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Greetings From Your District Governor David Saturley




The August newsletter was filled with activity, and since then, things certainly haven't slowed our membership and clubs.

Established in 1992, RLI has become a worldwide organization with divisions in every Continent of the world. And it started right here in New England in CT. Our division is referred to as RLI-NEA which stands for Rotary Leadership Institute Northeast America.

RLI, soon to be Rotary Learning Institute, is a general education program for Rotarians at all stages of their Rotary career and believes that a good club leader must know the evolution of Rotary, its





status and activities in the world, and have a vision for what Rotary can be in the future. Therefore, RLI is a three-part course in both Rotary knowledge and leadership skills, designed especially for volunteer organizations.

The goal of the three-part series is for Rotarians to create ENTHUSIASM for Rotary by opening the world of Rotary outside of their own clubs and sharing knowledge between clubs through active in-person and engaged participation.

Any Rotarian can attend any session (RLI Parts I, II Or III and Graduate) at their own discretion and initiative. Sessions must be taken sequentially to participate in the following one.

Jack Atkinson of Nashua Rotary Club, Rest in Peace



Jack Atkinson — Oct. 16, 1931 – May 30, 2023 May his memory be a blessing.

Jack Atkinson, 91, of Hudson, NH, died peacefully on May 30, 2023, at the Community Hospice House in Merrimack, NH following a brief period of declining health. Jack was born on October 16, 1931, in Baltimore, Maryland to the late Arthur and Evelyn (Kraft) Atkinson. He was the loving husband of Lucille (Fortier) who he married on January 11, 1974, in Hudson, NH and

shared 44 wonderful years of marriage until her death in 2017.

Jack graduated from Nashua High School in 1949 and received his Engineering Degree from Wentworth Institute of Technology in Boston, Massachusetts. He proudly served his country during the Korean War, serving in the Army Corps of Engineers. He was the owner/operator of Bronze Craft Corporation in Nashua, working for 56 years and serving as its president for 25 years. He retired in 2005. He served his community well and was a proud member and past president of The Rotary Club of Nashua and was honored for 62 years of perfect attendance in October of 2022. In addition, he served as director at Nashua Federal Savings for 27 years, was a past president and director of the Non-Ferrous Founders Society, was a past activity chairman for the Algonquin district Boy Scouts and was a member of the First Church of Nashua.



Jack loved his family well and will be forever remembered for his Thanksgiving Morning Flag Football games, Christmas Scavenger hunts, wonderful summer gatherings by the river, tractor rides in the field with his grandchildren and his extreme generosity.

Jack was predeceased by his sister Pat and stepdaughter, Gail Gagne. Family members include his stepchildren Kathy Delle Chiaie, Buddy Bernard and his wife, Cathy, Maggie Schellenberg and her husband Paul, Terry Mostrom and her husband, Bruce and Jim Bernard and his wife Susan and his dear friend, Audrey Rice. Jack was also "PJ" to his 13 grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren. He is also survived by two estranged biological children, William and Cheryl.

Ludlow Rotary Flood Recovery Reaches \$100,000 Milestone



During a recent community meeting with representatives from the State of Vermont to exchange information on state assistance in flood recovery and to inform them about the damages, Thomas Ray, Ludlow Area Rotary Club president, reported that Ludlow Area Rotary will spend about \$100,000. Funds available so far in response to the recent flooding are from contributions received specifically for this disaster and from Rotary's own Charitable Fund balance. Funds already disbursed have gone to:

- the purchase of dehumidifiers and fans that were distributed at the Ludlow Community Center immediately after the flooding, and to the
- Black River Action Team, which has been addressing direct damage caused by the flooding. Additional funds are being disbursed to affected businesses and residents in Rotary's service area through the processes established by the Okemo Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Crown Point Board of Realtors.

Ludlow Rotary has received flood response contributions from several other Rotary Clubs and from generous local businesses, residents and second homeowners. Ray indicated the club is expecting more funds as well. Rotary club members and families also have been contributing their time to assist in the response and recovery efforts.

