



MINUTES OF DISTRICT COUNCIL MEETING Saturday, November 22, 2008

Attendance: 46 Rotarians

Chair: Ralph Montesanto, District Governor 2008-09

Welcome & Invocation: DG Ralph called the meeting to order at 8:45 a.m.. He gave the Give Thanks invocation. Governor Ralph then asked the attendees to introduce themselves and "in the spirit of thanksgiving" to share their memory of the last time they demonstrated or were thankful.

Secretary's Report: Pene Hutton (see also attached report)

Pene noted that the Official Minutes of the noted below meetings are posted on the website in advance of today's meeting for review.

MOTION TO ACCEPT THE MINUTES OF DISTRICT COUNCIL MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 27, 2008, AND THE MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING OF OCTOBER 17, 2008 WAS MADE BY PDG BOB BRUCE, SECONDED BY DIRECTOR JOHN HEISE. MOTION CARRIED.

<u>**Treasurer's Report:**</u> Marlene McGraw (see attached report)

Marlene gave an overview of the Financial Statements as of October 31, 2008. She noted the following:

- 6 clubs still have outstanding dues, but 3 of those clubs have indicated recently that the check is in the mail.
- The statements look better than reality as neither the District Conference nor The Foundation Dinner expenses are all reflected or paid as yet. Additionally noted is that no Balance Sheet was included because the income/assets are over-inflated until the invoices are all received and paid for those two events.
- Financial records are at the auditor's for June 20, 2008. She expects that they will be available for approval at the January District Council meeting.

District Governor's Report: Ralph Montesanto (see attached report)

The Governor noted that 3 major events have occurred since the last District Council meeting.

• The GSE Team was here. Great team and from all accounts enjoyed the experience and their hosts. Additionally the team leaders for the outbound GSE back to Paraguay and Misiones Argentina have been selected. Doug Johnson, Welland Rotary Club, is the

team leader, and Susan Thompson, Norfolk Sunrise Rotary Club, is the alternate. They will head out in May of 2008.

- The District Conference was a great success. DG Ralph recognized all the committee and subcommittee members as having done a wonderful job. Expect the conference to break even.
- Last week was The Rotary Foundation Dinner at Salvatore's Italian Restaurant. 225
 people were in attendance and Past RI President Frank Devlyn spent an hour with over 40
 PEs before dinner. DG Ralph noted the individuals who helped make this such a success.

To date, the Governor noted that he had completed 69 of his Official Club Visits.

District Governor Elect's Report: Pravin Suchak (see attached report)

District Governor Nominee's Report: Karen Oakes

DGN Karen indicated that she had made an amazing number of contacts with her fellow class mate of governors; that the networking already was phenomenal. She noted that her team was coming together; that Bob Leek would be her Trainer and that Kevin Crosby, would continue on also as the PE Trainer. She also included a few remarks about success of The Rotary Foundation Dinner and publicly thanked Pene Hutton for her help with a Make Dreams Real pin – pinned on by DG Ralph.

Director's Reports:

Public Relations:

<u>Communications</u>: Pene Hutton (see attached report)

Pene updated Council members on the status of the website – particularly the directory and noted also the progress with using credit cards online to secure event reservations.

<u>Membership</u>: PDG Bob Leek for Andy Skrypniak, Director (see attached report) <u>Club Extension</u>: PDG Bob Leek, Chair

In addition to giving Andy's report, PDG Bob encouraged Council member to make up at the new Erie AM Club, which meets on Friday morning at the Holiday Inn in Fort Erie to encourage them.

He finished by promoting the RI Convention in Birmingham, England with these words – DK - UK - OK

<u>The Rotary Foundation</u>: Bob Bruce, PDG and Director (see attached report) PDG Bob likewise noted that TRF Dinner was a success, with 225 in attendance, but that one week prior to the event, we were only at about 100 reservations. He stressed that we need to teach Rotarians to register faster. He also noted that it was important to keep member information updated on both the RI and District websites for receipt purposes; or you may never get your receipt; which is especially important when sending in a tax deductible donation. Another mention was to the vision of TRF. He referred to his comment in his report. A decision will be upcoming as to whether District 7090 may want to be included as a pilot District for the process.

<u>Group Study Exchange</u>: DGE Pravin noted the need to recruit outbound GSE team members for the exchange with the Paraguay, Misiones Argentina trip. <u>Polio Plus</u>: Roger Crysler, Co-Chair

<u>Scholars</u>: John Tiebert, Chair announced the deadline for applications is April 15, 2009 for 2010 – 2011 Ambassadorial Scholarship.

