Call to Order: 8:48 am by Governor Kevin Crosby

Invocation: Jack Amico, IPDG, borrowed an invocation from President's Rep at PDG Pravin's District Conference, Ted Krazinski, "Disturb us Lord, whenwe have abundance, for playing it too safe, when we arrive too early, to dare more boldly.....to push back the horizons of our future......". He ended with, "Rotary and all of God's people are in our hands."

Introductions: All attendees announced their name, club and leadership role.

Treasurer's Report (see attached report): Mike Prinzbach

Mike indicated that his focus has been on getting year end June 30, 2015 done for auditors. He announced also that he can process checks today. He referred to the income statement and noted that it is under stated – that he just heard about some grant income journal entry adjustments that will affect it.

District Governor's Report (see attached): Kevin Crosby

DG Kevin shared some personnel updates reflected in his report. He also shared some of the information he is sharing with the clubs, specifically his leadership pyramid (inverted) which emphasizes that the District exists to help the clubs.

DG Kevin introduced Bob Wallace, PDG District 7070 and Assistant Rotary Coordinator for Zone 24 East. PDG Bob shared the leadership resources on the Zone 24 – 32 website. http://portal.clubrunner.ca/50077/SitePage/resources

Rotary Coordinators – Bob Wallace provides assistance to 3 districts. His job is to help the district, answer questions and help the district get access to staff and data at RI.

PDG Bob also noted that there is a blog on the website Great Ideas to Share. http://greatideastoshare.com/

• Update on Cheektowaga Club (now called Roundabout Rotary of Buffalo Niagara): Katie Biggie, President - Katie (soon to change her name to Fowler) reported on club activities. Noted that club contact hours are mostly done in direct service (projects twice monthly) and a monthly social. Next social is September 22nd. Service project next week – expect to have over 100 hours of direct service come end of December. She also noted that the club is getting lots of print news and generating interest for their social. Now doubled size from 4 to 8. Achieved gender parity with an average age of 32. Katie shared some photos and achievements year to date.

DG Kevin shared some Conference updates including, "Good news is that we are almost at room capacity; and in some cases workshop capacity." More from Greg Norton, Conference Chair, to come.

He also noted that we have transitioned to Zoom from Go To Meeting. Pene is the administrator for the 10 licenses. Contact Pene if you need a license to conduct a meeting.

DG Kevin shared a couple of his strategies that he is sharing during his club visits.

- 1. More collaboration among clubs especially as it relates to memberships.
- 2. Food Truck Model resources and services to clubs.

District Governor Elect's Report (see attached): Marlee Diehl

DGE Marlee indicated that she has spoken with Bill Clevette. He sends his "hello" to all and reiterated that based on the 4-Way Test, he believes his decision to not serve as DG was "beneficial to all".

DGE Marlee announced that the date for the DG Changeover next year is June 26, 2016, at the historic Tillman's Inn.

Directors' Reports:

Training Director (see attached): John Heise, PDG, Director PDG John referred to his report and made a couple of corrections in his report – Anne Bermingham is co-chair of Visioning – not Ralph. Also the date for MDPETS is March 4 and 5.

There was discussion regarding the Visioning team. It is recommended that the visioning exercise should proceed a strategic plan. As part of the visioning process – a champion/mentor will be assigned to help the clubs for 3 years. If the club has completed visioning already, but it has been a while, it is preferred to encourage them to do it again.

Membership Report (see attached report): Brian Carmichael, PDG, Director PDG Brian shared his monthly report. There was discussion regarding member reporting and RI invoices. Also noted in addition to his report, Membership will be sending questionnaire to clubs asking, "How can we help you?"

Mention of satellite clubs (RI definition - new club before a charter is issued allows them to operate as a club under the RI banner before the charter). Per Bob Wallace – it is a subset of an existing club that meets at a different time than the main club. It may at some time become its own club. There are 3 in his district - District 7070.

Also noted -50% of clubs have entered Club Central membership goals and identified a chairperson for the role.

Public Image Report (see attached report): Roseanne Morissette, Director Director Roseanne introduced her team – see report. She asked the Council if there were any suggestion regarding her next quarter goals.

DG Kevin mentioned clubs asking about help for Public Image services. Clubs have indicated that they would like help with the bigger Rotary message for the community. IPDG Jack noted that last year the clubs indicated needing help with press release writing. Director Roseanne indicated the team is ready to help in this capacity.

The Rotary Foundation Report (see attached report): Karen Oakes, PDG, Director Director Karen noted some key Rotary Foundation dates as in her report.

