Greetings From Your District Governor



Dear Rotary Friends:

Having visited all the 59 clubs in our District, I can say with pride, every club in our District fulfils this basic mission admirably. Whether it is a small club with six members or a large club with over hundred members, they are all good at our core mission.

Let us address couple of important functions, among many, of a Club Presidents. We are all volunteers, who excel in our own professions and come together as Rotarians, bring with us our time, talent, and treasure to help our fellow human beings who are a little less fortunate than we are , they could be across the street locally or across the oceans globally. Basically, as Rotarians, we come together to do good in the world. Naturally, more of us , more good we do in the world. Hence, growing our clubs membership is also one of our missions. - 2. To improve retention, encourage Clubs to follow a well thought out process (District Membership Committee is going to distribute a general template shortly) that spells out how to screen a prospective member, how to induct a member (fire chat) and how to engage a new member. This helps a new member to have right expectation before joining the Rotary and thus help reduce the attrition.

The second function of Club President is to identify and develop future Rotary leaders. One of the proven methods to develop Rotary leadership is to encourage and financially incentivize newer members to attend District Conference and Rotary Leadership Institute.

Talking about Club Presidents encouraging newer members to attend District Conference, I request all Presidents to please encourage (financially, if necessary) your club members to sign up for a fun filled three day District Conference, May 3 to 5 at Double Tree, Danvers, MA. We only have a week and half to sign up with blocked room rates. Starting April 1st, the registrations will go up by \$50 for couple and \$25 for single. Please sign up early to avoid the increase.


Safe WASH Program for Students in La Jagua, Honduras

Water, Hygiene and Sanitation Initiative in the Pedro Nufio School, La Jagua, Escuapa, Danlí

La Jagua is a village located about one hour, by truck, from Danlí, a small city in southern Honduras. Forty students, ages 5 to 15, attend the local school, Escuela Pedro Nufio. Anna is the teacher of Escuela Pedro Nufio and is responsible for educating all 40 children in the school.

Until very recently, the only water point of the school was a well with a hand pump. Students had to pump water for 15 minutes to fill a 20 liter bucket. They used bucket after bucket of contaminated water for drinking, as well as cleaning the blackboard and the classroom. Students also had to carry heavy



A year ago, the Community Health Center of La Jagua reported many cases of diarrhea, with some cases of children diagnosed with hepatitis. The situation in La Jagua was identified as "critical", in dire need of safe water and sanitation solutions.

To support the health and wellbeing of the children of La Jagua, the teacher and parents came to Pure Water for the World to collaborate and focus on what could be done to improve the health situation at the school.

Last month, the Pure Water for the World team came, along with amazing volunteers, to implement a comprehensive safe WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene) program at Escuela Pedro Nufio.

Thanks to funding provided by Rotary District 7870 (southern NH & VT) and a group of volunteers from the United States that have become well-known as The Amigos of Honduras, a biosand water filter was installed in the school's classroom and three latrines, with five taps in the hand-washing station, were constructed. What's more, an electric generator was installed to pump the water from the well. Now, it takes only 10 minutes to fill the 400 liter water tank!







A very special thank you goes to Chris Parkinson and Tony Gilmore for their remarkable efforts with organizing the teamwork in Honduras.

The students and the teacher were very excited during the entire installation and construction process, as they knew it would dramatically improve the health and safety situation at the school.

To support the long-term success of the program, hygiene training was given to Anna, the teacher, and David, President of the Parent Association, about how to effectively use the filter and latrines as well as how to safely maintain them.

Anna took on the responsibility of pouring a bucket of water into the filter each morning. Students are in charge of bringing their own water bottles that they will fill and use each day so they are always drinking safe, clean water at school.

The teacher, parents, and students are overjoyed with the new latrines. To help them understand how to safely use the latrines and hand-washing stations, a variety of educational activities were performed, by the PWW team, with the students and Anna.

The community of La Jagua feels tremendous relief that their children now have safe water to drink and safe bathroom facilities at school.



Because of this project, these students no longer have to spend a significant part of every school day pumping and transporting water that was not even safe to drink! Instead, they can now focus on learning in the classroom, and they can spend their break time just being children, having fun on the playground!

