





May is Youth Service Month in the Rotary world. The COVID-19 pandemic has been exceptionally hard on our District's youth programs. The Annual RYLA program was the first to be cancelled. Next came the closing of our schools and colleges which impacted Rotaract and Interact programs. Finally, the District's flagship youth program, Youth Exchange, has been disrupted. At this writing, 15 inbound students have gone home early, and 12 outbound students have come home early. What kind of impact this will all have on our youth programs in the future remains to be seen. Hopefully, these programs, which we depend on to help form the next generation of Rotarians, will rebound and be stronger than ever as we hope will be true of Rotary.

Last month I spent several evenings making personal phone calls to all our club Presidents. I wanted to find out if any of their members had contracted the coronavirus. Only one President reported one case of COVID-19 and that person had recuperated. I was also interested in how the club members were keeping in touch with each other. I did not find any clubs that had "gone dark". Many were doing virtual meetings with programs such as Zoom or at least communicating with each other by email or phone. If your club is doing Zoom meetings, invite other clubs to join you. I also wanted to find out what kind of activities the clubs were doing to help their communities. With the help of DGE Matt, we compiled a list of these activities which I sent out to all District Rotarians on April 13th. Hopefully this list was of value to you. I am extremely proud of what all our clubs are doing in this time of crisis. Don't forget to look at the new "Volunteer Surge" program for something you can do yourself from your own home.

On April 15^{th} , the District Finance Committee

held a Zoom meeting to discuss possible actions that the District could take to help in this time of need. Three decisions were made. DDF funds were transferred to the Rotary International Disaster Fund, working with the **Broome County United Way and Senator** Akshar's office a donation was made to purchase medical masks for essential workers across our District and contributions were made to the three food banks which service our District. Zoe has sent out details of these contributions in a separate email. If your community has needs at this time because of COVID-19, please let me know. The District can provide more help this year because we will have more reserved funds than budgeted for as a result of cancelled events.

On Saturday, April 18th Cindy Burger hosted our annual District Grants Seminar. The seminar was done as a Zoom conference, the first on-line training session we have tried. It was an amazing success. Sixty seven Rotarians took part in the one-hour session. Congratulations Cindy for a great job. There will be between \$29,000 and \$30,000 available for District Community and International grants in 2020-2019. These Community Grants are possible because of money contributed to the Annual Fund three years ago. Funds contributed to the Annual Fund this year will be available for use in Rotary year 2022-2023. Please contribute during the last two months of the 2019-2020 year.

The Endicott Rotarians collecting food for the needy Union Endicott student families during this pandemic crisis.

The Endicott Rotary Foundation has donated \$2866.02 thus far of the proposed ten thousand dollars for the upcoming weeks of food distribution for the Union Endicott School System.

It helps to have the school superintendent, two assistant superintendents in our Rotary club to make sure that appropriate families get this food in need. Sam Lupo of Lupo's and Sons is also a Rotarian and he was instrumental in the food purchase arrangements.

The food was purchased from Sam's Club for this purpose and they donated multiple cases of bottled water to add to our cause.

The first batch of protective face shields were delivered to Greene EMS April 4th. Greene MS/HS Teacher Jonathan Bogardus is using the 3D Printer that *Greene Rotary Club* purchased for the school, to manufacture full face shields for use by our local EMS First Responders. These face shields are an item that NYS has advised EMS providers to utilize, but there are no current supply lines available for them to obtain them from.

Jon Bogardus is going to continue producing the face shields, at a rate of 1 per hour, until his material supply runs out. He currently has enough materials to make approximately 57 such face shields.







'7 Runs, 7 Counties, 7 Days'

The world has changed since the initial proposal was made for Rotarians from around our District to come together in June to fundraise for 'End Polio Now'.

The original concept wasn't coming together for various reasons so here is 'Plan B'

Each event; which is a walk, jog, or run, will be an 'out and back'. You go outbound for 20 minutes, turn around, and come back. This way everyone starts, and finishes, together! Rotary apparel is a plus!

This will still be a fundraiser for 'End Polio Now'. So, why not for Covid19? With Rotary's support as a partner, the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), which includes PolioPlus, is currently employing thousands of health workers to address the pandemic. In the coming months GPEI will be offering its tools, workforce, and extensive surveillance network to support countries around the world. GPEI is deploying its coordination mechanisms such as emergency operations centers and sharing physical assets like vehicles, computers and mobile phones to help combat the pandemic.

By contributing to this you address polio, the Covid-19 pandemic, as well as future needs.

Crime Victim Assistance Center's Safe Harbour Program works with partners across Broome County to promote awareness & identification of youth trafficking, and provides comprehensive services to potential victims of commercial sexual exploitation. Our services are growing on a daily basis and we are currently looking for partners in the community to help us succeed in our goal of keeping children safe and providing them with basic needs and necessary resources.

CVAC volunteers generally fill two vital roles; answering our 24/7 support line, and providing medical advocacy to the local area hospitals. To do so, volunteers must apply and be able to complete our 40- hour rape crisis counselor training. Upon completion, volunteers will become certified NYS Rape Crisis Counselors through the Department of Health. Trainings are generally offered in the fall and the spring, and occasionally in the summer.
