The 'Multiplier Effect'! What is it? How does it affect you? Why do we in Rotary applaud it?

Dr. Google has several definitions of the Multipler Effect: an economic factor that, when increased or changed, causes increases or changes in many other related economic variables. For example:

One act of kindness is shown to breed another act of kindness.

I like to say it is when "1+1=3"! When an action results in more than it's input.

Rotary has used the Multiplier Effect for over a hundred years. In 1917 the first Rotary endowment fund was founded for "Doing Good in the World". In 1928 it was named the Rotary Foundation and with a solid \$5,000 bank account, the fund was able to contribute \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children.

How The Rotary Foundation uses the multiplier effect:

When you give the Rotary Foundation a dollar today, it is invested for 3 years. After that the principle is returned to the Foundation to support both Global and District projects. Fifty percent of the original contribution is returned to a District as District Designated Funds (DDF), while the other fifty percent is used to fund worldwide projects, such as global grants, scholarships and vocational training teams.

The Cluster Fund

District 7090 has gone a step further to improve the "Multiplier Effect"! One of the barriers to club participation in Global projects was that smaller clubs could not organize or financially support projects like a \$75,000 water project in Nepal or a Midwife training program in Guatemala. However; if several clubs got together, it was possible. With 12 clubs contributing \$1,000 US to a project selected by the group, the multiplier effect brings both District and RI funds together to total \$30,000. This is the threshold for a Global Grant project set by RI."1+1=3" The multiplier effect works!

2020-21: RC of Welland: Educational duplication Equipment for schools in remote area of Phillippines during COVID \$31,119

2021-22: St Catharines Lakeshore: Water supply and distribution maintenance training \$69,150 2020-23: RC of Dunnville: An ingenious system of collecting rain water from roofs. Collected during short rain season and stored for use in 8 months period of drought. Tanzania \$39,455 (approval Pending)

WHAT IS THE ROTARY FOUNDATION'S FUNDING TIMELINE?

A three-year funding cycle gives districts time to plan programs and allows the Foundation time to invest the contributions. The earnings from those investments help pay for administrative costs, program operations, and fund development costs.

This funding cycle means that a contribution you make in 2022-23 will be invested in 2023-24 and projects will be selected in 2024-25, with the funds able to be spent in 2025-26.






