4. Polio Update – From District Polio Chair Louisa Tripp

"Rotary Celebrates India's First Polio-free Year!"

In January e-mails, websites and news articles began with this headline around the world...and Rotarians played a major role in making this headline possible. RI President Kalyan Banerjee spoke in his video message (http://vimeo.com/34926787) about Rotarians' tireless efforts (our efforts!) to eradicate polio from the face of the earth. Our contributions of more than a billion dollars and millions of hours of volunteer hours around the globe have lowered the number of new cases reported each year from 350,000 in scores of countries in the 1980's down to approximately 600 cases in 4 countries. For a few years now we have used the acronym PAIN (Pakistan, Afghanistan, India and Nigeria) to announce the countries which have never stopped the polio virus. If we can maintain a polio free India for three years, India will be removed from that list and lower the number of endemic countries from four countries to three!

In the tradition of "Service Above Self", we, as Rotarians, helped make this possible. Rotarians were participants in a successful global initiative. Local Rotarians from small towns such as Randolph, donated their time participating in national immunization days. We held events including bringing Ramesh Ferris to our area, sponsored Rotaract and Interact "Purple Pinky" tables around the district, showed "The Final Inch" at our local libraries and theatres, showed our support on the web (http://www.thisclose.net/gallery.php?show=8161) and raised funds in support of Rotary International's efforts to match the Gates \$200M Challenge! Although we have met the challenge given to us by Gates, our fundraising for polio eradication will need to go on. Knowing that more money is needed to complete this work, the Gates Foundation has given Rotary an additional \$50 Million to help us with this work. This is not a matching grant...just a huge donation to help us achieve our dream of a polio free world.

Over the time of the challenge from Bill Gates, District 7850 has contributed \$255,840.54. I think this is amazing!

5. **Disaster Recovery Grant**

Here is the latest news from The Rotary Foundation on our Matching Grant application for Flood Recovery projects in Vermont. My Governor Classmate, Jan Mc Elroy received this on 3 February 2012.

Dear DG McElroy,

Thank you for your email and your patience. Please know that the competitive process takes longer than the traditional Matching Grant process. While I appreciate that you are facing pressure from the people in your community, such a large grant request has to be reviewed on multiple levels. The file has been through its preliminary review, and the program officer is currently in communication regarding the Advanced Site Visitor. At this moment it looks like someone will be sent to Vermont to review the situation, but I will be in touch shortly with the final decision.

As this year Rotary is on a slightly different international meetings schedule, the file will be sent to the Trustees for remote review. This means the file will be reviewed by the Trustees once it is completed.

11. Youth Exchange First Hand Report

Here's another first hand report from one of our Youth Exchange Students. January 2011

"Hola,

So I am very freaked out with this report...yesterday was halfway for me. I sat down with a calendar the other day with my host mom and I think I have about 4 free weekends left until I leave and it is freaking me out!!! Everyone says the second half goes SO much faster than the first so if my first half went fast then it's pretty much June for me and I really don't want to leave!!! Ahhhhhh. It a really weird feeling sitting in class and looking around at everyone and already getting so nostalgic even though I'm still here. Even more reason to enjoy and make the most of every minute left!

So the new year started off amazing for me. One of my best new years ever. Here there are a lot of traditions for the new year. At midnight you have to eat 12 grapes so that you have good luck for every month that year. Also if you put your ring in you glass of champagne it gives you good money. The last one is that you are supposed to wear something red for good luck. So all of that happens with your family for dinner. After that everyone gets really dressed up and we all go to the sports center where they have a band playing and dancing until pretty much breakfast. It's so fun to see everyone in nice clothes and a great way to celebrate the new year...very worry free not having to worry about where to go like normal.

Then on the 6th of January is Three Kings Day (Los Reyes) which is kind of celebrated like Christmas here. There are three kings instead of Santa Claus that come and give everyone presents under the tree. On the 5th there is a huge parade in the town and the 'three kings' are there in there big decorated floats and the throw little caramels to all the kids. Its sooo cool. We all went out to celebrate on the eve and then for lunch on the 6th family came and we ate a typical comida for reyes. There is a really typical cake that everyone eats for 3 kings day called roscón. It is in the shape of a ring and the middle is filled with cream. Inside there are hidden things. One of them is a figurine of one of the kings and if you get it you'll have good luck for the year. The other one is a dried fava bean and if you get that one you have to pay for the roscón the next year. I might just have to celebrate los reyes next year too!

