We have also chartered the Justice Equity Diversity and Inclusion Rotaract Club (JEDI) in Rutland, VT. JEDI is a community based Rotaract Club organized by Arwen Turner (also a member of Rutland Rotary). Many thanks to President Erika Berner and the Wallingford Rotary Club for sponsoring JEDI Rotaract. I am looking forward to seeing and supporting the service projects that will promote inclusion in the Rutland community.

The club has also provided support to a variety of international initiatives such as End Polio Now. After over 35 years of hard work, Rotary and its partners are on the brink of eradicating this tenacious disease. Additional efforts have been put forth to support a range of international humanitarian projects. Springfield Rotarians have personally been involved with medical and educational projects in Honduras and an orphanage project in Mexico. And, along with eight other clubs in Vermont and New Hampshire, the club provided a local children's hospital with a pediatric bronchoscope in South Africa.

Ludlow Rotary Hears from Expeditionary School at Black River Board Member Patrick Pullinen

At their January 11th meeting the Ludlow Rotary Club heard from Pat Pullinen, of the Expeditionary School at Black River (ESBR) Board of Directors. The school is now in its 3rd year of operation, offering project based learning to students in grades 7 through 12. The Board has been working for state certification approval for the past 3 years. Certification would allow school choice for students to attend the school bringing state tuition reimbursement with them. This funding would permit the school to hire more faculty and accept more students.

The application to the State resulted in the board being asked additional questions, hosting a site visit and finally, subcommittee review. Unfortunately, the subcommittee recommended denial. The Board has added requested procedures and processes as a result of the review. They will go through the certification process again, hoping to be able to establish a \$150,000 budget. To be successful as a school, they need to be able to plan and budget with State certification.

Expeditionary learning is a rare option for students. There are only 116 recognized programs in the US that offer this interdisciplinary approach to learning. All students do projects as part of their education. Projects can be anything a student wishes. Each project includes math, science, and English combined into the project study. Proficiency based grading is used.

In response to a question, Pullinen stated that currently, the target number of students ESBR can support is 14 to 15, so they are not recruiting because they are at capacity. Expeditionary school should be the future of education, he feels. Pullinen did ask members of the Rotary Club to consider joining their board as ESBR is currently recruiting new board members.


presentation of plans for celebration of the ninth annual Jaffrey and Rindge program scheduled for Monday, January 16 at the Park Theatre.

The theme of the program directed attention to Dr. King's famous exhortation, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere" with a focus on environmental justice. Interact President Ellie Weinmann moderated the program, taking over the role of Rotarian Owen Houghton for the first eight years. Keynote speaker Aaron Mair, a prominent wilderness advocate and environmental justice activist, recent past president of the national Sierra Club, and the Club's first African American president, addressed "Shades of justice: building a diverse and inclusive environmental movement." Other features included interpretation and commentary on a speech passage of Dr. King's by Andrea Rivera, the Franklin Pierce University Student Representative to the MLK Committee; musical performances by our school choruses; and presentation of sixth grade projects by Dr. Peggie Ueda.. The MilliporeSigma-MLK Student Scholarship opportunity was announced and a reception followed with exhibits of student works reflecting the environmental justice theme.
