The Rotary Season:

We are in the middle of what some say is the Rotary season. The DGE is busy organizing all of our training programs, getting the committees formed, developing a schedule for club visits and setting the stage for club and district goals. Below Dave will report on the recent President Elect Training Session where we were fortunate to hear directly from the President Elect of Rotary International, Mark Maloney, and many other great presenters. These events are great for networking and raising our sights on our potential to create lasting change.

The DG is working on the District Conference, meeting with community and business leaders, organizing another round of club visits and finishing up many loose ends like the development of an environmental sustainability strategy for the district and the formation of more community and Rotary collaborations on our

greatest needs and opportunities.

The DG Track: What is This?

The district provides for a quarterly meeting of the District Advisory Committee to provide advice and continuity to the DG Track: DGND, DGN, DGE and DG. The Advisory committee is comprised of PDGs, AGs and others.

This year the DG track decided to also meet on a monthly basis. There is an unprecedented level of change taking place in Rotary and in our communities. The DG track needed more time to address the changes and improve our organization. We have been selecting committee members, developing position descriptions, reviewing upcoming events, sharing perspectives on issues and opportunities and trying to make the DG track positions easier in the future. You do not need to be retired to be a District Governor.

Some of the issues we discuss are difficult. How hamton University is conducting a run/walk do we help Rotary in our District be attractive to all generations? What are the major needs in our District? When do we collaborate across clubs and community organizations to make a greater impact? How should we update the strategic plan for our District?

Members and clubs can submit issues and new ideas to any member of the DG track. We will do our best to address your thoughts.

April is Maternal and Child Health:

Maternal and Child Health is a Rotary Focus area around the globe and in our community. Other focus areas like Water and Sanitation and Community Development provide support.

Our District provided funding to the JHoole project in India to empower women to make money for their families through sewing. This project today offers clothing and scarves around the world. We are buying 300 Rotary Shirts for the District conference. Sales of these shirts promote Rotary, support the women in India and support the Rotary Foundation. This project would not have happened without the dedication of a young and energetic woman, Hannah Warren. I am pleased to announce that Hannah will be telling her story at our District Conference. She will also have some beautiful scarves for sale.

Shelter Box:

When you are District Governor you will receive many calls for support around the world. The latest is for the countries of Malawi, Mozambique and Zimbabwe. South Africa was hit by Cyclone Idai and the flooding is very extreme. Shelter Box is a partner of Rotary that provides emergency supplies and shelter. They are setting up to do a needs assessment of the region and start the process of recovery.

Shelter Box has been urging Rotary clubs and Districts around the world for support. We will have the latest version of shelter box on display at the District Conference. The Binghamton Noon club has been raising funds to purchase shelter boxes. And their Rotaract club at Bing-

event on the campus on April 6. See flyer below. Supporting this event is one fun way to support ShelterBox and Rotaract.

ShelterBox and Rotary work together to shelter families after disaster by providing emergency shelter and tools for families robbed of their homes by disaster or conflict, transforming despair into hope. Currently around 85 million people across the globe are without a place to call home. Not all of these disasters make the news but all of them devastate people's lives.

Our District currently has two older ShelterBox kits we have been using to raise awareness. Some, or part of the equipment, has been displayed, along with literature, in Unadilla by the Boy Scouts for their Unadilla Days, at the Dryden Dairy Day for several years, last year in Ithaca for the 4th of July fireworks, and at many **District Conferences**

Currently PDG Sam Kourey (Oneonta Rotary) and DGND Evan Kurtz (Dryden Rotary) are coordinating District's support of ShelterBox but we need a co-chair, a ShelterBox ambassador. Contact DGND Evan for details on training and expectations.

ShelterBox, started by Rotarians in England, is now its own entity, and a formal Rotary partner. This partnership allows Rotarians to do more for the world, more to help those in immediate need.



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RI Forms a Fund to Provide Emergency Aid:

In response to emergency relief, The Rotary Foundation recently established a new single support fund to receive contributions for disasters that strike around the world. Entitled The Rotary Disaster Response Fund, staff in Programs and Grants will reach out to the affected areas and their districts to assess the need and desire for funding. Upon a qualified response much like a district grant – the district will be awarded grants in increments of up to \$25,000, consulting the TRF chair as needed. Only districts in the affected country may request a grant. These districts can apply for more than one grant and should some of the allocation not Interact Clubs: be used – the funds will be returned to the Disaster Fund. Should requests exceed available funds, the General Secretary of RI will triage requests until additional funds are available.

(The fund will accept DDF contributions and those in cash will be credited towards a club's Annual Giving Goal and per capita giving calculations. However the donations will NOT apply to SHARE or the DDF calculation.)

Your contribution to The Rotary Foundation and their new fund exemplifies RI's mission to provide service to others, promote integrity, and advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through its fellowship of business, professional and community leaders. Thank

The Groton Interact students are partnering with Cravola for "Crayola Color-Cycle". It is a pro-

gram designed to repurpose used markers instead of sending them to landfills. The markers are put through plastic conversion technologies in order to produce wax compounds for asphalt and roofing shingles, in addition to making energy to heat homes, cook food and power vehicles. All markers, of any brand, including dry erase and highlighters are accepted.

