Oneonta Rotary — Christmas time was a busy one for Oneonta. Operation Warm is an annual event which purchases new winter coats for pre-preschoolers and early elementary students in partnership with Head Start and the Oneonta School District. This year's project was done in collaboration with a grant from the district foundation.

The AA Christmas project annually purchases Christmas presents for 16 low income families. Rotarians in an annual competition with the Kiwanis Club rang bells for the Salvation Army to raise money for its programs. In January, the Ross Cordell/Rotary Wrestling Tournament was held with many high school wrestling teams competing in the tournament. March is the RYLA kickoff. April will find Rotarians doing Adopt-a-Highway along I88 and the annual Memorial Walkway will clean up in our local park and is the "President's project"! **RYLA** applicants' kickoff is in March.

Richfield Springs Rotary — The Wreath sales fund raiser was in November. The funds from the wreath sale are used for the Senior Dinner which was held Feb 18, at the Richfield Springs school cafeteria. A turkey dinner with all of the fixings was served. There was no charge to the senior citizens.

Area business owners and Rotarians donated door prizes. High school students volunteer to help with serving. The time students volunteer goes toward their school mandated community service. It's called co-operative efforts!! Every month Rotarians collect food for their local Food Bank and then work one Saturday at it.

Morris Rotary serves two school districts-Morris and Gilbertsville-Mt. Upton. Each Fall they host a "Meet the Teachers" dinner where all the Rotarians meet and greet all the new teachers at each school. It's a great night of sharing and getting to know who their kids work with daily.



Energetic exchange student Gaby Machado (left) and her partner-in-crime Vicki Pegg (wife of Rotarian Patrick) did an outstanding job organizing a local team to enter the 22nd annual Polar Ice Plunge at Goodyear Lake February 18th. When we last saw Gaby at Rotary, it was just the two of them who planned to jump. By the day of the actual plunge, the group had grown to ten (five of them MCS students/teachers) and they had raised over



\$2,000 for the charity event. In all, some 230 jumpers collected \$128,400 of the charity. Vicki called it "invigorating"; we haven't gotten Gaby's once-in-a-lifetime reaction. Thanks to Morris Rotarian **Beth Child** for taking the pic-

tures (and, yes, that's son Ben exhibiting his family's "Service Above Self" as he's surrounded by young ladies.

Gaby even made news in The Daily Star. The Bright Side reporter wrote: A 10-person contingent from Morris jumped as the American-Brazilian team, so named because Morris exchange student Gaby Machado, 18, of Brazil, wanted to try the PBJ. Saying, "In Brazil we have just warm weather," Machado described jumping as "awesome" and said, "It's the best experience of my life."

Morris Rotary also has many winter projects that serve over 90 Butternut Valley citizens with food baskets, fruit baskets and clothing during the holidays. They go caroling and visiting members of their communities who reside in the area nursing/resident homes now. They usually have a very successful Chicken BBQ for Superbowl Sunday. The chickens cooking outside do not let you walk past without purchasing. They also send four students to RYLA.

Edmeston Rotary has been busy since the Fall. It all started with their Rotary Community Corps! "**Spookfest**" is a town-wide celebration and lots of fun. Pumpkins are available for painting, there is a Chinese Auction and vendors sell their goods before we lose the fine weather. The **Christmas giveaway** is a major event in which residents are invited to come go through the clothing that has been donated, many receive large food boxes and folks are allowed to choose gifts for their children. They sold over 200 **planter buckets** in their area last year which folks filled with flowers to make the make the community a blooming picture. Their hopes are that this year everyone will fill the buckets again and continue the tradition. They are looking into how to help their **Food Bank** and are planning on upgrading the Burlington Flats basketball court so local kids can play. The **Edmeston Robotics Team** is a huge success and they just finished competition in Albany.

Cooperstown Rotary — Rotarians enjoyed a wonderful enthusiastic **concert** by all the kindergartners that came to sing at their meeting in December. An Election Day **Pancake Day** was a big success and not to miss next year... all day breakfast!! Their huge event, **Spring Fling**, is scheduled for May 20 and 21 in Cooperstown. It's a village-wide celebration with vendors of all kinds, music, games and just plain fun. Mark your calendars.

Milford Rotary — Rotarians have been busy selling a **Community Calendar** that has everyone's birthdays, in memoriam dates and anniversaries on it. It's a major effort selling and then delivering them. We had our annual **Santa Parade** in December with about 100 people greeting Santa, singing carols, decorating cookies and enjoying goodies and talking to each other. **Poinsettias** were delivered while visiting many of the folks who are alone in the Milford area during the holidays. **Adopt-a-Highway** is done 4 times a year and the 2 mile stretch of Route 28 is clean! Spring **flower sales** are next...

Applications for District Grants

ust a reminder that applications for 2017-18 District Grants are now being accepted for community and international projects. Up to \$2500 can be awarded for projects in your community and up to \$5,000 for an international project. The applications are due no later than May 31st and can be found on the district website: Rotarydistrict7170.org – on the right side of the home page.

In order to qualify for a grant your club must have a \$50 per capita combined giving to the TRF Annual Fund and Polioplus as of June 30, 2017. This is \$15 higher than last year.! And at least one individual from your club must attend **one** of the upcoming grants management seminars - April 1st in Oneonta and April 8th in Dryden prior to submitting the proposal. Registration for these seminars will be posted at a later date on the website.

Incomplete applications will not be accepted – nor will any application submitted by a club whose previous year's project report is due. Please refer to the Terms and Conditions for further requirements on the application.

Scholarship Report

Dear Rotary,

An interesting component of the second year of my graduate program is a capstone project intended to provide students the opportunity to work as a team with a client organization on a policy related project. My team partnered with Findeter, a regional development bank in Bogota, Colombia to work on a project assessing whether their newly developed Intermediate Cities Index successfully measured sustainable urban development.

Approximately 54% of the global population lives in cities and this number is expected to increase to about 70% according to UN estimates. This rapid urbanization is more apparent in intermediate cities (cities containing population between 100,000 to 2 million). Rapid and unplanned urban growth has negative impacts such as concentrated poverty, strain on access to basic services, and environmental consequences. There is an urgent need to promote sustainable urban development and implement policies that address some of the negative consequences that result from rapid urbanization. Therefore, Findeter's newly developed Intermediate Cities Index is one of many indices developed by international organizations and private companies to monitor urban growth and produce evidence-based policies specifically for that purpose.

Our project began in October when we met as a team to discuss the objective of the project and outlined the specific activities we would undertake to successfully complete this work. Our work had several major components: 1) a comparative analysis of other indices measuring urban development compared with the Findeter's index 2) quantitative analysis whether the index was a robust metric and policy tool and 3) recommendations.

What I enjoyed most about working on this project was the teamwork. It was a rather interesting and challenging exercise to incorporate diverse perspectives in carrying out our work. We had a very supportive team and we held workshops to teach other new skills and methodologies, we held working sessions to write chapters of the report, and we came together to hold meetings with our client throughout the year.

This past week we travelled to Colombia to present our project to Findeter and engage in a panel discussion with organizations like UN Habitat and Colombian city foundations working on producing indices. We presented our findings and discussed how the Intermediate Cities Index could be improved to contribute to the country's policy-making agenda in regard to ensuring sustainable urban growth and development. It was a special experience to work on a project and be able to travel to the country to engage with the client and see first-hand urban development in the country. More importantly, I am grateful for my team and this experience. It taught me the beauty of working together.