At the recent meeting of the Ludlow Rotary Club, David Almond, Friends of Ludlow Auditorium (FOLA) Treasurer, presented a check for \$703 to the LRC's fundraising program to assist in the Ludlow-area flood recovery programs.

The submitted funds represented the proceeds FOLA audience members donated during the annual Silent Movie Festival, attended by more than 45 people, on Saturday, August 26 in the Heald Auditorium in Ludlow's Town Hall.

To demonstrate the extent of the donations at this event, Jeff Rapsis, the featured pianist providing background music to the Charlie Chaplin comedy, "Gold Rush", donated his fee.





Almond noted that this was truly a community effort. "It just showed us that the folks attending the movie had more on their mind's than just watching this great comedian", he observed. "It's heart-warming to realize how much people will donate when the situation calls for generosity. It just makes you feel very proud."

Coolidge Foundation speaks to Ludlow Rotary



Tracy W. Messer, portraying President Calvin Coolidge, addressed the Ludlow Rotary Club at its Aug. 15 meeting. On the heels of the Centennial Celebration of his Aug. 3, 1923 Inauguration, the reenacted 30th President of the United States told stories and recited from his biography.

One of the stories Messer told was that as President, Coolidge raised over \$10 million for the 1927 floods in Mississippi. However, many people

were upset by his failure to come visit the devastation. Consequently, when Vermont flooded later that year, he did not come home because he had not gone to Mississippi. Instead, he sent the best engineer in the country, Herbert H. Hoover, to oversee repairs.

During his tenure, Coolidge oversaw economic prosperity of the Roaring 20's. Families installed indoor plumbing and electricity in their homes, and the 5-day work week was adopted as the national standard. Coolidge did not choose to run in 1928 as he wanted to get out after 6 years in office. Had he run and won again, he would have served 10 years and he felt that was too long for any one person to hold the office.

As Calvin Coolidge, Messer of the Coolidge Foundation, quoted the poem "Vermont is a state I love" in closing.

Ludlow Rotary Inducts Bruce Schmidt and Hears About Using AI



Bruce Schmidt, Vice President/General Manager, and the friendly face of Okemo Mountain Resort, was inducted into the Ludlow Rotary Club at its September 29 meeting. Rotarian Tom Harris, who did the induction, acknowledged Schmidt's multiple contributions to the community over the years, including his long tenure as Select Board member. Harris indicated the Ludlow Rotary Club is happy to now have that experience and commitment as part of its membership.

The guest speaker for the meeting, Mike Lennon, Founder of Eternity Marketing, spoke about using artificial intelligence(AI) in daily work and life. Lennon suggested that businesses want search results optimization when someone searches for them on the web. He argued that it can be enhanced using AI because of its ability to mimic human behavior over time and with repeated use. Essentially AI can learn a business and its commonly used language. As it is used, it hallucinates far less frequently and becomes more accurate with its ability to search via keywords. In order for AI to complete a task correctly, each request must have specificity, resulting in a better output.

Ultimately, AI can write blogs, generate posts for social media, or create an email marketing segment with photos and copy. Chat GPT is an AI-powered language model developed by OpenAI, capable of generating human-like text based on context and past conversations. Since its launching in November, 2022 it has gained more followers than any other App. However, it can generate incorrect information. Open AI has to learn over time to autocomplete based on the user entering correct information. Mike cautioned that when you upload information to any of these sites, it gives web access to your data. He does encourage using a site to become familiar with its capabilities and limitations. Club members had several questions for Mike about using any of the AI sites. Ludlow Rotary Hears about SBA Recovery Assistance Programs



The guest speaker for the September 12 Rotary meeting was Stephen Clark, Public Affairs Specialist for the US. Small Business Administration (SBA), working to assist victims recovering from the recent flooding in Vermont. In his quest to make sure people know about available resources, Clark has been traveling around the state talking to individuals and groups about the programs designed to assist those in need. As an example he has spoken to 11 different Rotary groups in Vermont since the first floods on July 10.