Youth Services Report (see attached report): Greg Norton, Director

Director Greg announced that there are 24 YE inbounds this year; the outbound YE students have all departed for points abroad. He also noted that his daughter is in Belgium; with this final transition, he has through all the stages of youth exchange.

Greg (who is also Chair of **District Conference**) segued into that by noting that Rotaract will have a sub-conference within our District Conference. Greg started with a Did You Know - 1919 was the year our District was formed? Did You Know - We were the first multi-country District. And, we have as our RI Representative – a Rotarian from District 3140 India.

As of today, we have broken 300 registrations (including exchange students). Our target is to reach 400. He noted that there are no rooms left at Holiday Valley Inn, 20 left at Tamarack. After that - it is off premises hotels.

Greg described some of the activities - Friday – Yodeler lodge/chalet. Lift chair, sponsored by Dr. Cappuccino. Friday evening – Halloween party – dress in costume. Friday night DJ Milk. Saturday gala – A List band. Speakers galore. Sessions galore. www.districtconference15.com. Need some more Did You Knows for Barb Ochterski. They will be displayed throughout the conference. Mostly missing club Did You Knows.

DG Kevin thanked Shefali Clerk – she was responsible getting sponsorship for the ski lift.

Service Project Report (see attached report): Melisa Schrock, Director

Her easy to remember email address is: www.rotarianforever@gmail.com. Getting to know all of us. Getting up to speed on her new role. Throwing IPDG Jack under the bus first. He did not quite give her the whole job responsibility. The good news is that she is eating the elephant one bite at the time. WCS is self-running. Mike Grimaldi is new chair of Vocational.

Food truck approach – has a presentation and would love to come to clubs with it. Can also do a Zoom presentation. Monthly newsletter is coming for Service Projects.

CRCID: Karen Oakes, PDG

PDG Karen announced that indeed the CRCID is dissolved effective December 31, 2015. She updated Council members on activities toward that end. She indicated that the Canadian government will continue to match 2 to 1 with the Gate Foundation also matching 2 to 1. Rotarian projects only. CCRID has agreed to funnel 1.2 million to Global Grants over 5 years.

Report to District Council September 12, 2015

This Rotary year began with five significant developments on our District's leadership team:

- With regret, we accepted the resignation of Bill Clevette as DGE due to personal reasons
- With a consensus of senior District leaders, DGN Marlee Diehl was promoted to DGE
- Area 12 AG Melisa Schrock replaced Willy Heidbuechel as Director of Service Projects
- Immediate Past President of the Lockport Rotary Club, Jackie Davis, was appointed AG for Area 12, replacing Melisa Schrock
- Roseanne Morissette replaced Paul McAfee as Director of Public Image. (Paul transferred to an E-club based in another District.)

Thank you to Marlee, Melisa, Jackie and Roseanne for stepping up to your new leadership positions.

In August, I began my club visits. As of 9/12/15, I will have visited 37 clubs. I have discovered that visiting clubs must be one of the best parts of the job of DG. I have enjoyed meeting the Rotarians in each club and learning about all the great work they are doing locally and internationally. Also, I've enjoyed the opportunity to meet with the Boards of the clubs. We have had some good discussions about challenges facing clubs and ways the District can be more helpful. During my presentation to clubs, I cite 8 strategies:

- 1. Encourage more collaboration among clubs in an Area; collaboration on recruiting, orienting new members, fundraising, public relations and service projects (local and international)
- 2. Adopt a "Food Truck" model for bringing District resources and educational programs to regions of the District; providing easier and more frequent access by clubs and their members
- 3. Leverage technology:
 - a. make greater use of Rotary Club Central for goal setting and tracking progress
 - b. make greater use of technology to provide educational programs to individuals and clubs
 - c. make greater use of technology for online meetings to eliminate travel and improve the frequency and effectiveness of communication (among District leaders and between the District and clubs)
 - d. make greater use of technology to improve clubs' access to useful tools and resources (e.g. best practices)
- 4. Encourage all Rotarians, and <u>especially new members</u>, to learn about the world of Rotary beyond their own club; promote the consistent use of good orientation programs for new members
- 5. Encourage innovation, focusing on engagement, not attendance
- 6. Promote expanded involvement in developing young leaders through EarlyAct, Interact, Rotaract, RYLA, Slapshot and Youth Exchange

- 7. Promote the use of long-term strategic planning, based on a well-articulated vision, at the club and District level and strongly encourage succession planning at the club and District level, focusing on the preparation of future leaders over time and active mentoring by incumbents;
- 8. Promote support for The Rotary Foundation and the PolioPlus program

After researching the various options available for online meeting applications, we made the decision to move from GoToMeeting (GTM) to Zoom, effective September 1. Our five GTM licenses cost the District \$245 per month. With Zoom, we will have 10 licenses for \$149 per month, for a savings of almost \$1,200 per year. Also, Zoom has some features we felt were superior to GTM. With our appreciation, Pene Hutton has accepted the role of administrator of our Zoom licenses. Anyone wishing to use a Zoom license should contact Pene with as much advance notice as possible.

