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



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
Purpose of This Seminar



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Rotary Foundation Grants Model



Sustainable Projects Provide a good community fit Supply the materials/technology for the long haul. Funding is adequate to complete the project Knowledge is transferred Recipients and Rotarians (especially local Rotarians) are motivated Evaluation is ongoing

•Giving a community the skills and knowledge to maintain project outcomes for the long term, after grant funds have been expended




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Sustainability

- Conduct at needs assessment for the community to help identify the problem and solutions for solving it.
- Make use of local resources for funding, regional input and indigenous knowledge as much as possible.
- Determine the most appropriate technology to address the issue. Simpler is often better.
- Provide for ongoing maintenance
- Teach the community how to operate the equipment, and share business skills to help community members set up a committee of agency to collect fees that can help cover operations and repairs.

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









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
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
Which Type of Grant Global vs. District?

	Global Grant Project	District Grant Project
Cost	USS30 000+	No minimum or maximum amount
Funding	Clubs and districts allocate DDF and/ or cash, which receive a World Fund match of 100 percent for DDF and 50 percent for cash.	Districts use funds from a block grant from DDF to fund local or international projects that align with the mission.
Apolication	Available online	At the discretion of the sponsor district
Area of Focus	Projects must be in one of the six areas of focus.	Project not required to be in an area of focus.
Host Club	Projects are driven by host community.	Not required
Sustainability	Projects are sustainable, providing long-term solutions to community needs that will be maintained after grant funding ends.	Not required
Measurability	Projects are measurable, demonstrating impact on participants' lives, knowledge, or health.	Not required
Reports	First report within 12 months of receiving first payment; subsequent reports every 12 months thereafter for the duration of the project; final report	Final report documenting the disbursement of funds within 12 months of receiving payment or within 2 months of total disbursement
		Districts report to member clubs annually on each project that received district grant funding.

District Grants

"The Foundation itself requires very minimal reporting, thanks to the advance planning done by clubs and districts before the funds are requested. This should enable districts to close out their grants quickly."

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District Grants for Club

- Our District will support a broad range of smaller projects, examples:
- · Local or international service projects
- Scholarship (one district-wide application process)
- · Small vocational training teams
- Club applications are on the District 7850 web page under the Foundation tab

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The District has approximately \$29,556 for District Grants in 2022-23 At least \$5,000 of these funds will be used for a Teacher Scholarships

District Grant Reports

Interim reports are required six months after the receipt of the grant and a final report is required within two months of full expenditure of grant funds:

Please include:
Invoices expenses;
Copies of receipts;
An account of Rotarian participation in the implementation of the grant; and
A short narrative about what was accomplished

Grants are to be expended in the Rotary year requested and cannot be spent after the conclusion of the Rotary Year. Deadline: May 15

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Designing a District Grant

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District Grant Rules

- Only one request per club will be considered to allow equitable division of funds among clubs.
- Individual district grants will be up to a maximum of US\$4,000. Clubs are encouraged to match as much as possible on a US\$1.00/US\$1.00 basis. If a club does not have funds to make a match, the maximum award will be US\$1,000;

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
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
District Grant Rules

- District grants implementation can only begin once the district grant is approved by the District Grant Committee and the Rotary Foundation. Our goal will be to announce grant approvals by 1 September. No grants will be approved after all funds are allocated or 1 March 2023, whichever comes first. NOTE IF YOUR CLUB IS AWARDED A GRANT DO NOT MAKE ANY EXPENDITURES UNTIL YOU ARE NOTIFIED THAT THE GRANT HAS BEEN APPROVED BY THE DISTRICT AND THE ROTARY FOUNDATION.
- Funds should be expensed prior to 15 May 2023 and a final report will be due on 31 May 2023;


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Priorities for District Simplified Grant include the following: Timely submission of application, Creativity of the project, Club's contributions to support The Rotary Foundation, If the Club has received previous District Grants, Number of club members involved in the project, How project related to Rotary International six area of focus, Funds are for new projects only, Club members must be involved in the project, and The project must be identified as a Rotary Project










Applying for Global Grants Two-step application process online Meet goals of area of focus Be sustainable Involve Rotary clubs in two districts Minimum budget of US\$30,000 District must confirm that the club is qualified



Needs Assessment

- Base project on the community's need not what you perceive the need to be. Talk to the stakeholders in the host country.
- Assess resources of your club and potential partners

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TIPS FOR CONDUCTING ANY ASSESSMENT

- Remain open minded. Don't presume you know what the community needs.
- Choose participants carefully. Consider the makeup of the community and ensure
 that you include a diverse cross-section of relevant groups (e.g., gender, age,
 ethnicity, religion, income level, vocations). Include overlooked or marginalized
 groups. Women, young people, the elderly, and religious or ethnic minorities are
 often overlooked.
- Keep the community's social dynamics in mind and provide a forum where they feel comfortable sharing their views.
- Consider yourself an outsider. Even if the community you want to work with is local, find a well-connected individual, group, or organization that can introduce you to your target stakeholder groups.
- Don't promise a project before you make a decision. But do assure participants that you'll let them know what your club decides.



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


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Terms of Qualification Valid for one year Club responsibility for grant funds Disclose conflicts of interest Cooperate with all audits Use grant funds properly Implement the club MOU





Qualification Requirements Read, sign, and submit Club Memorandum of Understanding by 1 May 2022 Submit proposals for District Grants for Clubs by 29 April 2022 to Louisa Tripp and Bob Broadhurst prior to, or at the District Training Assembly. Follow the steps in the District Grants for Clubs process for 2022-23 Identify a Club Steward to monitor the implementation of grants, and collect documentation to meet auditing requirements

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Club Memorandum of Understanding ✓ The Club Memorandum of Understanding is a binding agreement between the club and its district, outlining Foundation requirements. ✓ By signing the Club Memorandum of Understanding, the club agrees to comply with

the requirements.

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Qualification ✓ Qualification provides clubs with financial and stewardship controls for meeting Foundation requirements and managing grantfunded activities. ✓ Clubs need to qualify before applying for district, global and packaged grants. ✓ Qualification Process Completed by 1 May 2022

Maintaining Qualification Follow terms of club District Grant and Global Grant MOUs Appoint club member/committee to manage club qualification Fully implement stewardship practices to prevent misuse of funds: Club Steward needs to be identified for Global Grants to ride herd over the use of funds. This cannot be a person who has signed for the grant!
