Future Vision Planning

Beginning 1 July 2013, all Rotary Districts will be implementing The Rotary Foundation's *Future Vision* plan. The plan reflects the desires and interests of Rotarians worldwide to give the Foundation a more sustainable and visible impact in the world.

The Future Vision Plan is intended to:

- Simplify Foundation programs and processes consistent with the mission
- Focus Rotarian service efforts where they will have the greatest impact by addressing priority world needs that are relevant to Rotarians



- Offer funding options to help achieve both global and local goals
- Increase the sense of ownership at the district and club levels by transferring more decisions to the districts and their member clubs
- Advance understanding of the Foundation's work and enhance Rotary's public image.

ACTION ITEM: We will begin training at the District Team Training Seminar on January 26, 2012. It is our hope that <u>ALL</u> current club presidents and your Club's Foundation chairs will come to this training session with the presidents-elect. Additional training will be held for this group at the District

Assembly in April. The current president and president-elect of each club will be required to sign a memorandum of understanding to verify that they understand the grant process and the reporting requirements. It is a legal agreement between clubs and districts and the Rotary Foundation that lists terms of qualification and the requirements to ensure proper oversight of grant funds.

Steve Dates will be talking to our Presidents-elect about this initiative, and strongly encouraging our Clubs to participate in this process. We want every Club to be able to apply for District Managed Grants... the Grants you can use for projects here at home.

Help Wanted – Future Vision Foundation Sub-Committee Positions



In preparation for our transition to the *Future Vision* plan, we are recruiting for two positions. Although the official start for the role is 1 July 2013, training will begin as soon as the individuals are identified.

Global Grants Chair

Global grants will offer a minimum World Fund award of \$15,000 or a project budget of \$30,000.

The Rotarian assuming this position must be willing to:

- Be comfortable dealing with change and new processes
- Become a district expert and resource for Foundation global grants.
- Follow and enforce the terms and conditions of grant awards; disseminate and conduct club education on the terms and conditions.
- Help the District Foundation Chair create and implement a district policy that outlines the distribution of grant funds for clubs.
- Work with the district Foundation chair and stewardship chair to:

- Ensure implementation for proper stewardship and grant management practices including reporting to the Rotary Foundation on all grants.
- Establish accurate recordkeeping systems.
- Attend various district training meetings.

Stewardship Chair

The stewardship chair is responsible for ensuring the careful management of Rotary Foundation grant funds and for educating Rotarians on proper and effective grant management. The Rotarian assuming this position must be willing to:

- Assist with the implementation of the clubs memorandum of understanding, including the development of the financial management plan.
- Help qualify clubs, including assisting with grant management seminars.
- Ensure implementation of proper stewardship and grant management practices for all grants (Global and District Managed), including reports to The Rotary Foundation on the various grants.
- Monitor and evaluate stewardship and grant management practices, including reports to The Rotary Foundation.
- Ensure that everyone involved in a grant avoids any actual or perceived conflict of interest.
- Create systems to resolve any misuse or irregularities in grant related activities, report any misuse or irregularities to The Rotary Foundation, and conduct initial local investigation into report of misuse.
- Approve the annual financial assessment of the financial management plan and ensure that it is properly distributed to clubs in the district.
- Keep a list of clubs qualified to receive grants and their club stewardship chairs.
- Attend various district training meetings.

Each organization combined their individual events and talents to collaborate on the joint **Bridge House Community Family Fun Fair** and **Rotary Duck Stampede.** The recently constructed Rotary amphitheater at Riverside Park, in Plymouth, along the Pemigewasset River, was crowded with families, friends, and neighbors who enjoyed 20 or more special family-oriented activities including food, pony rides, games, music, and amusements from Frank Jones' Unique Entertainment. Local DJ, Tim Keith, officiated as master of ceremonies.

This was the 7th year of the Bridge House Community Family Fun Fair, and Cathy

Bentwood, Bridge House Director, was thrilled to join her efforts with the energies of the Plymouth Rotarian's. This collaborative event was a huge success with the proceeds from the Rotary's annual Duck Stampede dedicated toward benefiting the Bridge House mission and its initiatives to end homelessness and support local veterans.

That same afternoon, Plymouth Rotary's 4th Annual Duck Stampede featured some 2,000 rubber duckies or more being dropped off from a bucket loader into the Pemigewasset River. Each rubber duck was



marked with a number linked to a numbered raffle ticket and every individual who had "adopted a duck" -- by purchasing a ticket -- hoped that his or her duck would be the first to cross the finish line at the Amphitheater. Proceeds from the Duck Stampede were turned over to the Bridge House when the Plymouth Rotarians voted unanimously to help fund the Bridge house mission to help many local homeless veterans who are in need of our immediate support.
