Congratulations to Douglas "Doug" Rupert Our 2022 District Treasure Award Winner

I am honored to congratulate Rotarian Doug Rupert in becoming our next AL Kerr District Treasure award winner for the Rotary year ending 2022. Please joining me in recognizing Doug's achievements and feel free to send your congratulations to Doug in whatever format works for you. I have included below Doug's Rotary Pedigree as submitted by the RC Milford, NH for consideration by this year's selection committee. This correspondence was only one of several letters of recommendations the committee received regarding Doug as a District Treasure Candidate. While all the nominees were worthy, the committee this year chose Doug for his outstanding and enduring commitments to RI and the world.

Please accept this letter of nomination for the 2022 District Treasure Award, in support of Douglas Rupert, of the Milford Rotary Club (MRC). The impact of Doug's hard work, enthusiasm and love of Rotary has helped so many in our Club, in our District, as well as internationally. He was one of the first Milford Rotarians I met when I considered joining back in 2012. His enthusiasm for Rotary inspired me and he encouraged me to give it a try. After one year in the Club, representing the MRC Nominations Committee, he asked me to become Assistant Treasurer after



which he encouraged me to start my journey on the presidential track. Rotary has no doubt enriched my life.

Doug has been a member of MRC since November 1, 1991 and will have earned 30 years of perfect attendance as of this coming June 30th. His sponsor was past Milford Rotarian Francis Perry, who Doug misses greatly and still talks about fondly, albeit emotionally. Doug has sponsored five MRC members: John Bianchi, Chris Janson, Karen Keating, Allise de Smet and George Scollin. He has held practically every Board Position in the Club and is currently in his second year of a two year Director term. He has also been a Trustee of the Milford Rotary Club's Foundation, at least twice, and has served as its Secretary. Doug was awarded the MRC Stan Powers Award for commitment to Rotary Service in 2007. He is a Paul Harris Fellow+3, was President of MRC from 2010-2011, served as an Assistant Governor (2012-2015), served as Youth Exchange Coordinator, and received an RI Presidential Citation in 2016 for his work for Pure Water for the World (PWW). He is also a Rotary Foundation donor.

He and his wife, Mary Ann, have attended numerous Rotary conferences and conventions through the years, including the international convention, and have encouraged others in our Club to do the same. When traveling internationally he tries to fit in a visit to other Rotary clubs, exchanging Club flags and sharing stories of his Club and District. He has managed to visit Rotary Clubs in a dozen different countries, including South Africa, China, Russia and Australia. He inspires us to do the same, to try to fit some Rotary into our travels. It is a great way to help realize that your Rotary family extends beyond your own club and District.

In 2007 Doug was one of 11 adventurers who participated in an Amigos de Honduras trip where the group provided and installed water filters and built a school to support the District's humanitarian mission in Danli Honduras. He supported a construction team that built a medical clinic as well as a team of medical professionals who treated several hundred Hondurans each day. He also assisted in the delivery and set up of over 100 water filtration systems allowing families in several villages to have pure water for the first time. He was a superb member of the team and his contributions were immeasurable.

He was motivated by the people he met and the lack of safe water available to them. Doug came home from Honduras ready to work on improving these conditions.

Each year Doug has been instrumental in motivating other Clubs in the District to work together. One example of this is his 50:50 selling of MRC 100 Holes of Golf tickets, with half of the proceeds of his sales benefiting the charities the MRC supports, and the other half of the proceeds going to PWW. Doug has been seen carrying around his own credit card scanner, on his cell phone, (even long before his fellow Rotarians in our District were using such technology) at District Conferences....around town....everywhere to make raffle ticket purchasing more convenient. So innovative!



What might be considered his pièce de résistance of his Rotary achievements for the District, and beyond, would have to be the hard work he tirelessly invested in the Pure Water Global Grants. Past District Treasure Award winner and past President of PWW, Carolyn Meub, graciously put together the following details provided in support of this nomination. Carolyn emailed to say that, "Doug is a true treasure, with global reach."

Inspired by the positive effect of the work performed in Honduras and other observations of water and sanitation issues worldwide, Doug spearheaded a Global Grant project for communities in the Trojes region of Honduras and this grant project was completed in 2015.