Preparations for the 2015 District Conference continue. We have approximately 300 registrations to date and nearly all of the hotel rooms have been booked. Plans are also moving forward to have a Rotaract Conference on Saturday, October 24, during our District Conference. The RI President's Representative to our conference will be PDG Sajjan Goenka of Mumbai, India. Thank you to Rotarian Shefali Clerk and her husband, Harnath, for accepting the role of Aides to the RI President's Representative.

I have developed the first draft of a "District Dashboard" of metrics that will enable us to monitor our progress on key outcomes for the District (attached). This requires some explanation. I hope to schedule an online meeting with District leaders in September to discuss this measurement tool. It is a "work in progress."

TRAINING DIRECTOR REPORT

<u>District Training Assembly</u> (Anne Bermingham/Reg Madison)

As noted above, Reg Madison has agreed to co-chair this year's event with Anne, thus ensuring another great training assembly. This Rotary year it will be on May 7, 2016. It will be at the Niagara Falls Conference Center. You may recall that last year we held two assemblies, one on each side of the border. Total attendance was close to what we traditionally had at the previous single assemblies, so it was decided to return to the singular assembly. We have had our first meeting a week ago and will be seeking additional individuals to assist with the planning.

PETS (DGE Marlee Diehl, Ralph Montesanto, Brian Carmichael, and John Heise)

This is being planned by a committee. PETS 1 will occur this year prior to the MDPETS in Toronto. We are using a semi-food truck approach. There will be Saturday sessions on each side of the border and one evening session for PEs who could not attend a Saturday session.

Marlee, Brian, and Ralph have attended the first meeting of the MDPETS planning group. The sessions are planned for March 3 and 4, 2016. The sessions will be similar to those in the past.

Rotarian Orientation (Marie Bindeman)

A workshop has been scheduled for the District Conference titled, "Welcome to the Wide World of Rotary: An Informational Exchange for Nearly, New, and Renewing Rotarians" to be held on Friday afternoon, October 23, from 4:00-5:30 p.m.

After the conference, with our District Governor's recommendation and support, I (Marie) hope to organize a committee to plan a process for the design of prepackaged learning tools for use by individual clubs in training their newest members. These training tools will enable and encourage clubs to provide new members with the necessities to be more active and effective members. It will also provide a more flexible approach to training new members than seated pre-scheduled workshops.

Visioning (Barb Ochterski/Ralph Montesanto)

An October visioning session has been scheduled for the Amherst Rotary Club.

<u>Club Support Team</u> (Ralph Montesanto/John Heise)

The team is currently working with a club that is struggling. They have welcomed the team's support. A questionnaire for former and current members is being created. It is hoped that the results of the administration of this document will highlight some needed changes. Team members will be contacting the interviewees to complete the questionnaire.

The Membership Committee has revised the monthly Membership Report that is circulated to all AGs. The committee believes that this enhanced information will lead to more informed and engaged discussions at the Area President Meetings. It also provides District leaders with a very quick overview of progress and challenging situations. As some clubs begin to explore such alternatives as Satellite clubs we will need to add a column to the report so that District leaders are aware clubs that are exploring their options. 3 clubs have been chosen by RI to be a part of the latest RI initiative to look at the effect of introducing Innovative and Flexible alternatives to the traditional Rotary format. The 3 clubs are Welland, Olean, and Buffalo Sunrise

Realizing that it is the Club Membership Committee that is directly responsible for club growth and retention the District Membership Committee will be circulating a monthly e-mail to all ClubRunner registered Membership contacts. This email will offer tips and suggestions for growth and retention strategies that they might find helpful as well as offering an open line to discuss any Membership Challenges that occur.

The AG monthly Membership Report lists those clubs who have contacts and those clubs whose contact information is missing. The AGs have been asked to contact clubs who do not have a Membership person listing with the goal being to have a contact person by the time Council meets.

The late September newsletter will have 2 goals.

- 1) to share some relevant online resource sources
- 2) Ask the club membership contacts what they feel the District Membership Committee can do to help them achieve their goals.

As we develop the monthly e-mail we may need to have information that relates to both large and small clubs.

