



Our annual District Conference is a time when every club in the district is encouraged to submit an entry for

one of the awards that will be presented during the weekend of events that are planned. A special new category has been added by DG Frank this year: The Governor's Citation. Clubs will be nominated by the Assistant Governor, and ALL clubs should be striving to achieve this award. It will be based on the following criteria:

- 1. One new member inducted this year
- 2. Participation in The Rotary Foundation (i.e., club donation, individual donations, grant project)
- Participation in a community project
  Participation in a cooperative project with another Rotary club(s)

Additional awards include many of those that have become traditional in District 7470, including:

Five Avenues of Service Club Display Boards: Bring a tabletop display promoting or demonstrating your club's activity for ONE each of the five avenues of service. These include Community Service, Club Service, Vocational Service, International Service, and Youth Service. Clubs are limited to one display per avenue of service per club. Five awards will be presented, one for each Avenue of Service based upon the information on the display. Poster Board must be no larger than a maximum size of 48"x36".

**Club Newsletter Awards:** How to apply: Bring copies of your 6 best newsletters. Following categories will be recognized:

Best Club Newsletter – Overall Best Club Newsletter – Rotary Content Best Club Newsletter – Overall Content Best Club Newsletter – Format Most Improved Club Newsletter (from start of Rotary year until District Conference)

# Membership Development/Recruitment

**/Promotion:** Submit a cop of your membership plan. What did you do? Did it work? Did you have an event and, if so, describe what your club did and how it impacted membership.

**Best Public Relations:** Submit a display of your press clippings, printouts of e-news coverage, videos of cable TV coverage, etc. Maximum size is a 48"x36" display on poster board.

**Club History:** Be creative and submit whatever best depicts your club history. This could be scrapbooks, photo albums, posters, etc. If using poster board, maximum size 48"x36".

**Best Conference Attendance – Overall:** No application process. This award will be based upon registration statistics.

Best Conference Attendance-Percentage of Total Members: No application process. Award will be given based upon registration statistics.

Our District Conference is just a little over a month away, and all clubs are encouraged to start planning to apply for these awards NOW. The awards are a highlight of the conference each year, and we look forward to lots of entries and some spirited competition!!

## "Heart Beat" - News from Gift of Life

Fifteen year-old, Joseph Fajardo of gift life Panama, is our Gift of Life program's most recent success

story. Joseph & his mom, Maria, arrived in NJ in early January and were graciously hosted and loved by Morris Plains Rotarian, Ed Malicki, his wife Elsie and daughter Desiree Arroyo for the next 8 weeks (Ed & Desiree are both trustees of the GOL program).





Since birth, Joseph's family was told there was nothing that could be done for his congenital heart defect, but the family refused to give up hope. Thanks to the family's persistence, the GOL program in Panama presented Joseph's case to our

District 7470 GOL program and the medical team at Westchester Medical Center accepted this very high-risk surgery.

Thankfully, on February 11<sup>th</sup>, Joseph received a new Mitral Valve during an 8-hour open-heart surgery. The news of a successful surgery brought mom Maria to tears as she heard for the first time since birth that her son now had a chance at a normal, healthy life. She could not even express the depth of her gratitude to the perfect strangers in another country who cared enough to help save her son's life.

Post-surgery, Joseph experienced some minor complications and challenges, but none that could stop this determined young man from returning to his anxious family in Panama. On March 6<sup>th</sup>, Joseph and Maria said farewell to the people who had opened their hearts and home for 2 months and were warmly greeted by their "real" family in Panama.

All of us at GOL NJ thank the Malicki family and all of our GOL supporters for their kindness and generosity which continue to allow us to save the lives of children like Joseph, one little heart at a time.

# Rotary Youth Leadership Award



An amazing adventure is coming in June!

June 17 – 19, 2016, our District will host the annual RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Award). This three-day intensive program is designed to teach high-school juniors leadership skills. They will be able to use these skills for the rest of their lives. RYLA is known District wide for changing people's lives and helping them understand how they can partner with Rotary to make a difference in this world. 100 juniors from high school are expected to converge on Drew University, not only to learn from the best and brightest in our District, and also to learn from each other and figure out how they can support each other in their ongoing projects.

RYLA Starts Friday night with a series of welcome remarks, and drives right into making sure the students get to know each other well. On Saturday morning they get up and are immediately treated to several motivational and inspiring speakers. The speakers will help the students to not only see what they can do, they will give them actionable takeaways to improve themselves and the ideas that they are passionate about.

In the afternoon the entire agenda is designed to be experiential learning. Some ideas that are presented in a classroom setting are not as effective as taking those same ideas and putting them to work in an experiential learning environment. These events have been specifically designed for the RYLA students. They will intentionally push them and will have them achieve excellent outcomes

#### while learning.

The highlight of the weekend is a speech given by a motivational speaker who truly teaches the students, in a unique way, how to "break through your fears". This fundamental experiential learning, coupled with positive groups of people, never fails to excite and inspire the youth. It teaches them the values that Rotary holds so dear.

The next morning, we talk about what they can do by providing them with opportunities within Rotary to continue to serve and work together. These include Interact clubs, short-term and long-term exchanges as well as opportunities throughout the District to become leaders who are capable of making changes in the world.

Rotary clubs around the District say that this is one of their favorite events because it changes people's lives. Mark, a past attendee said, "*This was the most amazing experience of my life!*" Pam from Moorestown said: "*What I learned here I will use for the rest of my life.*" Jason said it was "*amazing*".
