This helps to better integrate our French Canadian clubs into the district.

Service Above Self Award: Rotarian Linda Gilbert (Charlotte –Shelburne) received two

For many years, she's been providing humanitarian service to help less fortunate Hondurans. 20 to 25 projects each year are successfully accomplished by 55 to 93 volunteers to build schools, renovate health care centers, provide medical and dental clinics, and provide literacy programs. Membership Seminars for July and August: The district will be holding two membership seminars for our 2013-2014 Club Presidents and their Membership Chairs. One at Dartmouth Hitchcock on 20 July and the other in St. Johnsbury on 3 August. We'll once again focus on building strong clubs that effectively engage members. We'll emphasize retention first and recruitment second as the best way to build membership in the long run.

In the words of one of our Assistant Governors, "... these seminars are great (the best I have been to) filled with great ideas and with a direct approach. Well worth attending..."

Apply for your Incentive Awards: The District will be awarding each club, \$20 for each new member that has been recruited under the Family Plan and the Young Leaders Plan, prior to 1 July 2013. Monetary awards will be sent to the clubs by 15 August.

Three Year Membership Planning: Preparing for July 2013, clubs will be asked to appoint Membership Chairs for 2-3 year terms and to ensure that they are not encumbered by other club responsibilities.

Home Makers Now Allowed to Join Rotary: The Council on Legislation voted to allow people that have interrupted their employment (or have never been employed) in order to

care for children, or to assist a spouse in their work, to become active members. This is a big breakthrough in our ability to increase membership. The Family Plan should now be able to bring spouses into full active status as Rotarians.

Good PR for your Club: A good way to publicize your club, in your local community, is to take the following banner to a local print shop and have it reproduced in various sizes on good stock. Then post them around town where the public will see them. When they go to *rotarysmiles.org* it will take them to a page on our District Web site (in English and French) and from there they will be able to find your home club. After a tour of Waterbury we will head to the Central Vermont Community Action Agency in Barre, VT so he can audit their books. If time permits we will spend some time with AG Marsha Hoffman in Northfield following the audit. He will spend June 11 and 12, 2013 in District 7870 (Southern Vermont).

District Grants...I have completed the on-line application to request our Rotary Foundation District Grant from the Rotary Foundation. Our District Grant Committee [DG Sonny Holt (Randolph), DGE Steve Dates (Charlotte-Shelburne, Rotarian Stan Bradeen (South Burlington), Rotarian Bill Secord (Lebanon-Riverside), PDG Ron Bedell (Lebanon-Riverside) and Foundation Chair Marilyn Bedell (Lebanon-Riverside,

District Grants Chair Larry Vars (Lancaster)] met at the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center on Saturday, 11 May 2013. The following Rotarians had an opportunity to review the grants

prior to the meeting, but were not able to attend the meeting, Rotarian Ginia Allison (Hanover), AG Gilles Gravel (Drummondville-Malouin), Michael Swaidner (Cholchester-Milton), and AG Barbara LaFleur (Stowe).

The good news is that we had requests for \$35,025 from our Clubs. The sad news was that we only had a budget of \$20,000. We made decisions about which grants to fund and at what level. We will not announce the recipients until the grant application has been approved by the Rotary Foundation. It is our hope that we will get grant approval prior to 1 July 2013. If you applied for a grant, remember, DO NOT SPEND ANY MONEY on your project until you receive a formal approval from District Grant Chair, Larry Vars. If you spend money prior to approval, it cannot be reimbursed.



As of 31 May 2013 our District Rotarians have donated \$91,756 of our total pledged amount of \$124,387 to the Annual Programs Fund. This means that **we have donated 74%** of our pledged amount. This is up **from 58% at the end of April.**

For Clubs who have already met their pledged amount,

You can make your individual donation through Rotary Internationals web portal at https://riweb.rotaryintl.org/Login.aspx or use the form you can find at https://riweb.rotaryintl.org/Login.aspx or use the form you can find at https://riweb.rotary.org/RIdocuments/en_pdf/123en.pdf Please remember to indicate that your donation is for the Annual Fund – Share. This means that 50% of the money we donate will come back to our District to decide how we want to spend the money.

Remember that the Annual Programs Fund is the money that will return to the District in 2015-16 for us to use for District Grants and Global Grants. I'm confident that we will achieve our goal if you keep your commitment to your pledged amount!

If you feel confused about how the Rotary Foundation works, I'm willing to come and educate your club about the Rotary foundation.

Please distribute this article to your club members. We believe that the RIGHT person exists somewhere among District 7850's 1,600 Rotarians.

Nicole has worked tirelessly to create a working structure within the committee and has succeeded such that a new chair will have stable sub-committee coordinators in each of the crucial operations:

- Outbound: Tom Badowski
- Inbound: Doug Stoehr and Dave Koepele
- Compliance officer: John Szewczyk
- Protection officer: Bruce Pacht

Why should you step up to the plate? Here's why:

- 1. YEX is one of the most exciting, rewarding and successful programs in all of Rotary. It works to establish world peace one person at a time. More than 8,000 youth participate in the program EACH YEAR in short- and long-term exchanges. This year, our district has sent and will receive 6 students. We hope to increase our numbers in ensuing years.
- 2. Although Nicole, the former chair, will be entering a Master's degree program, she is not leaving the planet and will be available for training and consultation, as will I and the above members of the District YEX committee. The routine procedures for both inbound and outbound exchanges ARE ALREADY IN PLACE you will not have to re-invent the wheel, just keep it rolling.
- 3. A major resource for you is the group at ESSEX (Eastern States Student Exchange), a consortium of many districts in the eastern U.S. to which District 7850 belongs. Among other functions, ESSEX operates as our paperwork interface with the U.S. State Department, whose rules about folks coming into the country have become a bit more complex since the attacks of 9/11. ESSEX people have responded consistently, quickly

and knowledgeably to all of the usual hiccups which accompany our efforts to send teenagers from one country to another while keeping them, their parents, host parents, sending and receiving Rotary clubs and districts and the U.S. Department of State happy.

