Rotary members around the world have access to different kinds of grants from The Rotary Foundation to support service projects, offer scholarships, and organize other activities that make a difference in their own communities and far away. Explore four grant options that can help turn your vision into reality.

How do we use these?	These can address community needs in alignment with the Foundation's mission.	These support larger, international projects that align with an area of focus. These competitive grants allow Rotary members to work with experienced partners and expand proven activities that align with an area of focus to make a significant impact.

What funding is available?	Your district can seek up to 50% of its District Designated Funds allocated for that year.	Global grants have a minimum project budget of US\$30,000. You can ask for up to US\$400,000 from the World Fund.	Districts can get up to US\$25,000 if the Disaster Response Fund has funds available.	One US\$2 million grant may be awarded each year. Sponsors need to secure US\$500,000 from one or more investment partners outside Rotary.
How and when do we apply?	Your district applies by 15 May of the Rotary year for which you're requesting funds. Your club applies to the district.	Clubs and districts can apply throughout the year.	Your district applies within six months of the disaster.	Your club or district submits a concept note by 1 August. Select programs are invited to develop a full proposal that is due in January of the following year.

WHAT ARE DISTRICT AND GLOBAL GRANTS?

The Rotary Foundation has spent more than US\$3 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects around the world. Rotary members can work with communities through Foundation grants, and two key options are district and global grants.

District grants fund small-scale, short-term activities that address needs in your community and communities abroad. Your district chooses what activities it will fund with these grants, such as humanitarian projects, scholarships, youth programs, or vocational training teams.

Global grants fund large, international activities with sustainable and measurable results in Rotary's areas of focus. These can include humanitarian projects, scholarships for graduate-level study, or vocational training teams.



WHAT ARE DISASTER RESPONSE GRANTS?

When communities are affected by catastrophes, The Rotary Foundation supports relief and recovery efforts through grants from the Rotary Disaster Response Fund.

Disaster response grants of up to US\$25,000 fund relief and recovery efforts in areas that have had a natural disaster within the past six months. These efforts can include providing basic items such as water, food, medicine, and clothing.

Districts that have had a disaster and are qualified to receive Rotary grants can apply for a grant to launch their own projects or work with established relief organizations.

From an Endowment point of View.

Why give to the Endowment Fund?

The mission statement of The Rotary Foundation is "The Rotary Foundation helps Rotary Members to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment and alleviating poverty". By having an Endowment Fund sends a message to its donors that Rotary and The Rotary Foundation will be here fulfilling it's Mission statement for decades to come.

The Endowment Fund is a fund that is restricted where Donor contributions are invested in perpetuity. Rotary strives to increase the value of your gift by preserving and investing your initial contribution and only spending a portion of the earnings. The object is to provide a permanent and sustainable source of funding that will further the work of future Rotarians committed to doing good in the World.

By giving today you get to watch as the value of your gift grows and the investment earnings improve Communities thru sustainable projects that change lives.

RIP Paul Alexander-lawyer, son, polio survivor

Paul Alexander was one of the last remaining polio survivors. He still used an iron lung machine Paul spent the last seven decades of his life living in an iron lung after contracting polio when he was a child in the 1950s in Texas Applications for the 2025 Rotary Peace Fellowships are open until 15 May.

You can help promote peace in the world by encouraging peace and development leaders in your community to apply for the Rotary Peace Fellowship.

Each year, Rotary awards up to 130 fully funded fellowships for peacebuilders from diverse backgrounds to study at one of our peace centers located at leading universities around the world. This year, selected this year will be 50 peace fellows to study in our master's degree programs at six partner universities in Asia, Australia, Europe, and the United States and 80 fellows to earn postgraduate diplomas through our professional development certificate programs at Makerere University in Uganda and Bahçeşehir University in Turkey.

Rotary Peace Fellows use their training to amplify their work at the local, regional, or global level. Together, we can advance peace by encouraging our local peacebuilders to learn about Rotary and apply for this unique fellowship.

Taking the All About Rotary Peace Fellowships course to learn about the centers and fellowship qualification criteria, eligibility restrictions, and application process Candidates have until 15 May to submit applications to The Rotary Foundation.

Thanks to generous support from donors and the dedicated participation of Rotary members, the peace fellowship program has more than 1,700 alumni working to make positive change in more than 140 countries.

Many program alumni have founded their own organizations to address critical issues or serve as leaders in governments, nongovernmental organizations, educational and research institutions, media and the arts, and international organizations like the United Nations and the World Bank.