On the 21st there was a huge festival called Hogueras which means bonfires. Usually in Spain it is illegal to make bonfires because forest fires happen so easily because its dry...so this is the one day of the year where you can make them (in winter so its wetter). The town makes a huge one, and when i say huge I mean gigantic, and then group of friends makes one too. There ended up being over 50 bonfires! We make them up in the motor-cross where there are trails to run on so it's more of a field. The week before all of us (my whole group of friends) went into the woods and collected wood. Also so of my friends parents work in companies that have a lot of wood pallets so they brought those. We also bought chorizo and sausage and other kind of meats and we made them over the fire. I also brought s'mores for everyone to try and they LOVED them!!! It was so fun. We made coaches out of the wood pallets too so it was actually really comfortable. It was really to have time to really talk to everyone (usually in a discotecha it's pretty hard). Also at the end of the night we went around to other people's bonfires and hung out with them. It was a really great, bonding night and I definitely felt right at home sitting around a bonfire.

Also it was my birthday on the 24th so I am now 17!!! I thought it would be very hard alone because I'm a twin so I've always shared it. I did really miss her but I had an AMAZING birthday. My host family is the best! They got me a shirt and all my neighbors got me a box a acrylic paints for my painting class. Also both my moms organized a massage for me in Jaca which I am SO excited about plus now I don't have another thing to take home. All through the day everyone was stopping by to wish me a happy birthday. At school it felt like everyone knew it was my birthday and then during break my friends brought balloons and cake and juice and confetti and sang to me. Then for dinner a group of friends came over and we skimped my sister and they all brought out a cake with 17 candles and sang to the two of us. They framed a picture of all of us for me...I am almost started crying I was so happy. It couldn't have been better.

So I really don't have anything negative to say except for the fact that I have never felt like this before about the halfway mark. I really hope this isn't how 50 will feel. I'm definitely starting to feel really nostalgic for what I'm still living. I know that technically I have just as much ahead as behind but it sure feels like Thanksgiving was halfway. School is good...definitely easier than the beginning but am still working way to hard. Next year will definitely feel very easy compared to this. Also my language is coming right along. Now I think I can say I understand everything...granted not every word but I can easily figure out the words I don't know. My speaking flows and people know what I'm trying to say but I've still got some grammar to work out. And as for what language I dream and think in my head in I have no idea. I think it's a combination of the two. The other night though a friend woke me up and I started to talking to her in Spanish and I don't remember it so maybe that means it's in my sub consciousness. Anyways I hope all is well there and there is snow. We actually just got snow this weekend so everything is buzzing with excitement. Also good luck to all of you who find out where you are going in a week or two. So weird thinking that was already a year ago. Time definitely flies faster than I would have ever thought and I predicted pretty fast.

Over the last month, I have started volunteering at a home run by Mother Teresa's order, the Missionaries of Charity. An assorted group of orphaned children, abandoned elderly folks, and handicapped people (with a wide range of physical and mental disabilities) all make their home here. Last spring, when I volunteered in La Paz, Bolivia, I also had the opportunity to spend a morning a week at a local home ran by the Missionaries of Charity, so I have enjoyed building upon this earlier experience.

I spend my Monday mornings with a lovely group of handicapped ladies. After greeting the approximately fifteen women, I give massages to everyone's hands and feet with some lotion. In light of my limited Swahili skills and many of their limited verbal abilities, we communicate mostly through shared laughter, hugs, and hand-holding. I am on my way to getting to know each of their names, as well as their personalities and quirks.

Following massages, I usually give wheelchair tours. This seems to be a special treat for ladies to leave their common room and see other people in the community. We stop at each person to greet them on our circle of the premises, and we enjoy the sun and the greenery. Then if there is time left before I have to leave for class, sometimes we dance or sing or just sit still together and enjoy all the commotion in the common room-- of snacks, hair-dressing, finger-nail clipping, and playing toss with a ball.

Although sometimes it is difficult to go, each Monday morning, it is also difficult to leave. My new friends are quick to smile and quick to love, and in a large and crowded city, this is something to be deeply appreciated.

15. United 10 Million Charity Miles Giveaway

For those of you who voted for Rotary International to be the recipient of free air miles, RI officially came in second: we received 2,488,070 charity miles from United.

The miles will be used to support our humanitarian work around the world.
