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Greetings From Your District Governor Randell Barclay



Dear District Rotarians:

One of the distinct pleasures of being a District Governor is chartering a new club. We heard on April 26th that the District 7870 Exchange Alum Rotaract Club (aka Rotex Alum Rotaract) had been officially chartered effective April 3, 2023. The club was chartered with 17 members. Bellows Falls Rotarian, and also now Rotaractor, Carrie Mobus is their charter president. 14 of the members are

new to Rotary membership and are former Youth Exchange Students. Our incoming District Governor David Saturley is the charter secretary of the Rotaract Club. This is especially thrilling as May is "Youth Services" month in the Rotary Calendar. The club's primary mission is to support our District 7870 Youth Exchange program. Their first club project is to start mentoring the upcoming outbound and inbound students for the 2023-24 exchange year.

Our Youth Exchange program is recovering rapidly from our two-year CoVid hiatus. District Youth Exchange Chair Jim Rumrill advises us that we currently have 8 inbound students and 7 outbounds. Jim believes we will have several more inbounds announced shortly. Please consider being, or returning to being, a Youth Exchange Club. Consider asking one of our new Rotex Alum Rotaractors to come and speak at your club. If you are uncertain about host families, why don't you start with Youth Exchange's Short-Term Exchange Program (STEP)? No need to find host families! Ask Chair Jim or STEP Chair Gary Dehnel about the STEP program!

I am pleased to hear about clubs continuing to support Past District Governor John Bob's Ukraine Refugee Relief program. My club (Wallingford) held a dinner for Ukraine last month and raised over \$1,100. Last week, a group of Nashua Interactors raised over \$2,500 Ukraine relief. If you haven't done so, please consider inviting PDG John Bob to your club to talk about the Ukraine program and the projects we have worked on with the Rotary Clubs in Poland on the border with Ukraine.

April and May have been busy in the district with Clubs starting to do outdoor projects. Dianne & I was pleased to attend Alton Centennial's Home & Garden Show and Concord's 100th anniversary celebrations. We had fun at Poultney's Swing into Spring Jazz fundraising concert. Congratulations to Newport and Keene both celebrating their 100th anniversary this year. I was also delighted to talk at Nashua West and Springfield about the benefits of joining Rotary Action Groups and Fellowships. The District Foundation Team also conducted three Foundation Grant Seminars for 55 participants. Many thanks to facilitators PDGs Venu Rao and Rick Manganello.



The big event at the end of April was the District's President Elect Training Seminar (PETS) and District Assembly at the Courtyard in Hanover, NH. Over 130 Rotarians (Rotary members & Rotaractors) attended the event. We heard from DGE David Saturley about some of his plans for 2023-24. Our keynote speaker was D7950's Past District Governor Dr. Billy Roberts. Dr. Billy talked on how we can make our clubs more inclusive.

During PETS we reminded Club Presidents and Presidents-Elect that District Grant Applications for next year (23-24) are due June 15, 2023, see the article later in the newsletter. Remember final reports for the current year's grants are due May 15, 2023.

There is also an article about the District Changing of the Gavel on June 26, 2023, in this newsletter. Please note that registration is now open on the District Website.

Dianne and I are heading to Melbourne, Australia for the Rotary International Convention, May 28-31, 2023. I plan to be posting pictures from the trip on District Facebook page. I look forward to reporting back on the event next month.

In what year was the 4 Way Test officially adopted by Rotary as its standard of ethics A2. 1942. A First Day Cover commemorating the 50th anniversary of Rotary is in the mail.



In September 1955, the United States Postal Service issued a first day cover to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the founding of Rotary. A first day cover is an envelope bearing a stamp canceled on the date of the stamp's release, with or without a commemorative cachet (design stamped onto the cover to commemorate the issuing of the stamp. The covers do not have a monetary value because of their mass production.

District Treasure Award Process for this Rotary Year - Deadline May 30, 2023

In 2006, District 7870 initiated a special honor for extraordinary Rotarians in District 7870 called the Rotary TREASURE Award. The first recipient was Albert Kerr who exemplified every aspect of Rotary; be it attendance, Foundation support, attracting new members, new club creation and attending District Assemblies, Conferences and International Conventions as well as demonstrating solid participation in community and international humanitarian projects. The person selected for this honor is truly a Rotary TREASURE (not Treasurer)! Each year District Clubs nominate candidates for the Award with selection being made by a committee appointed by the District Governor.

The successful candidate needs to emulate and have shown Albert Kerr's level of involvement and dedication to the ideals of Rotary and "Service Above Self" in District 7870. Please note that this is not an award given to an outstanding Treasurer, although that doesn't mean a treasurer is not a potential candidate.



As your current District Governor, it is my responsibility to ensure that all our wonderful District 7870 Rotary Clubs are made aware of this annual award. As such, I am asking for your Clubs to submit their nominations with supporting documentation to me as the designated committee chair.

D7870 District Grant Schedule 2023-2024

For the 2023-24 Rotary Year, District 7870 will provide District Designated Grants in the following format this year. There will be approximately \$30,000 available and any Club may apply for up to \$1000. Grants must be matched by the same amount in Club funds for which they apply. Clubs may apply for smaller amounts than the upper limit. Requests may be approved by the Committee for fewer dollars considering total funds available and number of applications received.

