Summer Ends and Fall Begins

That was a fast summer. Hope you had the opportunity to enjoy the many events that take place in our area. August is a busy month for the District. There are many club events, our district and international grants are approved and our exciting exchange student program gets underway. August is also membership month and we are all working on ways to make Rotary attractive and diverse. Rotary is a very important force in our communities and in the world. Service above self is needed today more than ever. We should be proud of our organization and looking for ways to increase our impact in an ever-changing world.

The August issue of The Rotarian has a great article on membership. The article covers all facets of building membership. The article notes that if you want to attract Young Professionals, you have to go to where they are. This year our District is a sponsor of the Young Professional Summit that will be held in Binghamton on September 14. When you go to the web site for the Greater Binghamton Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Wheel will be visible.

September happens to be **New Generations Month**. This is a great time to think about the younger generations in our community and how we connect to them. We have four great programs to start with: Student Exchange, RYLA, Interact and Rotaract. Nurturing a strong pres-

ence in our schools through these programs instills an appreciation with the students, the schools and the parents. Over the many years we have operated these programs we have built up a significant set of contacts.

Many clubs also offer scholarships, provide mentoring and use Interact and Rotaract participants to assist in club and community projects. Promoting these joint projects provides recognition to the students and Rotary. Supporting student and Young Professional events is another way to build our influence.

<u>September 8 is World Literacy Day</u>. There are several club projects that promote literacy from the children's book program in Groton (get correct name), mentoring, book programs and early education. Age 0 to 3 is a very important time in the intellectual development of a child. Jesse Katen, Past President of the Binghamton Noon Rotary Club and Chair of Education and Literacy is developing a guest viewpoint for Education Day.

<u>Flooding</u>: Many of our communities suffered from recent flooding. Some clubs are assessing damages to see if support is warranted. The District would be interested in receiving club reports on this topic and any ideas for consideration. **District Goal 3**: In the last two newsletters we introduced 2 District goals:

<u>District goal 1</u>: promote and support our clubs and communities

<u>District goal 2</u>: help clubs, communities, the District and Rotary International manage change

<u>District goal 3</u> is to "increase our international presence". Clubs are already increasing our international presence in many ways:

- Clubs are increasing use of International and Global Grants. The rather new international grants are much simpler to develop.
- Clubs are learning to develop holistic community plans in concert with members of the communities they are striving to help.
- Clubs are learning to collaborate within Rotary and beyond to make a greater impact. A great example is the Health for Haiti program at SUNY Broome which is on its fifth year. Collaboration is taking place in our own District and in Haiti to create a sustained focus that is changing lives and making a significant progress. The students involved in this accredited course believe it to be a "life changing" experience.
- Clubs and the District are supporting Global Grants developed by others. Sometimes the simplest solution is to support a project that has been developed by others
- Our own Global Grant on Opioid abuse in our District requires the cooperation of international partners. This Global Grant is developing a new approach to improving the wellbeing of our communities. Related topics such as foster care and sex trafficking are already in our sights.
- The Ithaca club demonstrated immediate response to international tragedies with their work in Puerto Rico. They have developed new ways of increasing funds for their work.
- Some of our clubs like Hancock Rotary have maintained an international partnership for decades.
- PDG Richard has introduced his Japanese culture to our District through is actions

and through his unique Japanese Tree Peony project.

We are just scratching the surface of what can be accomplished. Our noted student exchange program opens up our contacts to many countries. Our eleven colleges and Universities have tremendous international contacts and in some cases are leading authorities on important topics such as growth opportunities for developing countries. Our own Polio Plus program demonstrates the value of a sustained focus. Our emerging District strategy for environmental sustainability reminds us that across the globe we are all in this together.

<u>Celebration Zone</u>: Celebration Zone starts September 29th in Erie Pennsylvania. This event is a forum to train the DGE and key committee leaders.

A question for every Rotarian – do you contribute to The Rotary Foundation (TRF)? Whether you do or don't, are you aware that some of your donation is returned to our District three years later?

Each year our District learns how much money will be coming back from the donations we made three years earlier. Our 44 clubs then apply to our District Grants Committee for grants to fund local or international projects.

I encourage every Rotarian to look for opportunities in their community that could benefit from a \$500 to \$2,500 grant. Think about local organizations that have needs that their own budgets are not able to cover. Do you belong to other groups besides Rotary? How would a Rotary grant support their missions?

The local projects we have approved for 2018-2019 include assisting the hearing impaired and the physically challenged, improving spaces for youth mentoring and community gathering, purchasing new equipment for fire departments and a food pantry, providing food and hygiene items for youth, and replacing trees.

Our District grants fund projects in other countries. The Grants Committee approved grants to four projects for this year – school desks in Liberia, a marketplace roof in Ghana, a water system fence in Haiti and classrooms in Lesotho. International grants can range from \$1,000 to \$5,000.

In addition to the local and international projects that we fund, our clubs and District can participate in Global Grants. These are projects that involve clubs or districts in at least two countries. This means that a large project in your community (minimum budget of \$30,000) can qualify for a Global Grant if your club can identify a club or district in another country that will work with you.
