Meredith Rotary's Interact Club Holiday Spirit

Inter-Lakes High School Interact Club, sponsored by Meredith Rotary, has demonstrated their holiday spirit through various activities during December. Rotary's Interact clubs are service based clubs for students ages 12-18 to 'make a real difference' while having fun.

The ILHS Interact Club donated money to the Cash and Cans Money & Food Drive which collects money and non-perishable food items for the benefit of over a dozen causes throughout central New Hampshire over the holiday season.

Several club members supported the The Greater Lakes Region Children's Auction by manning the Auction's phone bank as well as the Club making a cash donation to the Auction. Over the past 37 years the Auction has raised \$5.4 million dollars for the needs of Lakes Region children and their families.

New Beginnings and Belknap House, both in Laconia, received socks, scarves, hats, etc. collected by the Interact Club. New Beginnings provides safe and urgent refuge and support to victims of emotional or physical domestic violence. Belknap House's mission is to provide families a safe

shelter - especially in cold weather months – while empowering families to become self-sufficient and independent.

Interact members sang Christmas carols to New Hampshire Veterans Home residents, then had the opportunity to talk with the residents to learn about their experiences while in service to our country. The mission of the New Hampshire Veterans Home is to provide the best quality of life for NH Veterans with dignity, honor and respect.

Bow Early Act Club Raises \$1,718.17 for Polio Eradication

The Bow Early Act Club ran a “Pennies for Polio” fundraiser by placing donation containers throughout the Bow Middle School. The club collected a total of \$1,718.17 and donated it to the Bow Rotary Foundation, to which the Bow Rotary Club matched their \$1,718.17 and donated the total of \$3,440.00 to Rotary International’s End Polio Now Campaign.

The Early Act Club is shown presenting their check to Bow Rotarian Alan Kanegsberg. The Bow Early Act Club comprises approximately twenty 7th and 8th graders at the Bow Middle School. They are supported by one teacher advisor and two Bow Rotarian advisors, Jeannie Richards and Peter Imse.

Rotary International has been working to eradicate polio for more than 30 years. As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, Rotary has reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since their first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979 and have gone on to helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries.

So far, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.8 billion toward eradicating the disease worldwide. Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan.

Jed Donelan (pictured above) from the New England Center for Civic Life (NECCL) introduced the club to the deliberative practices used by the Franklin Pierce University organization to engage in community dialogues on controversial, contemporary issues.

The regular Thursday breakfast meeting at the Woodbound Inn on January 10 was followed by a two hour forum . An interactive deliberative dialogue on the topic of immigration was led by three colleagues from the NECCL, using the materials “Coming To America: Who Should We Welcome – What Should We Do?” brief developed by the National Issues Forums(NIF), which has been used to moderate dialogues across the United States.

The Rotarians found the community forum conversation on immigration issues to be engaging, complex and in several ways mind-changing as the strong push for a "Wall" by President Trump stimulated the deliberative discussion. Rotarians in our Club who invested the morning in the process congratulated the presenters on a vital, informative, and educational discussion.



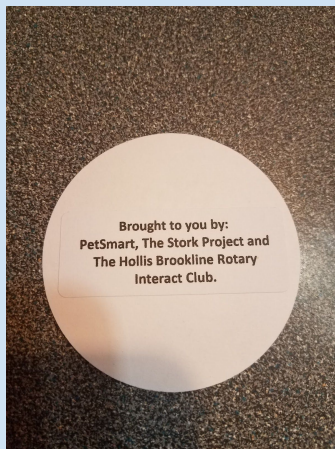

40th Annual Great Meredith Rotary Ice Fishing Derby Set for Weekend of February 9-10

****FUN FACT: Meredith's Ice Fishing Derby is currently the highest grossing fundraiser in our District!****

January 10, 2019 – The much anticipated 40th anniversary of the Great Meredith Rotary Ice Fishing Derby will take place the weekend of February 9-10, 2019.

“The Derby brings anglers and families from as far away as Texas and California to enjoy the beauty of New Hampshire and also be in the running for over \$50,000 in cash prizes,” according to Dave Reid, Derby Chairman for 2019.

Derby tickets are \$40 each and are required for everyone who enters a fish for consideration. The price of the Derby ticket also includes a \$10 dining certificate from T-BONES and Cactus Jack's in Laconia. Prizes for the top winning fish are \$15,000, \$5,000 and \$3,000. There are also two \$5,000 cash drawings during the weekend as well as \$100 cash drawings every 15 minutes beginning at noon on the Saturday of the event and lasting until 4pm on Sunday. You do not need to fish – or enter a fish – to win these cash drawings – simply purchase a Derby ticket!

“Additionally, on Saturday, February 9, 2019, in conjunction with the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department, The Meredith Rotary Ice Fishing Derby will host the “Let's Go Fishing” program,” according to Dave Reid. “This is a free hands-on clinic for kids and their parents on the basics of ice fishing that has been developed and will be presented by the Fish and Game Department. The clinic is geared toward kids but is open to anyone; those 16 and under must be accompanied by an adult. All equipment will be provided – you do not need to have a fishing license to participate,” Reid stated.