<u>Grants</u>: Roy Sheldrick noted that RI had approved a \$70K grant to build 233 latrines in the Artibonite Valley in Haiti. – every time the village receives a well, it will also now receive a latrine.

<u>National Immunization Days</u> – PDG Bob noted that his report included information about how to get involved in this hands-on service.

Youth Services: Kevin Crouse, Director (see attached report)

Youth Exchange: Chair David George commented as to the following:

- Noted that 2 students had gone home; one due to extreme home sickness and another that just a poor choice on behalf of the sending District. He noted that his team was working with that District to ensure no future problems with their students.
- Another issue that is being resolved is the ability of inbound students, residing on the US side, to participate in inter-scholastic sports. Steps are being taken to participate in the program that will allow that participation.
- 3 new clubs are going to participate in YE. He also noted that if you see Joanna Turchin, tell her that David said she did a great job with the students at the District Conference.
- Outbound student interviews will be held January 17th in Hamburg and January 18th in Hamilton. Deadline for District to receive student applications is December 1st.

<u>SlapShot</u>: Director Kevin distributed Slap Shot brochures to the AGs or representatives from each club for them to take back to the clubs. He also noted the early registration is \$200; with full registration at \$250.

Service Projects: John Heise, Director (see attached report)

<u>Community Service</u>: Director John referred to his report and noted that Chair John Crawford is putting together a book of club activities and urged all to send in photos etc. of their clubs in action.

District Training: PDG Wally Ochterski, Director

PDG Wally reported most Visioning training activity at present being done in US side headed by PDG Dick Earne. He also noted several other activities such as Train the Trainer on January 10th. He announced that soon there would be a Public Speaking training such as was done on the US side in St. Catharines, ON at a date soon to be determined.

District Administration Reports:

Friendship Exchange: AG Nan Bruce, Chair

Chair Nan gave a little overview of FE for the PEs. She introduced PDG Wally who gave a report on his recent FE trip to Australia.

PDG Wally and his wife Barbara just returned from Australia. Wally noted that FE is about acquaintanceship, learning and bringing back project ideas. He said that it is an opportunity to meet people in other sides of the world and noted a fence project in South Africa that had come about because of these connections made through FE. He went on to tell Council members about his trip including the fact that Australia is suffering from a 10 year drought and all the steps they have taken to conserve water, like recycling gray water to use for plants and toilets. He noted that the suicide rate among Australian farmers is 4 times the national average because of ailing crops due to the water shortage and about how one Rotary club in Australia purchased a semi-tractor trailer using it to take a pot luck supper and a movie to the farmers. As Wally put it, "Acquaintanceship provides a means to help the farmers deal with day to day life". Among other ideas, he also described another project called "Mensheds" where men gather together to build things. The Rotary club provides the mean and the materials and the counselors, as needed.

Nominating Committee: PDG Bob Leek for PDG Art Wing, Chair noted that an email had gone out requesting nominations for DG for the year 2011-2012.

Issues for Discussion:

Disaster Relief/Recovery: PDG Bob Leek

PDG Bob noted that this committee was beefing up to be a stand alone committee reporting directly to the DG and no longer reporting under WCS who is busy with international projects. He indicated that this would allow Rotarians and clubs to respond more quickly to disasters with minimum government interference and maximum participant support. Roy Sheldrick is the Zone Coordinator for Disaster Relief. Roy noted the Shelter Box Project; that it is one of the projects approved to go club to club to raise funds. The role of the Rotary club with this project is one of replenish and stock the shelter boxes so that the product is there when a disaster hits and Shelter Box has the ability to get into countries with this assistance more easily than government assistances. PDG Dick Earne asked for a job description for this committee. PDG Bob responded that passion and organization would be two desired traits along with enough time to research and develop the program. Bob Mahony asked whether or not relief has to be Shelter Box and the answer was "no"; it is whatever is appropriate for the disaster.

<u>RI Convention in Montreal in 2010</u>: DG Ralph distributed chart paper to each table and directed participants to list ideas of how to promote attendance at this geographically close convention. Each table shared its ideas also with the larger group. DG Ralph took the chart paper to consolidate the ideas. (See attached consolidated Ideas to get all District 7090 Rotary Clubs to be Represented at RI Convention in Montreal in 2010).