4. Rotary International provides a HUGE amount of resource material for understanding and operating district YEX programs.

Here is a brief summary of RI's description of the responsibilities of the District YEX committee chair and the committee

General duties: The district chair coordinates and promotes YEX activities within the district and communicates with Rotary International, the district governor, and clubs.

Specific duties:

- Work with Rotary clubs to orient their youth exchange officers, establish expectations for inbound and outbound students, provide information, and encourage clubs to involve YEX alumni in the district's program
- Together with the youth protection officer and the district committee, coordinate youth protection efforts within the YEX program: training, screening of all adult volunteers, reporting all serious incidents to RI
- Work together with the Outbound YEX coordinator to accomplish a successful outbound program including assisting clubs, orienting parents and students, coordinating travel, reviewing students' monthly reports from abroad, and submitting all required reports
- Work together with the Inbound YEX co-coordinators to accomplish a successful inbound program including assisting clubs, meeting and orienting students upon arrival, complying with all U.S. State Department requirements and submitting all paperwork on time.
- Implement risk management policies and put a crisis management plan in place.
- Develop program guidelines and rules for students that comply with RI policy.
- Promote the program through district and club websites, advertisements, and news stories throughout the district.
- Maintain effective lines of communication between all program participants
- Share success stories, interesting exchange ideas, and positive alumni experiences with RI for inclusion in Rotary publications and on the RI website
- Submit an annual program survey to RI.

This is an opportunity for YOU to perform international service on a scale you may not have thought possible without leaving home. YOU CAN DO IT!!

Vergennes Rotary Supports Local Meals on Wheels Program: Throughout

Vermont, the Meals and Wheels program serves a vital function, connecting seniors with a nourishing meal and a friendly face five times a week. The Champlain Valley Agency on Aging, located in Essex Junction, administers the overall program but depends on local support to manage the scheduling, drivers and meal delivery.

In Vergennes, those local responsibilities are fulfilled by the Rotary Club of Vergennes. Rotary's involvement started when the local coordinator moved out of town in 2002 and Rotarians Ralph Jackman and Lynn Jackson Donnelly stepped in to take on these important Meals on Wheels functions.

The use of technology now allows Lynn, her sister and Rotarian Susan Burdick and fellow realtor Danelle Birong to smoothly handle the logistics of scheduling and routing from their Century 21 office. Fellow Rotarian Tim Vincent works diligently to ensure that Meals on Wheels has the required number of drivers each day and that the routes are completed. Tim trains new drivers and arranges for substitutes when needed.

The Vergennes program also serves residents in the four neighboring communities of Ferrisburgh, Addison, Waltham and Panton. There are four routes each week day, and the number of participants ranges from 25-30. Rotary has always provided drivers for the program but it is not a requirement that a driver be a Rotarian, just a helpful, friendly visitor.

"What's so gratifying is our clients usually don't have a hot meal. And this may be the only company they have throughout the week," said Lynn. "It's not only a meal," she continued, "It's a safety check for our seniors."

The Guyana Community Health Project began implementation in 2012 with Train-the-Trainer

Workshops in health and first aid in three locations, Paramakatoi, Kurukubaru, Region 8 and Surama, Region9. Participants come from the surrounding villages that have no access locally to education for adults. In the workshop in Surama, the Demerara Club, our Guyanese partner, also completed an intensive component on diabetes, its symptoms, diagnosis and treatment, as a part of another Matching Grant. In the region 8 Workshops teenage pregnancy was identified as a problem and the trainers made posters and did role plays which were recorded. The role plays along with a demonstration of first aid techniques were put on a DVD which was handed out at this year's workshops.

This February therewas a Train-the- Trainer Workshop on Food and Nutrition in Region 8 along with nutrition training in the schools. The diabetes component was added by Pam Jardine, a Demerara Rotarian



and VSO and Shameit Bali from the Rotary Club of Nottingham, also a VSO.They also did testing of blood sugar levels and left with the Health Workers the testing equipment donated by the Ministry of Health.

The Food and Nutrition Train-the-Trainer Workshop prepared the participants to return to their villages and teach people about the benefits and principles of good nutrition. The workshop focused on the nutrition challenges in the local villages and on the foods available there.The legendary Nurse Saigo who has delivered over 1000 babies in

her lifetime of practice was the primary trainer with assistance from Pam Jardine, Shameit Bali and Jan Draper.

The Workshop in Kurukubaru was held in the Community Development Centre with no electricity and very basic amenities. Pam and Shameit stayed in the Jesuit Presbytery but Nurse Saigo and Rotarian Jan stayed in a house in the village, slept in hammocks and bathed after dark in buckets under the rain water tank. In Region 8 conditions are Spartan but the enthusiasm of the participants and the beauty of the mountains and rain forest make being there a wonderful experience.
