

The Rotary Club of Jamestown honored Kathy and Chuck Ludwig with Paul Harris Fellow Recognitions at the Club's recent awards dinner. Bill Tucker, president of the local club, told the group that none of the programs the club underwrites or supports would be possible without the tremendous largess of its members and the community who support the fundraising efforts of the club through its golf tournament and Charity Auction. Chuck and Kathy Ludwig have conducted the club's auction since its beginning in 1986 when only men were allowed and Mrs. Ludwig and their staff member Mabel Lewis were allowed to "work" the auction the following year. The auctions have raised over \$400,000 over the years and

allowed the Club to do much good work in the local and global communities.

The Ludwigs have been together since attending Jamestown High School and eventually started their own auction business. Chuck Ludwig was a member of the Jame-

Marjory B. Fritz, a Westfield resident, was recently recognized as a Paul Harris Fellow by the Westfield/ Mayville Rotary Club at its annual dinner at Zebro's Restaurant in Barcelona.

Nominated by long-time Rotarian Harry Barton, Ms. Fritz received the highest honor that Rotary International bestows on those who contribute to society. "She is a special individual and is the embodiment of the Rotary motto, 'Service above Self'," Barton said. "She is most certainly deserving of this award."

Barton said that as a fellow member of the Westfield First Presbyterian Church, he has been aware of Ms. Fritz's involvement for many years. She has served as chair of the Board of Deacons, which includes over-

seeing receptions following funeral services for families of the deceased and their guests by purchasing and preparing the menus. She also has served as chair of the church's Mission Committee, which raises money to provide donations to local agencies such as the Food Pantry, Soup Kitchen and the county Jail Chaplaincy. Barton added, "This committee also has been providing yearly funding (\$3000) to pay for a year's training of a student nurse in Haiti."

Ms. Fritz has volunteered her services to the church's Women's Association to assist



in one of its fund-raising projects, he continued. "During five consecutive Friday nights in the fall, she directs the planning of Harvest Dinners open to the public."

In 2002, Ms. Fritz joined the Westfield Memorial Hospital Women's Auxiliary and is the current president, having served in that position since 2005. "The hospital has benefited in many ways due to the efforts of the auxiliary under her leadership," Barton added, listing, "Major improvements include the creation of a Hospice room with accouterments paid for with auxiliary funds." She also served as a hospice volunteer for several years. In addition, all patient rooms, sleep labs and waiting areas have been refurbished. She has been the mainstay of the organization's Pie Booth at each summer's Arts & Crafts Festival in Westfield, personally baking a large num-

ber of delicious pies.

Ms. Fritz was formally presented the Harris award by the club's Rotary Foundation chair, James Wakeman, who stressed Rotary's motto "Service above Self."

In 1999, State Assemblyman and Rotarian David Seaman, along with Bob Lipp, sponsored Mike for membership in the Lockport Rotary Club. He served as assistant secretary for several years coordinating attendance. After taking a leave of absence during law school, Mike rejoined Lockport Rotary upon his return. From 2009-2010, he served

as president of the club, focusing his term on restructuring the internal operations of the club, including the adoption of substantial revisions to the by-laws, revamping the committee and meeting structure, and initiating changes to its website and songbook. He has served as the club's first vice president, vice president, past president, chairman of the holiday raffle committee in 2013 and as a long-time member of the membership committee.
