(cont from page 1)... "On January 8, I had the privilege of attending IA with my wife Peggy. We each were presented with schedules for the next five days which included attendance at two general sessions each day and two-to-three break-out sessions. In the evening we had special functions such as: a Scottish Cielidh to celebrate the elevation of Gordon McInally from Scotland as the next RI President; a culture night to celebrate the richness of traditions among the 491 DGEs from 200 countries in attendance; and a formal banquet on the last night.

In our sessions, we discussed many interesting topics: The Rotary Action Plan; what members want; creating a welcoming environment in our clubs and districts; the impact of our service; building a team; the value of partnerships; Rotary's commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion; storytelling to enhance Rotary's public image; and being a change leader. A lot of weighty topics for sure that we came prepared to discuss thanks to on-line learning courses and a Governors Elect Training School we had taken in advance of Orlando. The facilitated

discussions at IA with peers from around the world were quite engaging, and many new friendships resulted.

I returned to the Hudson Valley with a notebook full of goals and thoughts on changes appropriate for our District 7210. I look forward to sharing these with the District Leadership and our clubs. And I am humbled – and now prepared – to be a part of leadership for the 2023-2024 Rotary year."

PDG TONY MARMO SAYS:

We were fortunate to have Rotary International President Nominee Stephanie Urchick and Past District Governor Tom Gump present a seminar on January 21st to club leaders from D7210 and D7450 (Greater Philadelphia). Their topic of Club Culture Transformation

was especially relevant in the post pandemic Rotary world. Many clubs have experienced declining attendance at meetings and service projects.

Engagement is difficult and attracting new member has also proved challenging. Stephanie and Tom emphasized that club leaders have to start the dialogue with their clubs about this societal change of culture, and what can be done to attract more Rotarians and engage our current members fully. What we have done in the past to lead our clubs is not exactly the formula for the present day and future. What is the member experience like in your club? How can we engage our new members to make sure they become long term Rotarians? Club leaders need to Assess, Design, Build, Implement, and Sustain a new club model, if necessary. Diversity, Equity and Inclusion should also be considered when attempting to make your club reflect the community population.

Another strong consideration should be given to starting satellite clubs to provide more flexibility for meeting times and dates. Club leaders should be communicating and discussing these potential changes with their members and getting buy in as move forward. Use of social media, radio, newspapers, community forums is a great way to get the Rotary message of "Service Above Self" out there. And finally, Stephanie and Tom emphasized that " an active club is an attractive club "

Bring emerging leaders into your club

New leaders are always emerging. They live in your community. They are eager to contribute. Younger professionals could make great Rotary members, but to bring them into our clubs, we first have to understand them. This is essential for Rotary.

They want to build a solid network and learn from mentors, from people with clout and experience. That's us. Few organizations span generations and professions and build personal connections the way that Rotary does. We blend tradition with innovation and use trust and respect to close the generation gap.