He stated that \$18.6 million in SBA loans have been awarded to individuals, businesses and nonprofits for losses caused by physical damage

in the State of Vermont. An SBA loan supports people who have limited other options. The date for filing a claim for physical damage has been extended by a month to 10/12/23 to allow for additional time to report losses.

Economic injury disaster loans are also available for nonprofits and businesses. Examples of economic injuries are losses in sales or income caused by road closures or disruptions, being unable to get supplies, or canceled reservations because people felt that Vermont was closed.



There are many types of economic injuries which can be claimed at the Business Recovery Center which will remain open until Oct 12. Interest rates on these loans are low, varying by circumstance and size of the loss. There is no application fee to apply for a loan. If a loan is awarded, there is no requirement to take it. SBA is trying to award loans within 15 days of receiving an application. People can apply before knowing the amount of insurance payments, just to get recovery moving as quickly as possible.

Clark commended Rotarians helping in disaster relief around the country saying the local touch and boots on the ground are often more important than government assistance. The human touch and hard work of volunteers is often critical immediately after a disaster, Clark said.

Brattleboro Rotary Club Scholarship Addresses Child Care Shortage

A Brattleboro Rotary Club Gateway Foundation scholarship awarded to a Community College of Vermont (CCV) student each year aims to address the shortage of child care workers in Windham County. CCV-Brattleboro student Rheanna Pare received this year's \$2,500 Jesse M. Corum IV Scholarship.

CCV is deeply embedded in Vermont's early childhood education system, providing the educational foundation for students pursuing careers in the field through its childcare certificate and early childhood education associate degree. The College is also home to Northern Lights at CCV, the hub of the professional development system for Vermont's early childhood and afterschool workforce.

Leigh Marthe, coordinator of student advising at CCV-Brattleboro, acknowledged the importance of supporting early childhood educators when it comes to addressing Vermont's child care shortage. "If we hope to build the fabric of our Vermont culture, our businesses and economy, our



community-focused infrastructures, and our future citizens and workforce, our leaders must invest in real solutions to building liveable wages and compensation for professionals doing sacred work with children and their families."

"I've always enjoyed being around kids," says Pare, a Montessori teacher who has been working in the child care field for five years. Short Term Youth Exchange Program



The fall of the year is the time for Rotary clubs to consider sponsoring a Rotary Short Term Youth Exchange next summer.

Rotary's Short-Term Exchange Program presents opportunities for students to advance their knowledge and world understanding by allowing them to visit a different country and family for a few weeks – typically during the summer school break. Once an exchange match has been established, the two families collaborate on when the exchange will take place - three to four weeks here in District 7870 and another three to four weeks at the exchange student's home.

Any student, age 15-19 as of July 1 of the exchange summer, of good character who possesses a warm personality and a desire to live abroad and host in return is eligible for Rotary's Short-Term Exchange. Children of both Rotarians and non-Rotarians are eligible.

Foreign language proficiency is not required. Many countries throughout the world teach English as a second language and most participating students are quite proficient in it. Most students do not find language to be a barrier to having a great exchange experience whether they know the language or not.

There are no costs to the host Rotary club. Cost of travel, Rotary application fee, Rotary medical insurance, clothing and personal expenses are the responsibility of the participating students and their families. The application fee and medical insurance fee are less than \$300. If appropriate, the host Rotary club may offer to assist with these fees.






The host Rotary club's obligations are:

- · Promote and recruit potential applicants
- Meet with and interview the student and parents
- · Assist in completing the on-line application
- · When students are here:
- o Invite them to a club meeting
- o Assist in students' activities while they are here

On Sunday, volunteers and host families from every host club attended an informational meeting and were introduced to the full group of students. The group will be together again in September






for a three day trip to Boston and will be hosted by the Meredith Rotary club in October. The year is off to a great start!




Springfield Rotary Penny Sale Coming Up - Oct. 21, 2023
