CLUB SERVICE CHAIR District Governor Elect, Steve Dates

Under the new District organization, the Club Service "Tower" will be overseen each year by the District Governor Elect (currently Stephen Dates of the Charlotte-Shelburne Club) and it consists of six areas of focus with the primary mission of supporting the District's Clubs. This month's newsletter will focus on three of these areas:

CLUB SERVICE PROJECT DATABASE: This is a new mission led by Linda Gilbert (<u>lindaggilbert@gmail.com</u>) of the Charlotte-Shelburne club. The first phase of this new (three year) position as District Service Project Chair involves the development of an inventory of service projects by clubs. Three database information forms are being collected by my email request to all clubs for their international service projects, club fundraiser projects, and local and district service projects. The first pilot clubs (in Chittenden and Addison County) who have sent information are already on the district website. The completed information (which includes project leader, success of the project, email contacts) will be valuable tools for every club as they review possible future projects. The success of this project will be determined by the clubs sending their data in a prompt and complete manner.

CLUB VISIONING: This is an ongoing process within the District and is co-chaired by Past District Governor (PDG) Andy Milligan <u>handyandy@metrocast.net</u> and PDG Rene Laporte <u>Nicole@besnerlaporte.com</u>. The purpose of club visioning is to:

Assist club's in defining a shared commitment;

Provide long-term direction;

Create a framework to establish goals and objectives;

To optimize the use of limited resources.

A typical session lasts about four hours. Currently, there are two club's scheduled for this month: St. Johnsbury was held on July 11th and Charlotte-Shelburne will be on July 24th. History has shown that those clubs who have completed this visioning process have improved their teamwork as well as their membership retention & recruitment.

WEBMASTER / SOCIAL MEDIA: Steve Lambert (<u>Bosteve@me.com</u>) of the North Conway Club has taken over as the webmaster of the District's website and will be expanding the mission to include the application and training of Social Media. Messaging for relevant membership and community news has never been easier! When we leverage Twitter and Facebook presence we have an opportunity to both learn from other Rotarians as well as communicate the goals of both your club and District as well. MEMBERSHIP CHAIR District Governor, Sonny Holt

Under the new District organization, the Membership "Tower" will be overseen each year by the District Governor (currently Sonny Holt of the Randolph club) and it consists of four areas of focus with the primary mission of building strong vibrant clubs, increasing membership, and building new clubs where the need arises.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT: The District Membership Development Plan has undergone a complete re-write . **I** strongly recommend that you download and read through the entire document and then make other members aware of its provisions. The reason I stress this, is that it has been shown that successful membership development has to have buy-in and participation at the member level. The plan was forwarded to Rotary International. The chair of the Membership Development and Retention Committee thought it was such a useful document that if any District or a Club follows it, that Membership will never remain a problem.

RECRUITMENT: Assistant Governor, Gilles Gravelle of the Drummondville-Malouin club is the sub-chair for recruitment. He has had excellent success in recruitment efforts in the Drummondville area. RETENTION: Assistant Governor, Marsha Hoffman of the Northfield club is our sub-chair for Retention. Our newest club, Drummondville Malouin, has received approval for its charter! The club is named for Past Rotary International Director, Alonzo Malouin who resides in Quebec. This will bring 30 new Rotarians to our District! Credit for this success goes mainly to Assistant Governor Gilles Gravel, and also to Past District Governor, Rene Laporte. A charter event will be held tentatively in November. Stay tuned, and be ready to welcome them to the fold!

Jason Schnoor, President of the Middlebury club, is in the process of forming a new Addison County, Vermont club. This club will be designed to appeal to "new generations". Jason has already received commitments from several prospective members and we have every hope to charter it this Rotary year.

FOUNDATION CHAIR Past District Governor, Marilyn Bedell

Under the new District organization, the Foundation "Tower" will be overseen for a three year period, starting with Past District Governor Marilyn Bedell of the West Lebanon club and it consists of six plus areas of focus with the primary mission of educating our members about the beneficial aspects of the Rotary Foundation and the good that it is doing internationally as well as locally with monetary grants to make life better for people.

MATCHING GRANT for FLOOD RELIEF:

The Matching Grant for Flood Relief in Vermont will be implemented during the 2012/2013 Rotary year. Periodically, a call will go out looking for Rotarian volunteers to help with "sweat

equity" service projects related to the grant. Marilyn is currently recruiting a volunteer coordinator to be our liaison with the Vermont Community Action Agencies. POLIO PLUS: This is Rotary's flagship program. Louisa Tripp of the Northfield club is the sub-chair for this important program. This year we learned that India has been declared Polio free but they have to wait for three years to be certified free from polio. So there is much more to do. Only three countries now remain with endemic cases of Polio.

Jason Schnoor, president of the Middlebury club and Deb Holt, wife of District Governor Sonny Holt travelled to India this year to administer the oral polio vaccine to children in a Muslim village south of New

NEW GENERATIONS CHAIR District Governor Nominee, Bruce Pacht

NEW GENERATIONS AVENUE OF SERVICE: In response to Rotary International's (RI) adding a 5th avenue of service -- "New Generations" (NG) -- District Governor (DG) Sonny established a district-level committee to increase Rotarians' awareness of this new "foundation of club activity" in addition to club, community, international and vocational service.

Because our 2013 cruise conference format cannot accommodate attendance by Youth Exchange students or in-bound Group Study Exchange participants, DG Sonny asked the district's NG team to create an event focusing on this new avenue.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR SEARCH FOR 2015-2016: A call for nominations has begun. To be eligible for the position of district governor, a Rotarian must;

- Be a member in good standing of a functioning club in the district
- Have served as president of a club for a full term, or as president of a charter club from the date of the charter to 30 June, for a period of at least six months
- Demonstrate knowledge of and the ability to fulfill the duties outlined in the Rotary International Bylaws, section 15.090
- Have completed seven years of membership at the time of taking office

Whether you win in August or not, your name will be put in the drawing for all of the subsequent prizes. So if you register by August 15th, you will have a chance to win \$1,000.