"We have been looking forward to having these installations for many years," says Juan Bautista, the former teacher of Escuela Pedro Nufio, who retired after 30 years. "We are proud of how much the students' parents and Anna have gotten involved and contributed to help carry out the project with Pure Water for the World and The Amigos of Honduras. Thank you so much."



Not only will this project change the lives of these 40 children, it will continue to impact the lives of all of the students who will come to this school in future years! Thank you so very much Rotary District 7870 and The Amigos of Honduras for generously supporting the children, families and community of La Jagua and creating lasting change.

Newport Rotary Club for 9th Annual Penny Sale Underway

Saturday May 11th - Doors Open at 5:30 PM

Plans for the Newport Rotary Clubs 9th Annual Penny Sale are well underway, according to Bruce Jasper, Chair of this year's event. "We're excited to announce the date - Saturday May 11th - for this year's event, our major fundraiser of the year. Our partners are back - with Dan Cherry as MC for the evening. Dan does an excellent job keeping the evening moving along as he announces the winners of 300+ prizes that will be drawn. The Newport Senior Center will be selling refreshments so those attending can grab a snack as they enjoy the evening and collect prizes. The penny sale will be held at the Newport Middle High School Gymnasium. We will open the doors at 5:30 PM - a half hour earlier than in past years - and we will begin drawing prizes at 6:30 PM," Jasper explained. "We've received staunch support from the community each time we have held a penny sale. The public has always turned out to support our efforts and we've tried very hard to plan an event that was fun for everyone participating. At the same time, we are committed to raising funds for local and worldwide projects which is an important goal for all Rotary Clubs."

"During the next two months' Rotary members will be contacting area businesses asking for their support. The business community has very generously supported our penny sales in the past by donating prizes that draw a sizeable crowd. We are grateful and hope that will be the case again this year. In addition to the 300 prizes we will raffle that evening Rotary members are already selling tickets for a cash prize we will award as the finale that night. One thousand dollars will be raffled that evening as the first prize for this portion of the penny sale. A second prize of \$500 will also be given away. You do not have to be present to win the cash prizes," Jasper explained.

Penny sales are popular as they offer the public an opportunity to support a worthwhile cause and have an enjoyable evening that is affordable and family friendly. Rotary President Jan McMahon added "We will draw three rounds of prizes Saturday evening and will give away 100 prizes in each round. Tickets will cost \$1.00 each, \$5.00 for six, \$10.00 for 12, and \$20.00 for 25 and all tickets for each round will be placed in a tumbler. When a ticket is drawn the individual holding the ticket will win the prize for that numbered item and then the ticket is returned to the tumbler and is eligible to be drawn again."

"Our swap table gives people a second chance if they win something they might not use. They can swap it out with another prize. That always adds to the evening's fun." McMahon added. In addition to the three rounds where 300 prizes will be given away, several large prizes will be drawn after the last round. Tickets from all three rounds will be placed back in the tumbler and





large prizes will be drawn. Finally the cash prizes will be awarded. Tickets for the cash prizes are available now from any Rotary member and will be on sale throughout the evening of May 11th. The price for those tickets is also \$1.00 each, \$5.00 for six tickets, \$10.00 for 12 tickets, and \$20.00 for 25 tickets.

"We have identified three local major beneficiaries for this event. They include the Newport Community Center Building Fund, the Newport Police Cadet program and funding for a Mini Grant Program our Club established for Newport Teachers in 2017. In each of the last two years our Club was able to fund five \$1,000 grants at the Newport High School. We would like to continue that project and may open it to other levels as well.

"Businesses are also asked to sponsor the event with donations of \$100, \$250, \$500, or \$1,000. Businesses across the region support our efforts and we have already begun receiving prizes and sponsorships. Holding a penny sale means a lot of legwork for all of our Club members. However, the outcome is so beneficial to so many we feel it is definitely worth it" McMahon ended. Doors will open at 5:30pm on Saturday, May 11th, and the first prize will be drawn at 6:30pm. Refreshments will be available and all businesses contributing will be recognized that evening.
