Macatabo Early Childhood Development Centre –story from front page

A Global Rotary Partnership in Action

The Macatabo Early Childhood Development Centre is a small preschool located outside Davao on the island of **Mindanao in the Philippines**. Built in 1998 on land donated by a local family, the school serves children ages 2–5 from the Manogo and Bagobo indigenous communities. Many families rely on farm work and have limited financial resources. Originally designed for just 10 children, the one-room school has enrolled as many as 63 students at a time and has educated more than 1,300 children since opening — preparing them for public school while allowing caregivers to pursue employment.

In mid-2024, **Rotary Club of Welland** member Peter Inman visited the area while attending a family celebration. During his visit, he was introduced to the school and quickly recognized the serious state of disrepair, overcrowding, and sanitation challenges facing the students and teacher. Peter and local leader Lorenzo Yumang connected with the **Davao 2000 Rotary Club** to explore how Rotary could help.

After completing a detailed needs assessment using Rotary International's Global Grant framework, a sustainable improvement plan was developed. Brad Wood of the Rotary Club of Welland organized the project proposal and sought partners. **The Rotary Club of Jamestown, NY** joined the effort, and Rotarian David Troxell visited the site in January 2025 to help refine the scope. The final joint project was valued at US\$10,000, with each club contributing \$5,000, and was scheduled during the school break to minimize disruption.

The renovation was comprehensive. The building received new flooring, windows, doors, and a refurbished roof. The single toilet was replaced with three flush toilets, and upgraded water and sanitation systems were installed. The wood-fired kitchen was replaced with a safer, modern cooking facility equipped with a refrigerator and gas cooktop. The electrical system was upgraded, storage and desks were added, and the entire facility was repainted using durable, easy-to-maintain materials. Students also received new uniforms, backpacks, and teaching supplies.

Since reopening, enrollment has increased, parents have become actively involved in maintaining the school, a new qualified teacher has been hired by the government, and children now receive healthy daily lunches. What began as concern during a family visit became a powerful example of Rotary partnership in action.

This collaboration between Canadian, U.S., and Philippine Rotary Clubs demonstrates how working together — across borders and cultures — creates sustainable, lasting change and restores pride and opportunity in communities that need it most.



GRANT UPDATES

Plan now for global grants this Rotary year

An important change to District Designated Fund policy will take effect at the end of this Rotary year. At that time, DDF that has been unused for more than five years will be reallocated to a Foundation program. Districts have until 30 June to advise the Foundation where to redirect unused DDF. If a district doesn't choose, the unused DDF will go to the World Fund.



Because of this policy change, we expect to receive many global grant applications between now and June. If you are planning to apply for a global grant, please submit your application as soon as possible. Complete global grant applications that are received by **1 March** are the most likely to be considered for approval by 30 June. Clubs and districts can still apply after 1 March, but those applications may not be reviewed or approved by the end of this Rotary year. Questions? Write

If you were unable to attend the recent Paul Harris Society (PHS) session with Edina Mehovic, you missed an inspiring and informative look at how sustained giving through Rotary creates real, lasting impact and why the Paul Harris Society plays such a vital role in that story.

What Is the Paul Harris Society?

The Paul Harris Society recognizes Rotarians and friends of Rotary who choose to give US \$1,000 or more each year to The Rotary Foundation: to the Annual Fund, PolioPlus, or approved grants.

As Edina emphasized, PHS is not about a one-time gift. It is about commitment a personal decision to support Rotary's mission consistently and intentionally.

Why Sustained Giving Matters

Edina highlighted that predictable, ongoing contributions allow Rotary to:

- Plan Stronger, long-term projects
- Respond quickly to humanitarian and disaster needs
- Multiply impact through matching funds and global partnership

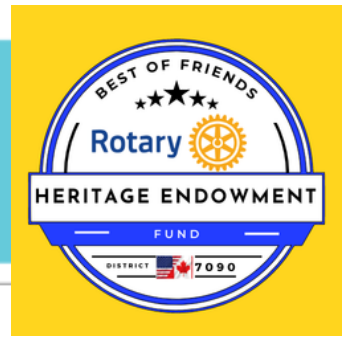

In 2022, District 7090 established the **Best of Friends Heritage Endowment Fund**, a named endowment held with The Rotary Foundation designed to honor past, present, and future Rotary leadership while creating a lasting source of grant funding for our district. **Market Value today \$164,597.51**

FEBRUARY is *PEACEBUILDING* and *CONFLICT PREVENTION* MONTH

How Polio Eradication Is Peacebuilding



Many people think of **PolioPlus** as a medical or logistical effort, but in 2026 the final barriers to eradication are overwhelmingly geopolitical. **Peace** is not simply a “nice-to-have”; it is a prerequisite for reaching every last child. As we enter the final stretch of our journey to a polio-free world, it is clearer than ever that global health depends on global peace.

Conflict remains one of the greatest threats to polio eradication. War displaces families, destroys sanitation systems, and creates areas where vaccinators cannot safely operate. Today’s obstacles are not only medical and financial – they are rooted in instability and insecurity.

What is less widely known is that Rotary’s PolioPlus program has long served as a quiet engine of diplomacy. “Rotary International’s **Days of Tranquility** (also known as humanitarian pauses or ceasefires) are a critical strategy in the PolioPlus program, allowing vaccinators to access children in regions affected by conflict, war, or extreme insecurity. These initiatives, often in partnership with **WHO** and **UNICEF**, involve negotiating brief, localized ceasefires with warring factions to ensure the safe delivery of polio vaccines.

These negotiated pauses – along with **World Immunization Days** – have been essential for reaching areas once considered inaccessible, including parts of the Democratic Republic of Congo, Sudan, Sri Lanka, and conflict zones in the Middle East. In September and November 2024, temporary humanitarian pauses enabled two rounds of **emergency polio vaccination** in Gaza following detection of the virus, reaching more than 550,000 children. Rotary members and partners often serve as neutral, trusted intermediaries, using the simple but powerful message: *Our war is not with the children*. Days of Tranquility have also been used to deliver other lifesaving interventions such as Vitamin A, deworming tablets, and measles vaccines.”

This February, as we reflect on The Rotary Foundation’s work, let’s remember that every contribution to PolioPlus is also an investment in a more peaceful and stable world. And thanks to the **Gates Foundation’s 2-to-1 match**, your \$100 gift becomes \$300 for peace and health.