The Impact of This Grant:

- A complete water and sanitation and education program for homes in 9 communities
- A WASH in Schools program in 9 schools
- 110 Community Agents training
- 412 filters installed in homes
- 351 latrines installed in homes
- 21 hygiene, environmental and personal hygiene trainings 3 for each community
- 1,859 people dewormed
- Impacted a total of 3,399 children, men and women

After this grant closed, Doug still felt the need to do more. He went to Haiti with then DGE Dennis McMann and became passionate about working on another Global Grant for the people for Cité Soleil. This grant was approved in either 2018 or 2019. Unfortunately, this grant has been sadly discontinued because of the violence in Cité Soleil and due to the impact of the coronavirus. Doug is still engaged in attempting to ensure the grant monies are returned to their rightful groups, and due to his doggedness this situation is in the process of being resolved.

Goal of This Grant Proposal:

- A complete WASH program for 765 homes and train 170 Community agents

- Work done to date: 643 people trained, 99 community agents trained and safe water in 277 homes

Through his tireless effort, and passion, in writing two Global Grants, which requires so much patience and countless hours, Doug has made a significant impact, on behalf of our District. And because of his hard work and the impact that his efforts produced, Doug is a treasure to all of us and to those Hondurans and Haitians who benefited from these efforts.

The impact of Doug's hard work and enthusiasm has helped so many – providing water and sanitation for those who need it while also providing jobs for those previously working for PWW. It brought an international issue, one of Rotary International's Seven Areas of Focus, home to District



7870. In doing so he has further educated our Clubs and District about these needs abroad and how one Rotarian's determination and hard work, in conjunction with the help and support of others, can make a big difference.

Thanks to MRC members John Siemienowicz, DG, Allise de Smet, Timothy Finan, MRC Immediate Past President, Marc Chareth and past President of PWW, Carolyn Meub for their help in supplying supporting information for this nomination.

Julie Cermola Janice H. McElroy Scholarship Winner 2021-22

Rotary District 7870 and the Henniker Rotary Club are pleased to announce the 2021-2022 recipient of the Janice H. McElroy Scholarship. Jan was a Past District Governor of District 7870 and Past President of the Henniker Rotary Club. Prior to her death in 2012, she requested that any donations received in her memory be dedicated to establishing a scholarship fund for non-traditional students. Her wish was that the scholarship would be awarded to a person who has completed high school or earned a G.E.D. with a three-year gap

between graduating from high school and seeking further studies.

The winner of a scholarship of \$2,000 is Julie Cermola from Saxtons River, Vermont. Julie graduated from Bellows Falls Union High School in 2010. She completed one year at Vermont Technical College and worked in the veterinary field at various clinics and humane societies. She has been working at Park's Place Community Resource Center in Bellows Falls since 2019. Julie expressed that community Service at Park's Place helped to open her eyes to new opportunities and connections. She would like to pursue an education in business and accounting at the Community College of Vermont.

Julie has achieved the status of a Certified Recovery Coach, and she was recently recognized with the Active Community ("A.C.E.") Award for her community involvement. Julie has shared her personal experiences in recovery from opiate addiction.

In her application, Julie expressed these thoughts:

I have been in recovery since February 15, 2019. And in these last few years, I have maintained a full-time job at Park's Place and have really come into who I always knew I could be. In this role, I have found a passion of mine – business and accounting. This scholarship will benefit me in so many ways. It will help me afford the cost of going back to college, which will include tuition, fees, course books and college materials.

The Janice H. McElroy Scholarship Committee expresses that it is fitting that Julie Cermola has been chosen as the recipient of this scholarship for 2021-2022. She represents the non-traditional student with a goal of seeking a post-secondary education which Jan McElroy had in mind when



she established the scholarship. Julie has demonstrated her giving heart in an effort to make our world a better place.

District 7870 expresses its thanks to the Henniker Rotary Club for managing the funds for the scholarship and to the members of the Janice H. McElroy Scholarship Committee for their efforts in establishing this scholarship. Update from Henniker Area Rotary

Henniker Area Rotary had a busy Month of May and early June. Not only did we host a highway pick-up for "spring cleaning" but we also assisted our Rush Square residents in planting flower boxes and vegetables along with putting out nearly 400 American flags for Memorial Day, the first of five holidays in 2022. One of our favorite projects this Spring was to combine a Club social with the rededication of Amey Brook Park. Twenty-six years ago, the Corps of Engineers cleared land for flood management. The vision of several Rotarians all those years ago created the beautiful park we have today. The park is part of the Corps 770 acres and is the site of the first sawmill in Henniker 1766. and Perry's children Davie and Wendy. The ceremony included memories contributed by the family and friends of Gail and Perry with refreshments in the park.