Other Business:

There were several announcements but no new business. Of particular note is the passing of Jim Grant, Buffalo Club Rotarian who will be greatly missed.

District Governor Report to District Council November 22, 2008

Since the last District Council meeting three major events have occurred. The Group Study Exchange team from District 4840 spent the month of October in District 7090, the Annual District Conference took place October 17 - 19, and the Annual Foundation Dinner was held November 14.

I am pleased to report that the GSE team from Paraguay and Misiones Argentina were very pleased with their stay in our District. This was a specialized GSE and offered a holistic look at the issue of water. Carlos Fernandez, an architect lead the team comprised of Cinthia Apodaca a lawyer, Francis Penayo an agronomist, Gerardo Schwarz an economist and Federico Domecq a biologist. The team covered aspects of water from the legal concerns of boundary waters between countries, to large scale water projects, to end users for drinking, sanitation and agriculture. Thank you to all of the clubs in New York and Ontario that provided both overnight and daytime hosting. From what the team told me at their farewell dinner, they thought you were fabulous hosts.

I also want to report that Doug Johnson of the Welland Club and Susan Thompson from the Norfolk Sunrise Club are the team leader and alternate for our District. They will be preparing a water specialty team to go to District 4840 in May of 2009.

After two years of preparation, the District Conference, also focusing on water, was a great success. The goal was to offer something a bit different than usual and I am pleased to say that the planning team did just that. Over 600 Rotarians and guests were in attendance over the three days and feed back has been very positive. Thank you to Bob Morrow from Dundas Valley Sunrise and Michael Howes from the Hamilton Rotary Club for Co-Chairing the conference. Also thank you goes to each of the subcommittee chairs, Jan Southall - program, Cynthia Janzen – promotions, Adrienne Davidson - logistics, Eugene Gillies and John Burroughs - registration, Paul Gibel - finance, Joanna Turchin – youth exchange, Dan Rodriques – sponsorships, and Pearl Wolfe – Sergeant-at-Arms. There were also many others who were on the committees just mentioned, and, still others who worked on gift baskets, decorations and registration. Thank you to every one. We are still trying to close the books on the finances but barring any unforeseen issues should be pretty close to breaking even.

Just last week we held a wonderful Rotary Foundation Dinner at Salvatore's Italian Restaurant. There were 225 people in attendance and we even turned a number of folks away because they waited to register after the deadline. Our guest speaker, Past RI President Frank Devlyn, spent an hour with over 40 Presidents-Elect before presenting to the entire group. Thank you to District Governor Nominee and Permanent Fund Chair Karen Oakes for all the work she put into making the evening one of great fellowship, celebration and learning. Thank you also to Pravin, for chauffeuring Frank; to those Past District Governors and others who dined with Frank on Thursday evening at the golf club; and to everyone who put together and distributed the awards that night. A special thank you to Pene Hutton who managed registration and to Chris Yates who kept Pene sane during the arrival time onslaught!

Now, to the District Governor function that I have been living and breathing for the last five months. To date, I made an official visit to 69 Rotary Clubs in the District, doing 35 visits since the last council meeting. What a fabulous experience. And, I completed and emailed to the President and Assistant Governor a report of each visit, usually by the next day. Presidents were great getting reports to me prior to my visits. A special thank you to the Assistant Governors who faithfully accompanied me to each club! After the 4th or 5th meeting they still applauded when my speech was over, although, several of them clapped a little too loudly when the last club in their area was completed.





(*National Immunization Day)

ROTARY FRIENDSHIPS / PERSONAL SERVICE / INTERNATIONAL UNDERSTANDING Polio Immunizing / Rotary Club & Project Visits / City Tours

• Participate in a polio-eradication National Immunization Day. Note: this is a *National Immunization Day* immunizing in the areas where polio cases are still being discovered! The 2008 total of new polio cases in India stands at 496! This is fantastic! Immunize in the state of Uttar Pradesh on February 15, 2009.

Assist WHO (World Health Organization) with one day of door-to-door "mop-up" activities.

Located east and north of Delhi, this state has the highest number of polio cases in India. There are

many children with chronic diarrhea, a condition that often goes along with being a carrier of the

Polio virus. Rotary's Polio Eradication Committee of India requests our assistance with this area.

- Build international friendships through Rotary club visits.
- **Gain cultural enrichment.** Learn about India through meeting Rotarians and touring the cities of Delhi, Jaipur, Agra, Mumbai, Munnar, and Cochin. Visits to humanitarian service projects will be included.

