

ROTARY SERVING HUMANITY

In 1979, James Bomar Jr., the president of Rotary at the time, traveled to the Philippines as part of Rotary's earliest work to immunize children against polio. After he had put drops of vaccine into one baby's mouth, he felt a child's hand tugging on his trouser leg to get his attention. Bomar looked down and saw the baby's brother looking up at him, saying earnestly, "Thank you, thank you, Rotary."

Before Rotary took on the task of polio eradication, 350,000 people – nearly all of them children -- were paralyzed by polio every year. That child in the Philippines knew exactly what polio was and understood exactly what Rotary had just done for his baby brother. Today, 31 years after the launch of PolioPlus, the children the Philippines – and all but two other countries in the world – are growing up without that knowledge, and that fear, of polio. Instead of 1,000 new cases

of polio every day, we are averaging less than one per week. But as the fear of polio wanes, so does awareness of the disease. Now more than ever, it is vitally important to keep that awareness high and to push polio eradication to the top of the public agenda and our governments' priorities. We need to make sure the world knows that our work to eradicate polio isn't over yet, but that Rotary is in it to end it.

On 24 October, Rotary will mark World Polio Day to help raise the awareness and the funding we need to reach full eradication. I ask all of you to take part by holding an event in your club, in your community, or online. Ideas and materials are available for download in all Rotary languages at endpolio.org/worldpolioday, and you can register your event with Rotary at the same link. You can also join me and tens of thousands of you fellow Rotarians for a live-streamed global status

update at 6 p.m. Eastern time at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta. I'll be there along with the CDC Director Tom Frieden, other experts, and inspirational presenters, sharing an inside look at the science, partnerships, and human stories of polio eradication.

It is an incredibly exciting time to be a Rotarian. We are gathering momentum for the final race to the finish: to the end of PolioPlus and the beginning of a polio-free world. It is truly a once-in-a-lifetime chance to End Polio Now, through *Rotary Serving Humanity*.

participated in the annual event. It was especially pleasing that there were 23 Ladies, including one all Lady team (Springfield Rotary Club).



News from the Philippines

PDG Bading Angala was one of the 2009 Group Study Exchange's team hosts when the District 7870 team went to District 3860 in the Philippines. PDG Tony Gilmore has kept in touch with him from time to time ever since. We have done two text book donations to clubs in the District since then. PDG Tony received the following letter from them:

Dear PDG Tony,

Greetings and here is hoping that you are in the best of health as I am with the help of the Almighty. It has already been a long time since I last communicated with you Governor Tony and I do hope that you are still in touch the other members of the GSE members who visited our district.

I know that you district has been very active in extending humanitarian aids to very poor countries outside of the US. This is what makes us known in many third world countries. Polio hopefully is about to be eradicated and this is because of Rotary's dedication to do so. I still remember I was one of the PDGs who have witnessed the signing of the MOA entered by the Philippines and Rotary when the first Polio Vaccine donated by Rotary to the Philippines was made. Although I not a major donor, I am a multiple Paul Harris Fellow. Most of the members of our club contribute to our humanitarian projects which is helping to alleviate the poor in our community. We need to help them improve their lives.

I am writing you this letter hoping that your district or there are still clubs in your district that would be interested to have community service projects in our district. There are two project that I would want to propose, a water pump community project and a health project involving converting a small building into an infirmary for indigent children.

My immediate concern is the renovation of an existing small building into an infirmary. The work will consist of converting a seven by four-and-a-half-meter room into an infirmary for sick boys. This is in our Boystown in Davao City that houses 49 boys mostly in high school.

Boystown was organized more that 30 years ago by concerned civic minded citizens of Davao City primarily to house young displaced indigent kids roaming in the city without food and shelter that have often fallen into the prey of vices. Mostly, if not all, since they are uneducated and very poor, easily succumbed to petty crimes and victims of drug peddlers in order to survive the day to day living.

The last 25 years, after being able to get a property donated by a generous person and being able to build small buildings to house these boys, the founders organized themselves into a group with officers to help run Boystown. Since we can hardly have enough to put up a trust fund Boystown has been dependent on the contributions and donations of generous donors or individuals. We were also able to get aids from the City but very limited.

PDG Tony, I have been involved with Boystown since it was organized. I have not want to be an officer but after our last president died five years ago, since no one wants to head the institution, I have been the president since then. With 49 boys in our care, we reached almost 90 boys before, but because of limited funds to run Boystown the numbers of Boys have reduced. WE hire house parents and social workers to help us manage Boystown and as a matter of fact we are paying a Salesian priest, (Don Bosco) to manage Boystown. The priest can help the boys in moral values.

Our Mission is to mold boys into God-loving and upright citizens by providing these indigent kids proper basic education, food, clothing and shelter. Lately, we admit boys from grade five up to fourth year high school. Most of them leave Boystown, unless send out because of major infractions or offenses, having basic training in computer and other skills training. We see to it that they would not go back to square one.

PDG Tony, if this is not asking too much I would want to solicit from your district or any of the clubs in your district the amount of \$2000. or even less so that we can provide Boystown with an infirmary, a descent room to house our boys who are sick. As for the other needs of the room we will provide them. Whatever little help your district can give will be very much be appreciated.

From the District Treasurer

Important Information relative to November 15:



Please be sure that your club files its IRS Form 990 Tax Return by November 15. If you fail to do so for three consecutive years, your club will lose its non-profit status. Most clubs can file a Form 990-EZ. Clubs that have less than \$50,000 in total income (dues, meals, fund raising, fines, etc.) can file a very simple Form 990-N report online at the IRS.

If your club has a separate 501(c)(3) Foundation, the rules are much more complex. First, the foundation must file a separate Form 990-EZ or 990-N as you do for your club. The same rules apply. However, in Vermont, you must register with the state and file a Form every two years. In New Hampshire you must register and file an Annual Report with the Attorney General Charitable Trusts Unit no matter how little income you have. Failure to file can result in a \$10,000 fine.

You should also confirm that Rotary International has your 501(c)(3) Foundation registered under your club. If it is not registered, it is NOT COVERED by the Rotary International Liability and D&O Insurance Policy.