Springfield Rotary Club Tackles Food Insecurity with Weekend Backpack Program

The Rotary Club of Springfield Vermont has established a Weekend Backpack Program to help fight child hunger in Springfield.

According to Springfield Rotary Club President Karen Longo, 1 in 7 children are considered food insecure in Vermont. The most at-risk children for food insecurity are also the ones who are most affected by the achievement gap, and poor academic and athletic outcomes that can have lifelong effects.

"Currently some of the children attending the YMCA summer camp rely on the food program for most of their nutrition during the week," Longo explained, "These supports do not exist over the



weekend, so the Rotary Club of Springfield initiated the Weekend Backpack Program for campers."



"The Rotary Club prepares backpacks filled with high protein, low sugar foods every Thursday evening and delivers them to the camp on Friday mornings," Longo said, "The backpacks are sent home discreetly with the campers on Fridays to ensure they are well fed over the weekend and can come in Monday mornings, ready to hike, swim and learn."

During the first week of the program, 27 backpacks were distributed that contained water, fruits, a jar of peanut butter, crackers, veggie sticks, cheese crackers, noodles, fruit snacks, smart popcorn, carrots, pudding, hand sanitizer and utensils.

The Springfield Rotary club will continue to support the Weekend Backpack program for 8 weeks until the end of August.

The Rotary Club of Springfield, founded in 1927, is an active community service club of more than 40 members who engage in community and human service projects both locally and internationally.

Ludlow Rotary Hears from Matt Korn, Executive Director, Pure Water for the World

The July 12 luncheon meeting of the Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) featured Matt Korn, Executive Director, Pure Water for the World speaking to Rotarians and guests about the lack of clean water to drink or adequate sanitation for 2 billion people in the world. Because of these unsanitary conditions 300,000 children die every year worldwide.



Pure Water for the World partners with underserved communities in Central America and Haiti, providing the tools and education to establish sustainable safe water, sanitation and hygiene education programs. It is heavily supported by Rotary clubs around the world, having been started in1994 by the Brattleboro Rotary Club.

According to Korn, the Rutland based non-profit organization finds that clean water and sanitation facilities contributes \$4 to the local economy for every \$1 spent on equipment. Savings come from better health, a safer environment for women and girls, and seeing the girls stay in school, and women able to work, because they don't have to travel long distances for safe drinking water. Training local residents is a huge part of the program, as it is critical to its success.

In other business at the meeting, the Rotary Club inducted and welcomed Sue Starr-Adams as its newest member. Sue is an agent with Kelley Real Estate in Ludlow.

Bennington, VT: Community 4th of July Celebration

The Bennington Rotary Club collaborated with the Friends of the Bennington Monument to present the 4th of July celebration this year. This is the 9th year for the Rotary bell ringing event on July 4th. The event began with a dramatic reading of the Declaration of Independence by Michael Chapman in period costume at the monument. Following this a motor vehicle parade led by Rotarians, VFW and members of the American Legion brought the group to the Town Hall. It is appropriate to recognize what the Founding Fathers did that July 4th in 1776 when they put their





signatures on the Declaration of Independence. Thomas Jefferson knew the importance of the document that he wrote and he encouraged his countrymen to celebrate that day and every July Fourth thereafter.

The Rotary July 4th bell ringing event was inspired by Rotarian and Past President Jerry Albert. His research revealed that in 1963, both houses of Congress passed Concurrent Resolution #25 which reads in part:

"Whereas the tolling of the Liberty Bell at Independence Hall, Philadelphia, Pa., at 2 o' clock in the afternoon of the 4th day of July, 1776, proclaimed the signing of the Declaration of Independence; Now, therefore, be it Resolved, that the Congress hereby (1) declares that the anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence should be observed each year by the ringing of bells throughout the United States at the hour of 2 o' clock, eastern daylight time, in the afternoon of the 4th day of July, or at such other time on that day as may be determined by local authority, and (2) call upon civic and other community leaders to take appropriate steps to encourage public participation in such observance



We are fortunate, here in Bennington, to have churches and others that still have bells that are in working order and have participated in the bell ringing event each year. U.S Navy ships also have bells. Used for signaling, keeping time, and sounding alarms, bells are an important part of a ship's routine and readiness. Our bell comes from USS Bennington, an aircraft carrier that served our nation from 1944 through 1970.

