






L-W Rotary Delivers Food to Neighbors in Need

The Lincoln-Woodstock Rotary Club and Loon Mountain Ministry are working together to deliver food baskets at least twice a week to seniors and families in need, as well as offering additional services as needed to folks sheltering-in-place. Local restaurants such as the Woodstock Inn. Station, and Brewery are either packaging meals to be delivered, or donating food items that can be packaged into meal baskets. Local families, the Food Pantry, and convenience and grocery stores are also donating food to be packaged and delivered. We are working on creating a distribution network where folks in need can call Loon Mountain Ministry who in turn dispatches Rotarians and other volunteers to either deliver meals or shop for those who are housebound. The needs of our neighbors don't disappear during trying times such as these, but to be safe, we are following safety protocols that minimize the risk to both deliverers and recipients! It's a great way to overcome the feelings of helplessness that many of us are experiencing by helping those who are truly in need!



Randolph and Randolph Sunrise Rotary Clubs Put Synergy to Work

The Rotary Clubs of Randolph and Randolph Sunrise, in concert with other local community groups and citizens, have organized a network to find people in need in the community and assign volunteers to fulfill them. Whether purchasing groceries, picking up prescriptions, or handling other tasks that involve going out in public, the Rotarians are coordinating efforts and providing volunteer labor to accomplish the tasks.

2020-21 District Grants

As people of action, Rotary members want to find ways to respond to COVID-19, which is now a global pandemic, and to help people affected by it.

Towards that end, as District Grants for the 2019-2020 year have a spending deadline of May 15, 2020 and a final report due date of May 31, 2020, if your club has a district grant and has not yet spent the funds and does not think you will be able to spend the funds by May 15, 2020, please contact Louisa Tripp or Bob Broadhurst by April 15, 2020 so that funds may reallocated before the end of the grant year. Louisa's and Bob's contact information is below.

Additionally, if your club has been considering using 2019-20 district grant funds to support your community's response to COVID-19, please remember that modifications in District Grant spending may be made but only with prior approval by Rotary International. The process is very quick (less than 24 hours), but is required before funds are spent. If you have a 2019-20 district grant and all the funds have not yet been spent and both you and your original grant partners have discussed and agreed to the change in spending, please contact Louisa Tripp or Bob Broadhurst to get approval for this change.

Barre Rotary Nearing Completion of Wheelock House Renovation

Barre Rotary Club's project at the Wheelock House is just about done.

Wheelock House is a historic building owned by the City of Barre which for years had housed the Barre Senior Center. Now, after a period of disuse, the City is contemplating housing a teen center and other community-focused uses in the property, which led the Barre Rotarians to offer to assist with refurbishing the property. With new shelving, furniture, paint, and lighting, the building is nearly ready for use.

This renovation would not have been possible without the efforts and contributions of **Norwich University Rotaract** and students, Nelson ACE Hardware, Calvin Wilson of Wilson Woodwerkes, Allen Lumber Co., and many others. The hope is to hold a picnic at Barre's Rotary Park this spring to celebrate the project.

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
