Little Red School House Bricks

What better way to recognize a person than creating an engraved brick or paver in the Rotary Wheel in the Paul Harris Memorial Garden at the Little Red Schoolhouse in Wallingford, Vermont.

Wallingford was the childhood home of our founder Paul P Harris. The Little Red School House was built by Paul's great-grandfather in 1818. In 1928 a group of local Rotarians bought this historic building. In 1933 it was dedicated as "The Little Red Schoolhouse."



Paul Harris returned to Wallingford for the dedication ceremony. Today, the Schoolhouse acts as a historic site that stores and displays Paul Harris memorabilia and is the meeting place of the Wallingford Memorial Rotary Club.

You or your club can purchase a red brick for \$200 or a white paver for \$300. In addition, there are still 18 gear teeth available for \$1,500 each. New bricks should be installed in June prior to the Changing of the Gavel Dinner which will be held on Saturday June 29, 2024. We are also offering a presentation certificate in a folder for an additional \$15. Be sure to give us at least 2 weeks to produce and mail a certificate. 


2024 4-Way Test Speech Contest


Coffee with Ken - Informal Zoom Get Together

International

Nashua Rotary Club Funds Latest Ukrainian Project

Since the Russian invasion in 2022, nearly half of the clubs in District 7870 have collectively raised over \$208,000 to aid Ukrainians. At the beginning of the war, the district used these funds to primarily help refugees in Poland and those living in western Ukraine. Now the District is focused on helping communities in the eastern part of Ukraine that are near the frontlines. Recently, the Nashua Rotary Club chose to fund the latest project in Kharkiv, a city 20 miles from the border with Russia and often targeted.



This project will fund the purchase of sleeping bags and pads for 73 Girl and Boy Scouts and nine volunteer instructors. Among these Scouts are many children of veterans and/or current freedom fighters, children whose families had to relocate because of the war, and children with many siblings (from multiple-child families).

While we often think of sleeping bags and pads connected with recreational activity, this equipment serves a dual purpose in a wartime environment. When the sirens sound in Kharkiv, as they often do, families must leave the comfort of their beds. For safety reasons, they move to interior places such as hallways or bathrooms or relocate to basements or bomb shelters. Having a warm sleeping bag and pad on which to sleep makes finding rest in a terrifying situation possible.



The impact of such projects is not only immediate, but also long-lasting. Ukrainians are now in their third year of war. By funding this project, the Nashua Club is also providing moral support as Ukrainians fight to preserve their country.



Ludlow Rotary Hears from Croatian Exchange Student

The Ludlow Rotary Club was treated to a lively overview of Croatia's history, language, culture and geography by a Rotary Youth Exchange Student, Klara Lendic at their recent meeting. Lendic is being hosted this year by the Manchester, VT Rotary Club.

She spoke of how her country has been strongly influenced by neighboring countries as Croatia is a small country that was at one time part of the Hapsburg Empire, the central European monarchy that ruled over a collection of lands from the 13th century to 1918.



The historically difficult yet close connection to its neighboring countries, continues even though Croatia has been an independent, democratic country since 1991 and a part of the European Union since 2013. Long and difficult negotiations have been a tradition as political and cultural differences overlap the boundaries of so many small countries in such close proximity. Croatia has strong



cultural and culinary traditions, which Klara described in terms of extended family groups, traditional foods, and elaborate celebrations of holidays and weddings.

Ludlow Rotary Donates Lectern to Town in Memory of Martin Nitka

Just prior to the start of the Town of Ludlow Annual Meeting on March 4, 2024, Tom Ray, Ludlow Rotary Club President, and past president Jim Rumrill, presented to the Town a new lectern in memory of long-time, Town Moderator, Ludlow Rotarian and respected attorney, Martin Nitka, who passed away last year. Nitka was affectionately known around Town as Marty.







Marty who was involved in numerous organizations in town including over twenty years as the Treasurer of the Fletcher Farm Foundation received the club's Community Service Award in 2023. Jim Rumrill recognized Marty's appreciation and respect for local democracy, always being careful, as town moderator, to let people have their appropriate say on matters concerning the town. He was instrumental in many of the Rotary projects that impact the community still to this day.

Tom noted that it was a pleasure to have Alice Nitka, Marty's spouse, in attendance at the meeting. Town residents and selectmen were delighted to witness this gesture made in remembrance of the Town's beloved citizen.

Need For and Use of Narcan Explained to Ludlow Rotary

The impact of drug addiction and its related overdose problem was the subject of a recent Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC). Alastair Huntley, AmeriCorps alumnus and a harm reduction advocate, spoke to the members of the LRC about the purpose of Narcan, technically known as naloxone, a drug for restoring breathing to an overdosed person.

Huntley addressed the key questions of identifying someone suffering from an overdose, how to prepare the person for Narcan, and the need for quick contact to 9-1-1. He outlined the important sequence needed to ensure that the Narcan was delivered:

- 1 Check to see that it was an overdose
- 2 Immediately contact 9-1-1
- 3 Administer the Narcan
- 4 Position the victim properly
- 5 Support the victim until 9-1-1 arrives

He noted that there were a variety of overdose signs to check for, chief among them being the inability to breath. This will result in the lack of blood being pumped through the body. One quick way to see this was via the fingernails which, when blood is slowed, will turn blue.

Huntley stressed the importance of contacting 9-1-1 to get medical assistance as quickly as possible.

The Narcan is a very simple matter to administer. It is contained in a small pump which is pressed into the nostrils of the victim. Immediately after administering the Narcan the victim should be laid on his/her side to help breathing return to normal.

The final step is important to ensure the victim remains in the correct position until 9-1-1 arrives.



Narcan is available from many health and drug avoidance programs. Huntley distributed Narcan kits to the LRC members. Information is available by calling a national help line at 1-800-662-4357 or at the Vermont Health website at

During the meeting, Melanie Gulde was presented the Paul Harris Fellow award for her service to Rotary and efforts concerning addiction problems and recovery.