We will set up a table at the District Conference to collect markers for the Groton Interact Club. Please forward other Interact stories and projects. This project will be part of our Environmental Sustainability strategy. Please promote with your Interact clubs as well as your club.

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Rotary Sal-wites Edmeston Robotics Achievements

The 19 members of the *Edmeston Rotary Club* have learned first-hand the power of Rotary's District Community Grants program.

In 2015-2016, Edmeston Superintendent of Schools Brian Hunt came to the club and expressed his desire to create a robotics club at his small, rural school district. Edmeston Rotary president Martin Winsor responded by applying to District 7170 for a \$2,500 grant. When combined with the club's contribution of \$500, the superintendent's goal of \$3,000 in seed-money was realized.

Superintendent Hunt was impressed with the challenges that the *FIRST* robotics system offers students of all ages. *FIRST* was founded by inventor Dean Kamen on March 20, 1989 – the same month Tim Berners-Lee created the World Wide Web. *FIRST*, an international competition with 3,790 registered teams in 2019, is an acronym representing the phrase *For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology*. The thought was to offer "the excitement of sport, the rigors of science".



The FIRST website explains: High school-aged teams compete head-to-head on a special playing field with robots they have designed, built, and programmed. Under strict rules, limited resources, and the guidance of volunteer mentors including engineers, teachers, business professionals, parents, alumni and more, teams of students build and program robots to perform challenging tasks against a field of competitors. They must also raise funds, design a team "brand," hone teamwork skills, and perform community outreach. In addition to learning valuable STEM and life skills, participants are eligible to apply for \$80 million in college scholarships.

With Rotary's funds, Hunt started a *FIRST* Lego League for middle school students and a *FIRST* Robotics Team for high school students. The Edmeston school district has approximately 387 students in grades K-12. *FIRST* programs are usually found in much larger school districts. In fact, a *FIRST* program can be sponsored through BOCES so a single team can draw talent from multiple neighboring districts.

The official "challenge" changes each year. Once that season's rules and specifics are issued by the *FIRST* organizers the individual teams have about six weeks to work feverishly to design, build, and refine their robots before the competitions begin.

The current Edmeston high school team - *FIRST* Robotics Team 5585, nicknamed "Blood, Sweat & Gears" - competed recently at the Central New York *FIRST* Robotics Regional Competition at SUNY Poly in Utica, New York. During the course of the competition, they went from a low ranking to become a highly-respected defensive powerhouse. Team 5585 finished near the top of the field of 31 teams and qualified to compete in the World Championships in Detroit in late-April.

Like the mighty oak that grows from a tiny acorn, we all know that most projects start with an idea (plus a fair measure of determination). In the case of Edmeston, NY, thanks to the local Rotary Club and a Community Grant from Rotary District 7170, that "idea" has evolved into immense community pride. And when word of the team's accomplishments reached Superintendent Hunt,

now an administrator with the much larger Voohreesville school district near Albany, he promptly sent a generous check to help fund the Edmeston team's upcoming trip to Detroit.

PETS Was A Success

Rotary Feeding the Hungry

Over 200 incoming Rotary Club Presidents and key personnel were in Syracuse on March 15th

and 16th to receive training for their upcoming responsibilities. This training program will reach over one-half of Upstate New York. To start the event, over 80 Rotary volunteers met ton Syracuse University Hotel and Conference Center to pack 24,000 individual meals. These meals will be evenly divided among the Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York, the Food Bank of the Southern Tier, the Food Bank of Central New York and Foodlink, Inc and help to feed the hungry of the Upstate Area. Rotary collaborates with partners in order to make a bigger difference. Individuals, organizations and businesses willing to support this project can make donations to their local Food Banks. The Foodbanks are well known throughout the Upstate region. They provide critical nutrition to children, adults and families in need. They are a critical part of our social infrastructure and an excellent partner for Rotary.

There are 198 Rotary Clubs in the Upstate New York with a total of 5879 members. Around the world there are 35,000 clubs with approximately of 1,206,500 members. Rotary has a presence in over 200 countries. Each club is unique, and most members join to serve their local communities. Action items can include support to non-profits, scholarships, leadership training for our youth, student exchanges with other countries, capital improvements and collaboration on tougher issues in our communities. **Learn more at Rotary.org**

To maximize our performance, Rotary provides business level education on a variety of topics including strategic planning, public image, information technology, public speaking, community needs assessments and many more. All Rotary Clubs are interconnected across the globe and we can often tackle challenges governments cannot.

Our largest international challenge is the eradication of polio. Starting over three decades ago and working with our many partners, such as the World Health Organization and the Gates Foundation, Rotary has inoculated over 2.5 billion children. We are very close to eradicating this dreadful disease. The process and contacts developed for this program are being applied to other major health challenges.

The Rotary Foundation was formed in 1917 with a check for \$26.50. Today it is consistently rated as one of the top humanitarian organizations in the world. The foundation has six major areas of focus:
