#### Greetings From Your District Governor David Saturley



I hope this newsletter finds you all in good health and high spirits. It's been a busy start to the Rotary Year around our District. With the August theme of Membership and New Club Development, our District has no shortage of good news to share. The introductory meeting of the D7870 chapter of RAGMHI (Rotary Action Group on Mental Health Initiatives) was held on Sunday, July 30<sup>th</sup>. Our chapter will serve as a platform to engage in meaningful activities that will be in keeping with Rotary International President Gordon MacInally's request that we adopt

a multi-year three-part plan of erasing stigma, raising awareness, and improving access. If you missed the first meeting, it was recorded, and the link can be found in this newsletter, along with information about upcoming sessions.

Clubs have been squeezing events in between raindrops, and at least two clubs have been wringing raindrops from buildings. The members of the Rotary Clubs of Ludlow and Wantastiquet have

been working tirelessly to support their communities as they recover from devastating flooding. Monetary and supply donations have come from far and wide, but one supply donation stands out. Several members of the Rotary Club of North Kingstown, Rhode Island in District 7950 are employed by Ocean State Job Lots. Ocean State has a charitable arm to their corporation, and wanted to assist those affected by the flooding. Connections were made, and on July 28<sup>th</sup> at about 7am, a 48 ft trailer packed full of supplies arrived at the Ludlow Community Center. Not



only did Ocean State Job Lots send the supplies, their Chief of Charitable Operations also made the trip, working side by side with volunteers from the Ludlow Rotary Club, Cota & Cota, and the Ludlow Fire Department to offload the donated materials. (photo of trailer offloading)

# Call for Nominations for District Governor 2026-27

Nominations are now being accepted for the position of District Governor for the Rotary year 2026-27. Please consider nominating a qualified candidate from your club.



Application materials and a job description are available on the District Website <u>http://rotary7870.org</u> in the site pages section entitled "District Governor Application Materials". Note: you must be logged into the District website to access these materials.

District Governor (to serve 2026-2027). Qualifications for District Governor are as follows:

- Nominee must be a Rotarian in good standing of a Club in the District
- Nominee must be of outstanding personal caliber and must maintain full qualifications of membership
- · The integrity of the Nominee's classification must be without question
- Nominee must be a member of a functioning club, in good standing, that has no outstanding indebtedness to Rotary International or District 7870
- Nominee must have served as a Rotary Club President for a full term
- Nominee must have been a Rotarian for at least seven (7) years at the time of taking office
- · Nominee must demonstrate willingness, commitment, and ability, (Physically and otherwise, to

fulfill the duties and responsibilities of the office of District Governor)

Traditionally, the nominating committee also looks for Nominees with a record of club and district participation, an outstanding attendance record, and demonstrated civic interest in their community. Rotary International suggests that Nominees have necessary computer skills, and Rotary International also mandates attendance at the Governors-Elect Training Seminar and the International Assembly.

Please upload all nominations and supporting documents on the District Website <u>http://rotary7870.org</u> under the Site Page "District Governor Application Materials" **no later than August 31, 2023**. Submissions uploaded after August 31, 2023, will NOT be considered.

Interviews of the candidates for District Governor 26-27 will take place during the middle of September 2023, invitations will be forwarded to each candidate. Specific times will be assigned to each candidate. Failure to appear for any reason will automatically eliminate the candidate from consideration.

Why would a club want to do this? Demonstrate that your club's activities are aligned with the mission of Rotary International. Harvard Business Review has reported on research that suggests that organizations with written goals are 30 times more likely to achieve those goals than organizations with no goals. Work towards achieving your club's strategic plan. Quarterly reviews allow for re-assessment and a re-deployment of club members' volunteer efforts. Optimize allocation of the club's resources. Congratulations to our five recipients this year. I look forward to presenting the citations at their clubs.

# Keene Elm City Rotary Announces 2023 Scholarship Winners

The Keene Elm City Rotary Scholarship Committee announced that they awarded six Monadnock area students nearly \$7,500 for the club's Unsung Hero and Ken Jue Scholarships. Keisha Somero was awarded both the inaugural Ken Jue Scholarship and an Unsung Hero Scholarship. Somero is a graduate of Liberty University Online Academy. She is studying to be an LNA at River Valley Community College.



Other winners of the Unsung Hero scholarship include:

- Evelyn Proctor, a 2023 graduate from UNH, earned a BA in Biochemistry, Molecular and Cellular Biology. Proctor is currently enrolled in an accelerated master's degree in Biochemistry at UNH and is working on skin cancer research.

- Isabella Tommila, a 2023 from Monadnock High, will attend Keene State as a Criminal Justice major with a minor in Psychology. Tommila plans to be a child welfare advocate.

- Annie Henderson has a BS General Biology and MA Liberal Arts Saint Michael's College. She will be graduating with an MS in Environmental Studies and Environmental Education from Antioch University this year.

- Sean Nelligan, a 2023 graduate of Our Lady of Mercy High School, will study Music Technology at Keene State.

- Austin Wyman, a 2022 graduate of Monadnock High and the NH Fire Academy, is studying Fire Science and EMT at Lakes Region Community College.

Elm City Rotary's annual Unsung Hero Scholarship recognizes individuals of the Monadnock Region who have engaged in significant service above self. Such service may be to their community, place of worship, school or family and may have come at a cost to that personal academic or personal career.

The Ken Jue Scholarship recognizes an individual who meets the above description and has personal experience in or plans to study or work in the areas of mental health, physical health, social work or advocacy for inclusion of marginalized persons. The Ken Jue Scholarship was created in 2022, after the death of long-time Rotary member Ken Jue.

Scholarship applicants must be a Monadnock Region resident, at least 16 years old, already accepted to an accredited institution of further learning or training and in need financial support.



Scholarship committee member Jay Smeltz said, "The idea is to identify deserving people who may be overlooked by more traditional scholarship funds."

Since the scholarship committee's inception in 2002, the Keene Elm City Rotary Club has awarded over \$98,500 to 53 individuals. Previous winners may apply for continued support. In addition to the monetary award, the Keene Elm City Rotary Club offers mentoring, networking, and any other assistance to help recipients successfully complete their chosen course of study, linking them to internship opportunities, employment and acting as personal references. Unlike most scholarships that are paid to the schools, these scholarships help support the student with the many incidental expenses related to their schooling, like books, supplies and travel.

# Fleming Updates Ludlow Rotary on African Orphanage



At our August 1, 2023, meeting, the Ludlow Rotary Club was pleased to welcome back Robert Fleming and Amy Carst of Malayaka House, Entebbe, Uganda.

Robert's story is amazing, how as a tourist in Uganda 18 years ago he became aware of a pregnant young woman not comprehending her pregnancy. Robert took it upon himself to keep a watchful eye and help as he may. The woman had her baby girl and abandoned it in the bathroom of the hospital. Since Robert brought her in, the police told him to take the baby as no one would

want the child. The next day, Robert was given another young child by the police. You see children are dispensable in Uganda and Robert, being American, was believed to be able to care for them.

Robert, a single person on vacation, did not know how to change a diaper or care for a child. He learned very quickly. Hence, his first baby girl was named Malayaka, (Angel) and the Malayaka house was "born". Many children have been welcomed here each with their own heart-wrenching story. All are well loved, cared for and educated at the best schools and onto university if the desire is there. Malayaka House is their home, forever welcomed, and Robert is their "Uncle".

Fifty children have been so wonderfully cared for, and loved. They have an amazing sense of self and caring for each other. Robert, no longer, runs Malayaka House as it takes more than he to manage the day-to-day paperwork etc. Instead, Robert freely spends time with the children day to day, arranges for their education and welfare and focuses of public speaking and raising the funds continually needed to provide for the children.

All those years ago, perhaps 15, Rotary was introduced to Robert, his story and Malayaka House. The Ludlow Rotary Club was so impressed that it wrote and received a sizable Rotary District 7870 grant to assist with the installation of solar panels for Malayaka House.

The club was so touched by the kindness of Robert and his staff! A few Rotarians have visited Malayaka House. Joseph is actively working towards obtaining a journeyman's license and is on placement to apprentice with Longchamp Electric along with obtaining certification as an umpire for Babe Ruth Games.

**Samantha McDaniel** of Nashua, and a mom of two young children, has proven to be an invaluable member of our community and is pursuing a course in Nursing. As a recovery support worker, her dedication, compassion and level of care, have helped many individuals in their healing process.

**Heather Loby,** is looking to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Human Services with a concentration on Child and Family Services at SNHU. With a history of mental health concerns, she found solace in Equine Therapy, and has founded Healing on Manes -Trauma Informed, Equine Assisted Learning. Her non-profit, here in NH, helps children heal their emotional traumas.

# Ludlow Rotary Contributes \$13,000 and Personal Effort to Flood Recovery

"Unsurprisingly, many of our fellow Rotarians in the area have jumped in to help some of the many people and organizations in our communities adversely affected by the recent flooding". With this simple, yet heartfelt summary, Tom Ray, Ludlow Rotary Club President, indicated what the Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) had done to date to assist in the vast recovery effort.

Thus far, the LRC has donated \$8,000 for dehumidifiers that were immediately needed by residents and businesses in the area. Following this, the LRC donated \$5,000 to the BRAT (Black River Action Team) to assist that group in its recovery program cleaning the river of debris.

In addition to checking that all of its members were safe and offering assistance to those who suffered from the ravages of the flood and mud-slides, the club members participated in a "clean up" at the Timber Inn Motel.

At the request of the Okemo Valley Regional Chamber of Commerce, the LRC offered to use its charitable fund so that the Chamber's fund-raising drive would be tax-deductible to donors. The LRC's Facebook site became a source of helpful information.

A number of other Rotary Clubs throughout New England have already sent contributions to the LRC as well as several area businesses and organizations in support of recovery relief.

Tom Ray indicated that much more needed to done, noting "While substantial aid in the form of food, supplies, money and recovery assistance has been arriving, much more will be needed to restore the many homes, businesses and the landscape devastated by this storm. The Rotary Club of Ludlow, Vermont, has been coordinating with other civic organizations to provide relief and assistance".



LRC Treasurer, Kim Lampert, indicated that tax-deductible donations could be sent to the LRC's 501(c)(3) foundation. The address is: Ludlow Area Rotary Charitable Fund (LARCF), PO Box 216, Ludlow, VT 05149

# Springfield VT Rotary Earns Third Trex Bench for Springfield Community



As a reward for Springfield residents collecting more than 500 pounds of thin film plastics within a ten-week period during the Trex Thin Film Plastics Challenge, the Trex Company (Trex) provided the Springfield Rotary Club with an outdoor bench that was placed at the Park Street School overlooking the Kingsbury House by the Union Park Neighborhood Association and the Springfield Park and Recreation Department.

The Rotary Club entered the Trex Thin Film Plastics Challenge on January 1st on behalf of the Springfield community, placing a Trex Bin

in the Springfield Town Library. In addition, thin film plastic was collected at McGee CDJR of Springfield, Springfield GMC, and the Springfield Food Co-op. Since that time, Springfield residents have been avidly pitching in to recycle their share of thin film plastics, amassing 1616 pounds of thin film plastics in under six months.

The Challenge is part of the Trex Recycling Program, aimed at encouraging the public to recycle their grocery bags, bread bags, produce bags, cereal bags, ice bags, case overwrap, bubble wrap, dry cleaning bags, Ziploc and other resealable bags, and similar bags and wrap for other objects. If the sponsoring group's participants collect 500 or more pounds of thin film plastics within a six-month period, Trex will send the group a Trex Outdoor Furniture 48" Yacht Club Bench.

This is the third bench that has been donated. The first two can be found at The Common. Volunteers from the Springfield Rotary Club and from the Springfield Town Library collected and weighed the bags, reported the bags' weight to Trex, and delivered the bags to Trex's closest participating drop-off retailer location, Shaw's Supermarket in Springfield.

The Trex Bin will remain in place at the Springfield Town Library. The Springfield Rotary Club is partnering with the Black River Action Group to launch another Challenge and earn an additional outdoor bench for our community.



The benches are dedicated to the 95<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Springfield Rotary.

# Fitness Project Promotes Health for Oglala Lakota Schools

For more than a decade, members of Rotary District 7870 (New Hampshire, Vermont, USA) have been helping residents of Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. The district's service projects have ranged from making upgrades to the local nonprofit radio station, to providing laptops for students, to delivering





materials for traditional quilts. District Rotarians have also partnered with South Dakota Rotary clubs to fund a makerspace for native artists.

This past fall, we were contacted by Doni DeCory, director of health and wellness for the Oglala Lakota County School district. She was looking for a way to help students and teachers get healthy together. She wanted to make wellness a priority. Her idea was to give each student and teacher their own Fitbit.

Fitbits are fitness trackers you can wear on your wrist. The devices have sensors underneath that monitor your blood pressure, your pulse, your heart rate, and the number of steps you take. The core functionality in all the trackers is a pedometer: a three-point accelerometer that tracks your movements, gathers data, and translates the information into digital signals to measure your physical activity.

#### Getting healthy together

To jumpstart her "Let's get healthy together" program, DeCory needed 1,200 trackers for staff members and students. Three past district governors – John Siemienowicz, Venu Rao, and Tony Gilmore – heard about the need and donated the funds.

DeCory encouraged each school to develop their own wellness plan that took into consideration the emotional, social, mental, and physical well-being of their staff and students. Some set up fitness centers in their schools. Others created wellness rooms, while others incorporated their Lakota culture into their wellness response.

Oglala Lakota County has four elementary or middle schools, a high school, and a virtual high school with 435 staff and close to 1,800 students. With the 1,200 trackers, every staff member and as many students as possible are able to use them in physical education classes or other class activities. One of the schools held a competition for most steps.

#### Walking to stay fit

At another of the schools, staff participated in a fitness challenge and took a virtual walk to Rapid City and back. One competitor lost 48 pounds. DeCory said the trackers have encouraged a lot of students who don't get involved in organized sports to find ways to become more active and improve their fitness.



One of the goals of the project is to get students interested in healthy habits like walking. The devices have helped build self-esteem and given all students – even those who are reticent to participate in new activities in gym class – another way to stay fit.

Some of the staff who were diabetic were able to improve their nutrition, lower their blood sugar, and come off their medication. The district was able to avoid an increase in staff health insurance rates for the first time due to fewer claims and increased attention to fitness.

It's our hope that this project will encourage the students to engage in more physical activities and aim to achieve a target of 10,000 steps a day, a goal recommended by the National Institutes of Health.

This trip will have the same three areas of focus as with previous trips: medical and dental brigade, school construction, and a Pure Water for the World project. Typically, the projects on these mission trips require funds between \$10,000 and \$15,000. For these reasons, all contributions are greatly appreciated. Please know that 100% of the funds that are contributed will go to the projects, as our team members fund their own travel expenses, and the administrative costs are donated.



The cost to a team member usually ranges from \$1,200 to \$1,400 depending on airfare. We will be selecting the optimal flights for the team and will let the members know this information so they can purchase their tickets.
