



Phil Wilson Talks of Polio Eradication Initiative at District's ZOOM Staff Meeting.


In a presentation on Rotary International's campaign against polio, Philip E. Wilson this moth discussed five steps Rotary is taking in the midst of the COVID-19 epidemic. Speaking at District 7490's ZOOM Staff Meeting on May 15, he said that RI was continuing to track the poliovirus in an effort to determine areas throughout the world that may be at risk.

Illustrating his remarks with a PowerPoint slide presentation, Phil also said that routine vaccinations were continuing, that RI is attempting to assure the availability of vaccine to high-risk areas and that plans are under way to resume national immunization campaigns when the threat posed by COVID-19 pandemic is lessened. RI, his presentation said, is also providing "basic services to polio affected areas."

Turning to the COVID-19 pandemic, Phil, a member of the Rotary Club of the Palisades, said that polio workers are educating communities on means of prevention, with his presentation also saying that RI is "coordinating response" to outbreaks of the virus. In addition to training health care workers on means of prevention, polio workers, Phil said, are investigating cases and "tracing contacts" in an effort to curb the virus' spread.

When the national immunization drives resume, Phil said, workers will wear protective clothing in order to protect not only themselves, but the children they will vaccinate.

He also announced that since July, Rotarians of District 7490 have contributed \$30,000 to the Polio Eradication fund, with \$3,000 having been contributed this week alone. This, he said in contrast to total donations of \$7,500 in all of last year. This week's donation's he added, will be matched by other donors.




An outline of five steps being taken to eradicate polio in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic.

PDG Bill Rupp Leads Memorial Service at ZOOM Meeting for Rotarians Who Have Died in the Last Year.



Past District Governor William F. Rupp, who led District 7490's memorial service on May 15 in remembrance of 14 Rotarians who died during the last year.

In a memorial service that would normally have taken place at a District Conference, Rotary District 7490 this month honored the memory of 14 Rotarians who have died since April of last year.

With Past District Governor William F. Rupp presiding at the District's May 15 ZOOM Staff Meeting, Bill quoted Senator Robert F. Kennedy's 1966 observation that might be applicable today. Speaking in Cape Town, South Africa, Senator Kennedy had quoted a "Chinese curse which says 'May he live in interesting times." Whether we "like it or not" Bill said, "we live in interesting times. They are times of danger and uncertainty; but they are also more open to the creative energy of men than any other time in history."

"We find ourselves frightened of the possibility of infection." Bill continued: "We find ourselves isolated in our homes. Many are suffering financial hardships. We wonder whether the economy will recover. We have had our lives turned upside down."

Yet he said, "in the midst of this pandemic, we have witnessed acts of bravery and sacrifice by countless health care workers, first responders, and essential services employees." Indeed, he said, "We have all learned to be creative; at home, in work, at play and in service."

"We, as Rotarians, Bill continued: "have undertaken acts of kindness and compassion in providing personal protective equipment and meals to health care workers, the elderly and those in need."

The widespread effects of the virus, he said, "has taught us that we are all connected and depend upon one another. To be human is to have a need to share contact with other humans, to converse, to laugh, to cry, to touch and to hold one another. Humanity is indeed one, and through Rotary, we have an opportunity to connect with the world."

Speaking of the passing of the 14 Rotarians from 16 Rotary clubs, with some having transferred from one club to another, Bill said: "Their passing has left of each with a sense of loss, as if a piece of ourselves has been taken from us." He then recited John Donne's poem in which he wrote:

No man is an island,
Entire of itself,
Any man's death diminishes me,
Because I am involved in mankind,
And therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls;
It tolls for thee.

As he prepared to read the names of the departed Rotarians who he said: "have touched our lives, inspired us, and continue to live within our memories, he cited another poem by Donne:.

Death be not proud, though some have called thee
Mighty and dreadful, for thou are not so;
For those whom thou think'st thou dost overthrow
Die not, poor Death, nor yet canst thou kill me...
One short sleep past, we wake eternally,
And death shall be no more. Death, thou shalt die.

As he recited the names the departed Rotarians, Bill tolled a bell and placed a red rose in a vase in each of their memories.

The ceremony began with a playing of the hymn "On Eagle's Wings", sung by Andrea Bocelli and Robin Kels and concluded with a prayer.



Jay Fowler Announces \$25,000 COVID-19 Grant.



John C. "Jay" Fowler, Chairman of District 7490's Rotary Foundation Committee, who announced at District 7490's ZOOM Staff Meeting the availability of a COVID-19 grant from the Rotary Foundation.

Speaking at the District Staff Meeting on May 15, John C. "Jay" Fowler, chairman of the District's Rotary Foundation Committee, announced that the Rotary Foundation is making available grants of \$25,000 to each of RI's more than 550 districts to combat the COVID-19 epidemic.

In response to this availability he said, 15 clubs in Bergen. Hudson and Passaic Counties have submitted applications for District Designated Grants of up to \$2,000 per club. In considering grant applications, Jay added, those devoted to combatting the epidemic will be "moved to the top of the pile."

Responding to Jay's announcement, Joseph E. Branco of the Jersey City Rotary Club said that he is in the process of locating a 55-gallon drum of hand sanitizer that would be used to limit the spread of the virus. Sanitizers, he said, would be put in four-ounce jars and distributed to vulnerable publics.

Rotarians were also told that in response to the virus, some beer craft companies have converted their production facilities to the making of hand sanitizers.

Bob Kilroy Gives Overview of MFAC Amidst COVID-19.