Again as we explore the role of the District Membership Committee we will need to develop a greater awareness at the club level of their own club's ability to retain new and existing members. These statistics are available at RI but the committee feels clubs are not generally aware of their performance in these two areas.

Attached is a copy of the report sent monthly to the AGs. Club membership goals are listed and if the club has posted a goal to Rotary Club Central then an "x" appears in the RCC column. The July 1 and current membership number is shown

along with the gains and loses. Gains and Loses are an indication of club membership activity. Finally the CR column indicates whether a club has designated a Membership Contact person in ClubRunner. The Membership Committee will be sending the monthly newsletter only to those clubs who have provided a contact.

She is President of the Rotary Club of Clarence this year. Chrissy has served at the District level for many years as Co-Chair of the former 7090 Public Relations Committee.

Tawnya Hartford is an experienced social media professional, has taught marketing and communications at Niagara College, works in marketing for the home electronics industry, and is Chair of Public Image for the Rotary Club of Niagara Falls Sunrise. She has assisted for many years with the Niagara Rotary clubs TV Auction.

Rachel Sandle, a new Rotarian, has a journalism and photography degree. She is Prevention Educator at the YWCA of the Niagara Frontier. Rachel also has her own professional photography business, Rachel Sandle Photography. Rachel serves on the Public Image Committee of the Rotary Club of Lockport.

Our Public Image Committee will be participating in two workshops at the upcoming District Conference, covering the basics of Public Image and Social Media. Please follow the District newsletter and website for more details

Plans are also underway for the delivery of various electronic Public Image Workshops throughout the year so Rotarians can learn and share from the comfort of their homes or offices - the "Food Truck" model of bringing training, information, and resources to the clubs and areas.

At the start of the Rotary year, our committee met to blue sky some goals for Public Image for the District. Below are the thought processes for accomplishments by June 2016 or within the next three years:

- all clubs in the District will know where Public Image resources can be found on the District 7090 website as well as RI website.
 - Strategy to work through the 17 Assistant Governors to communicate with the clubs in the District:
 - Encourage AGs to use RI videos as a way to build club understanding of the RI website.
- an outline or promotional calendar of important annual Public Image dates will be created for future District Governors and Public Image Chairs (i.e. media releases for incoming DGs, current year DGs, etc.)
 - Document dates for incoming DGs, District Conference, RYLA, Slapshot, VTT, and Youth Exchange.
 - Strategy to reach out to chairs and to Pene Hutton for important dates.
- a two- to three-year Public Image strategy will have been formulated by the Public Image Committee, which will be shared with all Rotary clubs at the District Assembly.
 - Review District Visioning document to see common threads.
 - Regional delivery/dissemination of information.
- Rotary District 7090's social media will have evolved to include Instagram to reach potential younger Rotarians.
 - Need to understand what we would want to accomplish with Instagram, i.e. tool to reach younger potential Rotarians; how it would work; expectations for clubs.
 - It may be preferable to focus on Twitter.
 - Currently, Tawnya is regularly posting to the District 7090 facebook page.
- thought-provoking articles about Rotary District 7090 and Rotary in general are being published on LinkedIn through our Rotary District 7090 page.
 - Notion of Thought Leadership. Internal (Clubs) and external (Public).
- public Image training sessions will be held at District Training Assembly, covering all the aspects of Public Image (not just social media).
 - Give thought to a one-hour training session at District Conference. Prepare an outline.
 - Regional delivery or dissemination of information/training. Four to six over the year. Two online. Four in person.
 - Return to traditional PR "PR 101".
- a Public Image blog will be added to the District 7090 website. This would have a public-facing focus and contributors from all Rotary clubs.
 - Roseanne to investigate this, working with Pene Hutton.
- a regular Public Image column will appear in the District newsletter highlighting tips and resources for our Rotary clubs.
 - Newsletter and website traditionally fell under Public Image. Some thought to working collaboratively with Pene Hutton in these areas to ensure consistency of brand/communications.

Further work will be done to refine these goals and thought processes with input from DG Kevin, the District Leadership team, the AGs, our Rotary clubs, and Public Image Committee members. Particular attention will be paid to the Rotary District 7090 Strategic Plan with Visioning document to ensure we are "on point" with District objectives.

District Grants Committee Report (2014-2015)

Chair John Teibert, 2014-2015 District Grants Chair

For the Rotary year just ended 24 clubs submitted a District Grant application. The total funds requested were \$43,756.38. After a detailed review of the applications, 22 were approved at \$40,856.38. These applications were received and approved prior to June 30, 2014.