It is vital that you be in good physical condition. You must be able to walk up to three miles a day over rough terrain, climb stairs, and adjust your medications to the 10 ½ hour time difference. (Just the long plane ride is exhausting.) If you are in doubt about your ability to handle any of these things, then this is not the trip for you!

Women volunteers are especially appreciated. The areas where we will be immunizing have a high percentage of Muslims, a religious group that is reluctant to have their children immunized. Women are the most effective immunizers as Muslim women are allowed to talk with other women, and may make eye contact with them. During door-to-door immunizing women volunteers may be allowed to enter the Muslim home to give the polio vaccine drops. Men can give the drops at the NID stations and certainly provide a valuable draw for area children during the NID and mop-up activities.

Our team of volunteers. Our group will be involved in the February 15th NID and one follow-up day of door-to-door mop-up activities with WHO and local health officials. Our Group will depart from Newark Airport, Newark, New Jersey on February 6, departing India on February 17th and arriving back to Newark airport on February 18th We will tour the cities of Mumbai, Cochin, Munnar, Allepey, Jaipur, Fatehpur Sikri, and Agra prior to the NID days. Volunteers will become familiar with Indian history and culture prior to helping administer the polio vaccine. After the NID experience we will depart to Delhi to tour and for our return flight.

Travel plans. It is not possible to use air miles for this trip. All participants will fly with their group on Continental Airlines. Participants will be accepted on a first-come basis; however, the absolute final registration deadline is December 5th. After that date reservations may be available based on availability-price could be higher. The two-page registration form must be faxed (800-811-1529) or emailed to Signal Travel – (karenr@signaltravel.com).

The cost of the trip is \$4650 payable to Signal Travel and Tours, Inc. This includes: round trip international airfare from Newark Airport, Newark, New Jersey; visa and courier service; 2 team shirts + 1 windbreaker; transportation within India; hotel and meal costs during the touring section of the trip; monument fees; guide tips; postage and other administration fees. The immunizations you choose to get prior to travel are at your own discretion. India has no requirements for entry from our continent, but recommendations are listed on the Center for Disease Control website, or you may check with your family physician. Total cost for a shared room is \$4650. Cost for a private room is \$5260.

Our travel agents in the U.S. and India are Rotarians. They believe in the Four-Way Test and "Service Above Self." These trips will fill up extremely quickly. Remember, Friday, December 05 is the registration deadline.

SERVICE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

October 17, 2008

World Community Service Committee (Chair: David Johnson)

The District Council has currently approved 23 projects. Three of these are international projects, i.e., Shelterboxes for disaster relief, Gift of Life, and Adopt-a-Minefield. A fourth, RADAR, is centered on the continent of Africa and has an AIDS focus. Other projects are in Belarus, Boliva, Ecuador, Ethiopia, Guatemala, Hati, Honduras, India, Indonesia, Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, Nepal, Niger, South Africa, and Uganda. Finally, the list includes one project started by the RYLA class of 2006 and being carried on by former students and the Welland Rotary Club.

The committee uses the District website to promote these projects. The website also includes advice for participating in an international project.

During the past few meetings the committee has spent time ensuring that approved projects are program oriented and deal with multiple issues in a given area.

Clubs that are interested in participating and initiating an international project should consult the District's website. I am confident that the contacts listed for each project would be more than willing to be a speaker for your club.

Community Service (Chair: John Crawford)

Last year the committee developed a format for club to use when considering a local community service project. The form assists clubs in determining community needs and whether a proposed project meets those needs.

The committee plans this year to move to the next level and is developing an electronic scrapbook of community service projects. This will give clubs an opportunity to share their ideas and successes. Clubs are asked to forward captioned photos of their projects to the Community Service Chair, John Crawford.

1) To provide the district and clubs with disaster relief options for immediate response

2) To provide the district and clubs with disaster recovery options for longer term response

3) From time to time, to report to district and clubs where recovery and rebuilding projects are seeking expertise, funding, and physicial labour

4) To conduct reseach, through Rotary International, Zone, Action Group, Rotarians and specific enterprises (i.e. Shelterbox) consultation, so as to be current on disaster status for district and club benefit

5) From time to time, to publicize disaster status through the district newsletter and web site

6) To consider establishing a disaster response plan in the event of a disaster within district 7090

7) To report directly to the District Governor on all disaster related issues