Robert Kilroy of the Secaucus Rotary Club, Chairman of the District's Military Families Assistance Council, gave an overview of the MFAC'S mission at this month's District Staff Meeting.

Speaking from home at the May 15 ZOOM meeting, Bob said that one of its main purposes is to provide food to families of military personnel in need. In an effort to provide assistance to as many people as possible, he said, the MFAC is reaching out to posts of the American Legion and of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW).

While the MFAC's primary mission is to service military personnel and veterans in the three counties of Bergen, Hudson and Passaic that make up District 7490, Bob said, it would provide assistance to areas outside those three counties whenever necessary. He also urged Rotary clubs in the District that might know of veterans or military families in need to reach out to MFAC.

DGE Carl Hassett Speaks on Varied Topics.

Governor-elect Carl Hassett said om May 15 that he has obtained personal protective equipment (PPE) for use in the coronavirus, including 45,000 N95 gowns. A disaster aid trailer, to be used to transport these materials, he said, has been deployed at a warehouse that he owns.

He then spoke of a "March Madness Against Hunger" that had been cancelled due to the coronavirus.

Speaking at the District's ZOOM meeting, Carl said that a plan to prepare 25,000 meals for distribution had been cut back to 14,000 meals, but that with the social distancing restrictions resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, the project was cancelled and the food materials returned to The Outreach Program in Iowa, the sponsor of the nationwide program.

Food materials will be sent back to New Jersey next month, however, Carl said, with the preparation of food supplies taking place on Saturday, June 13, at William Paterson University in Wayne, that is, if quarantine restrictions are sufficiently relaxed to make the project practicable.

Finally, Carl said, a Banner Exchange brunch is tentatively scheduled for Sunday, June 28 at Seasons Catering, located at 644 Pascack Road in Washington Township.

Governor Murphy on May 18 saluted the Rotary Clubs of Englewood, Hackensack, Maywood and Teaneck for their efforts in delivering lunches and dinners to health care workers and other first responders.

In his daily news briefing on the COVID-19 virus, Mr. Murphy said that he wanted to "give a huge shout out" to the four clubs "who have all banded together to help provide meals to their area's many healthcare workers and first responders working the testing sites at Bergen Community College and New Bridge Medical Center."

"Theirs" he said in reference to Bergen County where the four clubs are located, "is one of the hardest hit areas of our state, and the support they have shown to the frontlines is tremendous and it's appreciated" concluding his remarks with: "So to everyone with the Rotary Clubs of Englewood, Hackensack, Maywood and Teaneck, thank you and a job well done."

Carmine Meluccio of the Fort Lee Rotary Club Speaks of Club's Activities at District Meeting.

Carmine Meluccio, President of the Fort Lee Rotary Club, announced that monies that would normally have been paid for lunch at the club's weekly meetings - approximately \$2,600 - is instead being earmarked for COVID-19 relief. After asking the City's Mayor how best the money might be used, Carmine said, the club donated food for National Guard soldiers deployed at COVID-19 testing sites.

He also told of a student of Bergen Community College who was trying to complete her classwork on her cellphone, since she does not own a computer or iPad. With students being required to pursue their studies online since the college buildings themselves have been closed, Carmine said, the club obtained a Chrome book for her. Finally, he said, the club will award scholarships to two students of Fort Lee High School.

District Endorses Candidate for Peace Scholarship.

Our District is endorsing the candidacy of Jessica Scadron for the highly competitive Rotary Foundation Peace Fellowship. She is planning to enter the Master's Degree Program at the University of Bradford, Bradford, England.

She has an extensive background of working with non-profits, for profits, foundations, governments and NGOs to advance progress on social issues including human rights, poverty, food and water security, safe housing, disaster relief, social impact investing, education climate change, human trafficking and literacy. She is the Founder and Principal of Social Harmony.

Response to COVID-19 Pandemic.

Response to the COVID-19 pandemic has become the current focus of the Foundation.

Through the Disaster Response Grants, the Foundation has offered each District the opportunity to apply for a special Grant of up to \$25,000 for COVID-19 Initiatives. Our District has applied for the Grant and we are currently waiting for the Grant to be funded. Maria Rini, our Grants Chairperson, has already reached out to the clubs requesting information on their programs so we will be able provide funds to the clubs as soon as the Grant is funded.

The Foundation is also allowing clubs with existing District Designated Fund grants to repurpose their grants to fund COVID-19 Initiatives. Two of our clubs with 2018-19 grants have already taken advantage of this opportunity and Clubs that received 2019-20 grants have been advised of their ability to repurpose their grants.

The Committee was able to provide \$900.00 grants to both The Palisades Club for "Our Community Dinner Table" which provides meal distribution throughout Palisades Park to anyone with a need and to the Teaneck Club to provide funds to the Ambulance Corp for PPE and gift cards from local restaurants for Holy Name Hospital workers.

The Foundation is encouraging Clubs and Districts to use DDF funds for COVID-19 Initiative during the 2020-2021 Rotary Year. As a one-time exception, clubs will be able to be reimbursed for expenses beginning in March of 2020.

The Foundation has also waived the International Partner funding requirement for Global Grants and will expedite approval of any new Global Grants dealing with COVID-19 Initiatives.

Club Donations to the Rotary Foundation.

Through May 20th, clubs in our District have donated a total of \$143,459 to the Rotary Foundation, including \$49,485 for the Foundation's Annual Fund, \$34,504 for Polio Plus and \$59,470 to Global Grants.

The donations for Polio Plus surpassed last year's total of \$7,500 which had been the highest total of the last five years.