In the 2014-2015 Rotary year it was up to the clubs to implement their projects. All of the clubs had success with their projects, but unfortunately only 20 were able to receive District Grants. The total of the grants disbursed was \$32,623. Reasons for the difference include clubs not requiring the funds and in some cases clubs making ineligible disbursements. Some education is required here.

For the 2015-2016 Rotary year another 24 grant applications were received, six were from clubs that did not submit an application the previous year. Of those applications 23 were approved with a value of \$41,252.

In preparation for this year's District Grant Management Seminar lessons learned from this year's processes - the application process and final report process – will be shared with the clubs with the hope that next year's process will be smoother.

INTRODUCING THE INACTIVATED POLIO VACCINE: DROPS ARE GOOD, A JAB OF CERTAINTY IS BETTER.

As part of the most ambitious, largest and fastest globally synchronized vaccine introduction in history, the inactivated polio vaccine (IPV) is being introduced by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) into routine immunization systems around the world in 2015 and 2016.

As a Rotarian, you'll well know that Rotary International is a partner in the GPEI, along with the World Health Organization (WHO), the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and national governments.

IPV is an injectable vaccine that is made up of heat-killed polio virus that cannot—under any circumstances—cause the disease because the pathogen is not alive. (Unlike the oral vaccine, which is made up of "attenuated" virus, which retains the ability to trigger an immune response but leaves a tiny chance of vaccine-derived infection.)

The introduction of IPV has already made great strides, with 20 countries adding the vaccine to their immunization schedules between January and July of this year alone, bringing the number of countries using the vaccine to 97. And the expected surge of introductions in the coming months will lead to over 75% of countries having at least one dose of IPV in their routine immunization systems by the end of October.

By the end of this year, all countries with the highest risk of wild polio virus or the emergence of vaccine-derived polio viruses (the highest priority categories for IPV introduction) will have completed the introduction. This will ensure that the most vulnerable children are given the best possible protection against polio.

And it's none too soon because as of September 2, 2015, two children have been paralyzed in the first polio outbreak in Europe for five years, according to the World Health Organization (WHO), and it is likely large numbers of other children have also been infected without developing symptoms. Both cases were in Ukraine where only half the children are fully immunized. The WHO said the risk of the virus spreading further in the country is high and that the outbreak needs to be rapidly controlled. The outbreak started from the weakened form of the virus that is used in vaccination. Sometimes it can mutate and start to spread if immunization levels are too low. This is exactly the problem that the introduction of IPV will solve!

As Rotarians—at both our District 7090 and Club levels—we have made tremendous progress in eradicating polio from the face of the earth. We made a promise to the children of the world. And Brothers & Sisters in Rotary, we are "this close" to fulfilling our promise.

- Does not qualify for charitable designation as it does not implement projects nor receive administrative support from Rotary.
- 100% dependent upon the Government of Canada for funding to continue in existence.

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

As you may be aware, the Canadian Rotary Collaboration for International Development (CRCID) is completing its final projects after almost 30 years of serving Canadian Rotary clubs and districts. CRCID has been very successful but in consultation with the Government of Canada it was felt that a new model reflecting the current status of international humanitarian aid was needed. I wish to congratulate CRCID on its excellent service to ensuring Canadian Rotarians had the support they needed.

You may have seen the News Release by Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (DFATD) on the 1 Aug that outlined two new plans – one for the matching of funds donated by Canadian Rotarians to the Polio Eradication Initiative. The other was a new funding model from the Canadian Government to Rotarian international projects.

The Rotary Foundation (Canada) has entered into a new agreement with DFATD. The senior staff at DFATD have reviewed the Global Grant model of TRF and are impressed by the needs assessments, evaluations, reporting mechanisms, stewardship and sustainability of our structure. The new agreement will use the Global Grant (GG) structure as its basis and allow clubs and districts access to Canadian Government funds for their projects. These funds will qualify for a World Fund match from TRF.

The agreement is for 5 years and the Canadian Government is contributing CDN \$1.2 million/year to Canadian Rotary projects.

A committee of TRF Canada is currently working through the final details of how the new funding model will work. We will then start to inform Rotarians, Clubs and Districts how they can access these funds. It is felt that the new model will be available to all Canadian Rotary club & district projects that meet the criteria that will be outlined.

I want to thank all of you for without your support this agreement would not have been achieved. You advocated for government support for our Rotary programs – specifically PolioPlus – and the government listened. They understand the value of what Rotary can achieve and are willing to support our projects.

I ask you to be patient as we finish the final details and then we will let all of you know how these government funds can be accessed.
