#### Little Red School House Bricks

What better way to recognize a person than creating an engraved brick or paver in the Rotary Wheel in the Paul Harris Memorial Garden at the <u>Little Red Schoolhouse</u> in Wallingford, Vermont.

Wallingford was the childhood home of our founder Paul P Harris. The Little Red School House was built by Paul's great-grandfather in 1818. In 1928 a group of local Rotarians bought this historic building. In 1933 it was dedicated as "The Little Red Schoolhouse."



Paul Harris returned to Wallingford for the dedication ceremony. Today, the Schoolhouse acts as a historic site that stores and displays Paul Harris memorabilia and is the meeting place of the Wallingford Memorial Rotary Club.

You or your club can purchase a red brick for \$200 or a white paver for \$300. In addition, there are still 18 gear teeth available for \$1,500 each. New bricks should be installed in June prior to the Changing of the Gavel Dinner which will be held on Saturday June 29, 2024. We are also offering a presentation certificate in a folder for an additional \$15. Be sure to give us at least 2 weeks to produce and mail a certificate. #### Springfield VT Rotary Earns Two More Trex Benches for Springfield Community

As a reward for Springfield residents collecting more than a ton of thin film plastics for the Trex Thin Film Plastics Challenge, the Trex Company (Trex) provided the Springfield Rotary Club with two outdoor benches that were placed at the bus stop on Main Street in Springfield.

The Rotary Club entered the Trex Thin Film Plastics Challenge in February of 2023 on behalf of the Springfield community, placing a Trex Bin in the Springfield Town Library. In addition, thin film plastic was collected at McGee



CDJR of Springfield, Springfield GMC, Springfield Hospital, and the Springfield Food Co-op. Since that time, Springfield residents have been avidly pitching in to recycle their share of thin film plastics, diverting over 4,100 pounds (i.e. over 2 tons) of thin film plastics from the waste stream.

The Challenge is part of the Trex Recycling Program, aimed at encouraging the public to recycle their grocery bags, bread bags, produce bags, cereal bags, ice bags, case overwrap, bubble wrap, dry cleaning bags, Ziploc and other resealable bags, and similar bags and wrap for other objects. If the sponsoring group's participants collect 1000 pounds of thin film plastics, Trex will send the group a Trex Outdoor Furniture 48" Yacht Club Bench. Trex does not manufacture the benches, they are a purchased gift for meeting the minimum requirement in the program. The plastic that is turned in is being upcycled into Trex decking (<u>www.trex.com</u>). The benches are part of the Trex branded



furniture line through Polywood (<u>www.trexfurniture.com</u>). Polywood uses milk jugs and water bottles to manufacture their furniture.

These are the fifth and sixth benches that has been donated. The first two can be found at The Common, the third at the Park Street School overlooking the Kingsbury House, and the fourth at the North Springfield Bog Trailhead.

Volunteers from the Springfield Rotary Club and from the Springfield Town Library collect and weigh the bags, report the bags' weight to Trex, and deliver the bags to Trex's closest participating drop-off retailer location, Shaw's Supermarket in Springfield.

The Trex Bin will remain in place at the Springfield Town Library. The Springfield Rotary Club has partnered with Friends of Springfield Town Library, the Union Park Neighborhood Association, the Black River Action Group, and Springfield On The Move (SOM). Working with the Friends of Springfield Town Library, Springfield Rotary Club has launched another Challenge to earn an additional outdoor bench for the Springfield community.

The benches are dedicated to the 95<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Springfield Rotary.

Prizes awarded ranged from skis, TV's, gas grilles, ski passes (including several seasonal passes), to cash awards. If winners were not happy with their prizes, they even had a "swap table" available to exchange prizes with other winners.



The event represented a major fund-raising effort for the LRC. Much of this amount will be devoted to the annual scholarship awards the club gives to area graduating students, this year estimated to be \$9,000. The remainder goes into the funds used to support area community projects.

## Noah Schmidt Updates Ludlow Rotary with Ludlow News and Plans

Noah Schmidt, a member of the Ludlow Select Board, spoke to the recent meeting of the Ludlow Rotary Club about the status of recent actions and considerations by that legislative body.

He indicated that the town has about \$330,000 and the village around \$230,000 in America Rescue Act (ARPA) Funds, but came with "a lot of restrictions". Schmidt added that one of the primary considerations of its use was for recreation in the town.



He noted that the bike path, long a matter before the Select Board, had already been established by LAST (Ludlow Area Sports Trails). Current planning will continue the path behind the high school building and run through Fletcher Farm properties.

Calling it a "great way to increase the town's revenue", Schmidt said that the local option sales tax was something that should be considered for the town. Local option taxes must be approved by the State legislature, unless previously allowed by charter, and involve a series of 1% increases over the state's sales tax. Such a tax requires an approval vote by local voters.

He added that the Select Board is still evaluating the future use of the Black River High School building, which is now owned by the town. Schmidt likes the idea of it being used for educational purposes but thought that the town needed a long-range plan on its use.

As an aside, Schmidt indicated that he planned to take the 10-mile run up Mt. Washington, adding it was "only for the up-hill portion".

In addition to his work as a member of the Ludlow Select Board, he runs the Open Door Vacations Rental Company, which he founded. He is part of the team that initiated the "Unofficial Okemo" website.

The LRC meets every Tuesday for lunch in Ludlow. The LRC is small and is always looking to welcome new members. #### Ludlow Rotary Continues Literacy Program in Area Schools

Continuing its program of literacy training, the Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) recently delivered custom-printed books to members of the Cavendish Town Elementary School (CTES).

George Thomson, a LRC Rotarian (and former CTES Principal), presented the selected books to first-grade CTES class and read the book to them, each book personalized with the student's name.

He described the book, "School is Fun", thusly, "In the book, the teacher is doing a special theme on raccoons and she is going to show the kids a real raccoon in a cage after their study, however, the raccoon has gotten out and the student is the one who finds the raccoon and saves the day with the surprise visit.

The student's, pictured above with George Thomson, reactions to the new book included comments such as "Hey, we have a Zoey (not real name) in our classroom", "Oh my gosh I have a sister with that name...." and "Those are my grandparents."



Thomson noted that the kids were delighted with the books and when given to them at the end of the presentation, they searched through the script looking for the personalization. "Can we take these home?" The teacher thanked me for hyping the kids up so much. She said it was going to take some time to get them focused on math!



Similar programs sponsored by LRC are conducted in other service areas of the club.

In Mt Holly, Brigid Sullivan is delivering books to students at the Mt Holly Elementary School. The same program is offered in Ludlow where Sharon Bixby presents books to the Ludlow Elementary School.

This LRC program's purpose is to provide young readers with books on a periodic basis to foster an interest in reading and enhance literacy capabilities of young students. The club has been sponsoring this program for over 27 years. "And, based on the success of it, we have no plans to discontinue it", proffered Thomson.
