TRF supplies a proven, structured way—through its programs and grants—to allow Rotarians to be successful in a sustainable way. While we are all committed to TRF today, I would like you to think about TRF of tomorrow. This is where the Endowment Fund comes in.

The Rotary Foundation created the Endowment Fund in 1982. It is a restricted fund that gives future Rotarians the resources they need to design and implement sustainable projects year after year. The objective is to provide a permanent and sustainable source of funding that will further the work of future Rotarians committed to “Doing Good in the World.”

When you donate to the Annual Fund (SHARE), it helps people around the world live better lives today. When you give to the Endowment Fund, you support life-changing programs today and forever.

Donor contributions are invested in perpetuity, and only a portion of the investment earnings is spent on designated programs. The principal of the initial gift is never spent. The Endowment Fund's strategy is to preserve and invest the initial contribution and to grow the value of that gift.

There are two ways of supporting the Endowment Fund: either as an outright gift or a bequest, which is a promise of a future gift to the Endowment Fund.

Legacy is an important component for Rotarians, and the Endowment Fund is designed to preserve your legacy. Two good examples of that are our 7090 Heritage Endowment Fund. The 7090 Heritage Endowment Fund (E20602) was established in 2022 to pay tribute to Rotarians who have made a meaningful impact in our clubs or district. Another example is for Rotarians to create their own Named Endowed Fund.

The Endowment Fund provides a predictable, ongoing stream of income for Rotary's highest priorities, acting as a “financial engine” for the organization.

Specific uses include:

Funding Global Grants: Supporting sustainable, large-scale projects, such as those focusing on disease prevention, clean water, and education

Rotary Peace Centers: Endowing master's degree fellowships and professional development certificates

Named Funds: Donors (\$25,000+) can create a named fund directed toward specific areas of focus, the Annual Fund, or the World Fund

District Support: A portion of earnings is sent back to local districts for projects

Key Aspects of the Fund

Perpetuity: Contributions are invested forever, ensuring a legacy of giving that lasts beyond a donor's lifetime

Investment Strategy: Focused on equity investments to generate higher long-term returns

Giving Options: Donations can be made through outright gifts or planned, deferred gifts, such as estate bequests

Your generous contributions to The Rotary Foundation's Endowment Fund are essential to securing and growing Rotary programs throughout the world. Rotary recognizes donors to express gratitude for your commitment, offering individual recognition as well as naming opportunities that enable you to honor a friend or family member with a named or endowed gift.

Always remember that Rotary's tomorrow depends on what you do today.

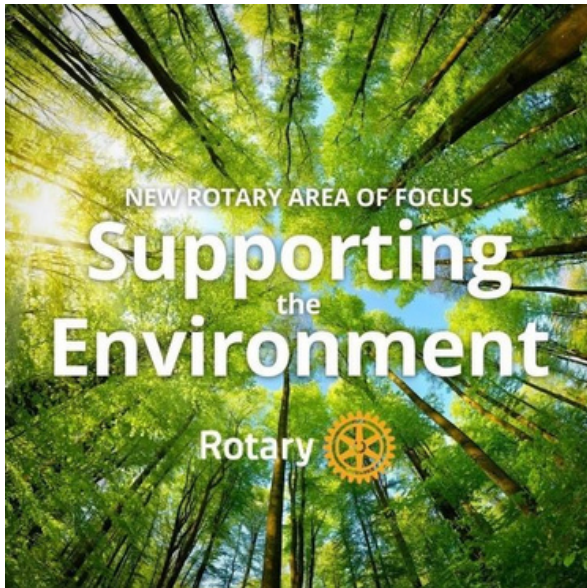

April Is Environment Month & April 22 is Earth Day



Within District 7090, most clubs are participating in the Great Lakes Watershed Cleanup.

Thousands of Rotarians & Non-Rotarians alike, on both sides of the Canadian and U.S. border will roll up their sleeves to collect refuse along the shoreline, and innumerable waterway tributaries to the Great Lakes basin.....

The Earth is significant as a call for action for inhabitants of the world. However, environmental action need not be limited to Earth Day or the Environment Month. These actions need to become a habit. Rotarians in District 7090 are active in a whole range environmental actions.

Some examples include:

- Nature walks, couple with clean-ups of trails and lakeshores
- Scrap metal and e-waste fundraiser
- Food waste reduction projects
- Plant-based diet challenges
- Rain barrels to promote awareness about water
- Tree planting
- Pollinator gardens
- Calculating carbon footprint savings through various actions
- Partnering with schools and community groups
- Plastic free month challenge
- Environmental minute at weekly meetings
- Working with municipalities to remove invasive species

Why Polio Eradication Matters Now More Than Ever

Recent changes in global health funding and ongoing challenges in some of the world's most vulnerable regions are creating new pressures on **the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI)**. These developments serve as an important reminder: the final mile is often the hardest.

The following is an excerpt from a **statement by Rotary in Great Britain and Ireland** published in March 2026. The statement speaks with urgency and clarity to what is at stake — and why **now more than ever, the role of Rotarians is essential**.

*"We are at a critical stage in the **campaign to eradicate polio, infection numbers in Pakistan and Afghanistan** are very low, but this is a result of great efforts on the ground in these last two endemic countries. Pakistan has 400,000 people working in vaccination teams, in Afghanistan teams are working street by street in cities, towns and villages to ensure that every child is reached.*

***Vaccination teams operate in very dangerous regions along the border between the two countries where they are constantly at risk** of attacks and violence. Conflict between the two countries has put them at further risk but still the effort to vaccinate goes on, a recent drive in Pakistan inoculated 45 million children.*

*These challenges extend beyond the two endemic countries of Pakistan and Afghanistan. Today, outbreaks of variant polio persist in the world's most fragile settings. **Humanitarian crises, conflicts, and disasters complicate efforts to vaccinate every child against polio**, while logistical challenges and resource constraints make it hard to respond quickly to every outbreak.*

***Failure to eliminate the polio virus in Pakistan and Afghanistan would open the door to new outbreaks in countries where the virus was eliminated.** We cannot afford to be complacent.*

*Rotary International pioneered the campaign to eradicate polio. Our members have given huge amounts of financial, volunteering and advocacy support to this endeavour, and **we remain fully committed to the task of eradicating polio as our organization's number one humanitarian goal.***

Alongside our partners and in collaboration with national governments, we have helped immunize more than 3 billion children against polio in 122 countries, prevented over 20 million cases of paralysis and reduced the number of polio cases by 99.9%.

*We intend to fulfil **the promise made 40 years ago, to safeguard the health of children by eradicating polio.***

*We need every Rotarian and supporter to do everything possible to back our campaign. **We need to redouble our efforts to ensure that we succeed, that we achieve our goal, that this, our most important humanitarian cause is realized, we must End Polio Now.**"*

Through advocacy, awareness, and continued support of the PolioPlus Fund, we can help ensure that the progress made over the last four decades is not lost—and that future generations will live in a polio-free world.
