The club filed suit, claiming that Rotary rules discriminated based on gender, which violated the state's civil rights act. The court battle went all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court in 1987, which ruled FOR the Rotary Club. That club elected its first female president that same year. What was the name of the Rotary Club? A2. The Rotary Club of Duarte in California.

D7870 District Grant Schedule 2023-2024

For the 2023-24 Rotary Year, District 7870 will provide District Designated Grants in the following format this year. There will be approximately \$30,000 available and any Club may apply for up to \$1000. Grants must be matched by the same amount in Club funds for which they apply. Clubs may apply for smaller amounts than the upper limit. Requests may be approved by the Committee for fewer dollars considering total funds available and number of applications received.

The funds must be used only for a specific community project as described in the District Grant Application Form.

A Club should send a representative to attend a District Grant Seminar to become certified if they have not been in the past. This is only mandatory for Global Grants but there is important information to be learned about Rotary Grants in general. If you are unsure of your Club's Certification status, please contact DRFC Venu Rao or incoming DRFC Dianne Barclay (see contact info below).

District Grant applications will be accepted online. The link is posted on the District Website.



Applications must be received online by midnight on June 15, 2023. The District Grant Committee will make its decisions by July 15, 2023 and the District Treasurer will disperse funds by August 15, 2023, subject to the timing of approval by The Rotary Foundation. These Grants amounts are at the discretion of the District but will need to be reported to, and approved by, the Rotary Foundation in order for the District Designated Funds to be released.

Using Technology to Improve Youth Health & Wellness at Pine Ridge Indian Reservation

For over a decade, members of Rotary District 7870 NH/VT have been helping residents of Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota through many projects from upgrading KILI Radio to providing laptops for students to delivering quilting materials for traditional quilts. And working with South Dakota Rotary Clubs, funding a makerspace for native artists.



This past fall, we were contacted by Doni DeCory, director of health and wellness for the Oglala Lakota County Schools. She was looking for a way to help students and teachers get healthy together. She wanted to make wellness a priority. Her idea was to give each student and teacher their own Fitbit.

Fitbits are a fitness tracker that you can wear on your wrist, the devices have sensors underneath that can monitor your blood pressure, your pulse, your heart rate, and the steps that you take. The core functionality in all Fitbit trackers is a pedometer, a three-point accelerometer that tracks your movements, it gathers data and translates it into digital signals to measure your physical activity and the steps you have taken.

To jumpstart her 'Let's get healthy together program' she needed 1200 Fitbits for staff members and students. Three Rotary District 7870 past district governors John Siemienowicz, Venu Rao and Tony Gilmore heard about the need and donated the funds.

"We've encouraged each school site to develop their own wellness plan that takes into consideration the emotional, social, mental and physical well-being of their staff and students," said DeCory, "we did a survey with the staff of each school, some set up a fitness center in their school, some did a wellness room, some are planning on having staff and students participate in a Volksmarch, some got bikes while others are incorporating the Lakota culture, most importantly working with staff and students to think about wellness."

"Oglala Lakota County Schools has four elementary/ middle schools, a high school and a virtual high school with 435 staff and close to 1,800 students, Wolf Creek 581, Rockyford 404, Batesland 220, Red Shirt 49, Lakota Tech 354 and Virtual high school 154. With the 1,200 Fitbits, every staff member and as many students as possible get to use them in a PE class or a class activity," added



DeCory, "both Red Shirt School and Lakota Tech high school are using them in PE classes, there's potential competition between classes and schools, at Wolf Creek their Fitbit competition for the number of steps." To date, one had 177,000, another 180,000 steps while the leader is at 247,000 steps.

In Batesland, there has been a Fitbit challenge competition between staff with two to a team, some taking a virtual walk to Rapid City and back, one competitor lost 48 pounds during the competition, stated DeCory, we have a lot of students who don't go out for organized sports but we're looking at how they can become more active, how they can be involved in their own personal fitness.

"We're looking at getting students educated and interested in moving forward with healthy habits such as walking," said DeCory, "we are hoping to use that as a boost to try more physical activities or get them to engage in achieving 10,000 steps a day."