Members of Bennington Rotary ring the bell 13 times. Once

for each of the original states. This year DG Randell Barclay rang the bell for Pennsylvania! As I am sure many of you know, Vermont is the 14th State in the Union. The State of Vermont was born in Bennington. So it is only fitting that we ring our bells one more time...for Vermont!

Each year Bennington Rotary recognizes an outstanding individual or organization with the honor to ring the bell the 14th time. This year to ring the bell for Vermont was Don Miller, representing the Bennington Historical Society who joined past recipients Oldcastle Theater, Miss Teen Vermont Pageant, the Bennington Rescue Squad, Mount Anthony Interact Club, the Vermont National Guard, the North Bennington Village School, the MAU Chamber Singers, and Patricia Johnson, RN-SVMC.

Where Are They Now?

This month we feature Sonia (Brad) Luca of Romania. "Soni", as she was known during her exchange, was hosted by the Rotary Club of Ludlow, VT during the 2004 – 2005 Rotary Year. We increasingly see that our former students are giving their time back to the youth exchange program in one way or another, volunteering for committees and joining Rotary themselves! In Sonia's case, she is a Rotarian and is now the



outbound coordinator for District 2241 in Romania. As you can see from her words below, her youth exchange group has remained close in spite of the 17 years that have passed since they were here in District 7870. She included photos of her own induction into Rotary from 2017 and with her exchange group at the top of Mt Monadnock back in October of 2004. In her own words......

I hereby, first, want to express my gratitude towards you and this wonderful program as it has really had a huge and amazing impact on me and on how my life has turned out. After returning home after the program, I was confused about what I wanted to do next and what I wanted to study but I knew that I wanted to travel as much as possible, to get to know people and cultures just as I got to know during the program. I finished my senior year and after that I went to university in Bucharest and studied Geography and Tourism. After graduating college, I did two Masters Degrees in a different city in Romania, where I am now settled. One of the degrees is in International Business and the other, Touristic Planning. In the past I had a few jobs in the tourism industry which



offered me the opportunity to travel a lot, mostly in Europe. I haven't yet been back to the United States, but I plan to come back and visit in the near future.

Now I am settled, got married in 2016, in 2018 we bought our first house and last year we welcomed our first son who brought one of the biggest joys of our life. I am now working in a multinational company as a Business Research Analyst. Actually, I am not really working now as I am on maternity leave. Here, in Romania, we have a 2-year paid maternity leave which is amazing as I get to spend this time with my son.

Another thing that I find amazing is how we, the exchange students from 7870, kept in touch after all these years. We have a WhatsApp group where we share memories and life experiences while most of us now have families with kids. Emilio from Ecuador just welcomed his first son a couple a months ago, Janna from Finland and I gave birth only three weeks apart last year in August, Maria from Bolivia and Claire from France are both settled in the US, both with 2 kids, Maurice from Argentina moved to Europe with his family, Octavio from Costa Rica and Saki from India travel a lot, and the list can continue.

After returning home from the Exchange, I also wanted to give something back to the community and joined the local Interact. Later I joined Rotaract and since 2017 I am a proud Rotary Member. During this time and before, I was also somehow involved in the Exchange program as my father was, and still is, the Chair for the Short-Term Program in our district 2241.



In 2019 I became a member of the District Committee as

Outbound Coordinator. Unfortunately, because of Covid-19, the first outbound orientations were held online but later, the program was paused. But this year we are glad to restart fresh with a lot of excitement, got to do live orientation meetings not just on zoom. I am very happy to see the excitement in the future exchange students. I sometimes get amused by the parent's worries but we get to comfort them by explaining that their kid will have the time of their life, will be safe and will grow in a year more than others in 10. I also get very excited that, somehow, I get to relive my experience through all the stories I share with them during all the training sessions, I get to wear my blazer and remember how that felt 17 years ago (wow, it still feels like yesterday).
