Public Relations:

The 2011-2012 Rotary PR grant kicked off in January of 2012 with a banner ad campaign on Facebook, which linked to the District 7850 website. The banner ad campaign ran for six months and had 30,814,433 impressions and resulted in 7,849 clicks. Overall we saw a positive growth in both members and new members, which was a change from the previous year.

This year our PR campaign, combined with District 7870, includes:

Club Rotary Drummondville Malouin: A second Club in Drummondville was created to satisfy the needs of professionals that were not able to attend meetings at the actual 50 year-old Club. Some were not able to join because their classification was filled and others, because of family duties, were not able to attend an evening meeting, so a lunch meeting seemed perfect for young professionals.

Their first meeting was held at noon on Friday, September 23rd 2011 - Attendees: Rotarians Gilles Gravel & Elena Salova from the Drummondville Club and Martin Morissette the first non-Rotarian member. On April 6th, 2012, they were up to 17 members, and the board decided to get the minimum number of 25 by April 18th. They officially submitted their application with 29 members on June 1st and on June 29th they were accepted by RI. Now, the Club has 30 members, 13 Female and 17 Male, Average age; 41. Assistant Governor, Gilles Gravel has the distinction of being the Charter President of this, our newest, club in the district. Well done, Gilles!

The Charter Ceremony is scheduled on Friday, November 16th in Drummondville. As is the custom when we bring into being a new club, other clubs in the district will be asked to welcome the new club by offering needed meeting supplies – like bell and gavel, Rotary club banner, etc. Details will be forthcoming.

MATCHING GRANT for FLOOD RELIEF:



Good news! The final checks for the Matching Grant for Flood Recovery have been sent to Rotary International. We believe we will begin making funds available just before the one year anniversary of the flood. Again the grants is for \$412,450 USD. About two weeks ago Jan McElroy (District 7870 – Southern Vermont and Southern New Hampshire) & SEVCA (Southeastern Vermont Community Action Agency – the lead community action agency for the grant) held a training seminar for all

Community Service Agencies, and Long Term Recovery Committees at the Vermont Technical College in Randolph Vermont. They are now ready to help us identify Vermont citizens who have needs that can be helped with our matching grant funds. I'm still counting on your support as we identify a variety of "sweat equity" projects that could be done by Rotarians to help those

homeowners and renters who still need our help. So stay tuned for more opportunities to help in recovery efforts. Finally, Jan has a group working on press releases to go to various media outlets (press, radio, television). Our goal is to have this information ready to go so it can be part of the 1st anniversary reports about the flood.



DISTRICT SIMPLIFIED GRANTS: Bill Secord, District Simplified Grants Chair, is working hard with several Clubs to finalize our District Simplified Grants report for 2011/2012. Once that report is completed to the Rotary Foundation's satisfaction, money for the 2012/2013 District Simplified Grants money will be released to our District for us to spend either here in our District or internationally. It will be up to Clubs to submit proposals for the use of these

<u>October 24 – World Polio Day!</u> As Rotarians we have been fortunate to be part of this worldwide effort to eradicate polio and aid in the health of millions of children around the world. CLUB NEWS

Two articles which ran in the Valley News gave Rotary good publicity.

"Sahlman El Salvador" is an extensive interview with the Rotary Club of Lebanon-Riverside's immediate past president, Bill Sahlman. When questioned about how Rotary got started, Bill said that 'it was started in Chicago by five ... young business guys who were looking for a way to get together and basically generate more business for themselves. ... They decided that they ought to do a community service project. I think the first one they did was they built a public toilet in Chicago ... probably in 1919, something like that. The real instigator for the whole thing was a Vermonter ... and his name was Paul Harris.'

I think one of their next projects was they bought a horse for a physician who made house calls. But his horse had died and he didn't have the money to replace his horse, which kind of led into us doing this "horse for Carlos" in Honduras this past year. Carlos is a guy with polio, lives in a village way up in the mountains, and the only way for him to get around or even get out of the village is by horse His horse was dying, so we raised \$800 in a one-night event ... to replace his horse.

Bill went on to discuss work that had been done in El Salvador and ended the interview stating that Rotarians had been instrumental in starting the Grafton County Drug Court. And how this past year, they just finished a project where they trained all of the Lebanon schoolteachers on suicide awareness. He concluded with how Rotarians had built the Lebanon Riverside Park. Well done Bill and fellow Rotarians!



"River Clean-up" is a story about the 3-way collaboration among the Rotary Clubs of Lebanon, Lebanon-Riverside, and Hanover to perform the biennial clean-up of the Mascoma River which this year included cleaning sections of the river in Canaan and Enfield leading to Mascoma Lake, as well as the stretch of the river in Lebanon from the lake to the Connecticut River. Sixty volunteers were involved, picking up stuff like rusty bicycles, car parts, bricks, clothing, beer and soda cans, washing machines, bank safes and road signs. Here we have Lebanon Rotary President, Jon Blodgett and Chairman of the event Ernst Oidtmann, discarding the rusty skeleton of an old bicycle.

Volunteers were rewarded for all their hard work with a hearty pancake breakfast at 8 a.m. sponsored by the Hanover Rotary, and finishing with a mid-day lunch organized by the Rotary Clubs of Lebanon and Lebanon-Riverside.