The funds must be used only for a specific community project as described in the District Grant Application Form.

A Club should send a representative to attend a District Grant Seminar to become certified if they have not been in the past. This is only mandatory for Global Grants but there is important information to be learned about Rotary Grants in general. If you are unsure of your Club's Certification status, please contact DRFC Venu Rao or incoming DRFC Dianne Barclay (see contact info below).

District Grant applications will be accepted online. The link is posted on the District Website.

Applications must be received online by midnight on June 15, 2023. The District Grant Committee will make its decisions by July 15, 2023 and the District Treasurer will disperse funds by August 15, 2023, subject to the timing of approval by The Rotary Foundation. These Grants amounts are at the discretion of the District but will need to be reported to, and approved by, the Rotary Foundation in order for the District Designated Funds to be released.

What's New at the Rotary Learning Center?

DG Randell's Note: The author of this article is our friend Past District Governor Terry Rezendes Curran from District 7930 (Greater Boston Area). We are reprinting this article with her permission. The District Governor referred to in her article is their current DG Alexander Falk. The article is a wonderful description of exploring Rotary's online learning center and finding courses that enrich your Rotary experience. RB.

Soon after Governor Alexander took office, he challenged the Assistant Governors to take some courses in the Learning Center. Some of us took on the challenge, and this is the result!

Since I had just finished my term as District Governor, but still had paperwork to do, I started with Governor Basics. I found lots of useful information and clarity to the reasons we do things certain ways. From there, I went onto Governor Intermediate and then Advanced courses where I found answers to some of my last questions on my paperwork.

As I now rejoined the Assistant Governor group and this tool was not available when last I was an AG, I decided to start there with AG basics and follow through with the Intermediate and Advanced courses. Again, I found a plethora of information! These are great courses for anyone who thinks they want to be an Assistant Governor before they actually jump into the role.





Next, I took the courses for Club Presidents, as they were not available when I was first president -more than 10 years ago. These courses covered everything from club administration to Membership to Public Image and the ever sought after DEI courses.

Just because you may not yet have ambitions yet to become a club or district officer, there are still many courses you can take to learn more about Rotary. These courses range from information on our Peace Centers to marketing advanced diversity classes and more. Oh, I haven't told you the best part yet – courses are divided into three or four sections and after every section you get a diploma. No wonder I ended up taking well over 200 courses over the summer.

Another set of great courses in the learning center of those provided by Toastmasters. These classes will help improve your confidence in public speaking. While on the subject of speaking, if English is your second language – don't worry. The Learning Center offers most courses in Spanish, Italian, German, Chinese, and a host of different languages.

The Learning Center is very easy to find. Just go to the <u>my.Rotary.org</u> homepage and log in with your Rotary account. Then click on Learning & Reference on the top menu bar and select the Learning Center menu item.

You won't regret taking the time to explore this useful tool.

Ludlow Rotary Hears from Nick Sheehan, VT 911 Dispatch Call Center



Nick Sheehan addressed the Ludlow Rotary Club at their May 2 meeting at DJ's Restaurant. As a VT 911 Dispatch Call Center Operator, he is responsible for taking emergency calls from around the state and correctly routing them to the State police, local police and fire departments, and emergency medical services (EMS). All dispatch centers in the state are capable of communicating state wide. Nick does have a reference book to follow protocol and guide him on any call he might receive. After 6 years on the job, he no longer needs

to use the reference manual. After routing a call to the appropriate entity, dispatchers stay on the phone with the caller to try to get more information for the responding agency, calm the caller down and give appropriate emergency instructions. When asked whether he had ever had to deliver a baby on a call, Nick replied that is one thing he has not done yet in his 13 years as a public servant. He originally trained as a state police officer prior to moving to dispatch.

Ludlow Rotarians found the 911 protocols to be interesting. Nick reported the 911 recording starts before a call is answered and keeps recording until after hang up. There are about 3,000 calls/month in Westminster where Nick is stationed. Location of cell towers directs the calls to the appropriate dispatch center. All calls are queued to get distributed to the next available dispatcher statewide. The caller location is determined by mobile phone or land line location with land line being the most accurate. VOIT(voice over internet) calls are the most inaccurate and therefore a problem. Modem service in Vermont is an issue. Dispatchers can connect to other agencies in 30 seconds. Since Ludlow has its own dispatch, they transfer calls directly to Ludlow.

Nick's most memorable call was for a lost child who the parents found under the ice in their swimming pool. He was able to talk them through life saving CPR. The most frequent calls are from the elderly, calling in a non-emergency situation. Often, they are lonely with no family. He transfers them to 211, Vermont community resource specialists ready to connect people with a wide variety of help.

In response to a question, Nick feels Artificial Intelligence may have a positive impact on dispatch if it could show live video of the scene which would help first responders prepare before they arrive on site.

She praised the many businesses and individuals who provided the hundreds of gifts for the Penny Sale. "Without their continued support this fundraiser would not have been possible", she added.
