District 7870 Announces the Janice H. McElroy Scholarship Program

Rotary District 7870 is pleased to announce a district wide scholarship in memory of Janice H. McElroy, who served as Rotary District 7870 Governor in 2011-2012 and was instrumental in securing a Rotary International grant of \$412,000 to help southern Vermont rebuild after the devastation of Hurricane Irene. This scholarship is made possible due to donations from friends, colleagues and Rotary Clubs throughout the District 7870.

Prior to her death in 2014, Jan McElroy requested that any donations received in her memory be dedicated to establishing a scholarship fund for non-traditional students. It will be awarded to a person who is 21 years of age or older and has completed high school or earned a G.E.D. There must be at least a three-year gap between graduating from high school and full time college attendance or a record of part-time college for three years after graduating from high school. The scholarship can be used for expenses at a four- year or a two- year college, or for another type of accredited institution, such as a technical or vocational program. The scholarship award will be a minimum of \$1,000.

Applications may be obtained on the Rotary District 7870 home page [https://www.rotary7870.org/] Applications need to be completed and received no later than May 15, 2025. The selected recipient will be notified in late May and will be presented the award at a Rotary event soon.

Little Red School House Bricks

What better way to recognize a person than creating an engraved brick or paver in the Rotary Wheel in the Paul Harris Memorial Garden at the Little Red Schoolhouse in Wallingford, Vermont.

Wallingford was the childhood home of our founder Paul P Harris. The Little Red School House was built by Paul's great-grandfather in 1818. In 1928 a group of local Rotarians bought this historic building. In 1933 it was dedicated as





"The Little Red Schoolhouse." Paul Harris returned to Wallingford for the dedication ceremony. Today, the Schoolhouse acts as a historic site that stores and displays Paul Harris memorabilia and is the meeting place of the Wallingford Memorial Rotary Club.

You or your club can purchase a red brick for \$200 or a white paver for \$300. In addition, there are still 18 gear teeth available for \$1,500 each. New bricks should be installed in June prior to the Changing of the Gavel Dinner which will be held on Saturday June 28, 2025.

We are also offering a presentation certificate in a folder for an additional \$15. Be sure to give us at least 2 weeks to produce and mail a certificate. You can order online with a credit card by going to: https://rotary7870.org/donate/buy-a-paver-for-the-little-red-school-house-foundation/

Foundation Recognition Points and How You Can Accumulate Them

Foundation recognition points are awarded to donors who contribute to The Rotary Foundation through the Annual Fund or PolioPlus, or who contribute to sponsorship of a Foundation grant. Donors receive one recognition point for every U.S. dollar contributed to these funds. (Contributions to the Endowment Fund are not eligible.) Donors can transfer Foundation recognition points to others to help them qualify as a Paul Harris





Fellow or Multiple Paul Harris Fellow. Foundation recognition points belong to the original donor until the donor's death, unless the points are transferred, or until the donor uses them (the surviving spouse of a Major Donor may also use the points).

What is the difference between recognition amount and available Foundation recognition points?

Recognition amount reflects the total Paul Harris Fellow recognition you have accumulated through your personal contributions plus all recognition points you've been given by other



individuals, clubs, or districts. Recognition points given to you don't count toward Major Donor recognition.

Available Foundation recognition points reflect points you have accumulated through personal outright giving to the Foundation. All points listed can be transferred to other individuals for Paul Harris Fellow recognition.

Consider recognizing a fellow Rotarian or a community member with your PH recognition points! Honor them at an upcoming meeting or your club event. What better way to honor those who serve!

Where can I quickly find my PH recognition points? (1) Sign in at MyRotary, go to My Account, then My Donations or (2) on the ClubRunner mobile app, click the three lines at the top left corner then click Recognition under My Club.

D7870 Announces 2025-26 District Grant Opportunities

District 7870 is pleased to announce the availability of District Grant Funds for the 2025–26 Rotary year. With approximately \$31,000 in grant funding available, clubs are invited to submit applications for up to \$1,000 each to support meaningful community service projects. At a minimum, grant funds must be matched dollar-for-dollar with club funds.

District Grants are an excellent way to extend your club's impact locally while engaging members in hands-on service. To ensure equitable distribution, grants will be awarded based on the number of applications received and total funds requested.



Last year's grants included: Gear Up for School backpack program, scholarships, vision testing in South Africa, food insecurity, providing coats for children, seasonal gifts for children, Rotary Youth Exchange events, RYLA, Amigos de Honduras, cultural center bathroom restoration, after school programs, vocational training for women in Rwanda, Styrofoam recycling program, school desks for students in Haiti.



Key Grant Guidelines: Funds must support a specific community project (local or international). The project must include active Rotarian participation. Clubs must be current on all financial obligations to Rotary International and the District. Clubs which received a district grant for 2024-25, must have uploaded the final report to the district website by April 15, 2025. A club representative must attend a required "District Grant Final Report Training" every year to receive district grant funds. Choose one of the dates below, it should take less than ½ hour. See District Website Calendar for links. Clubs must enter at least the six Priority Goals in Rotary Club Central. We hope clubs will enter more goals.

The Power of Setting Goals: Why Every Rotary Club Should Plan for Success

Setting goals is one of the most powerful tools a Rotary club can use to ensure a vibrant, impactful, and fulfilling year of service. The Rotary International Strategic Plan encourages every club to establish clear goals at the beginning of each Rotary year. By setting goals, clubs can focus their energy, measure their progress, and celebrate their achievements more effectively.





Why Set Club Goals?

- Focus and Direction: Goals provide a roadmap for the club's leadership team and members. They clarify priorities and help allocate resources wisely.
- Member Engagement: When members see that their club is working toward clear, meaningful objectives, they are more likely to be engaged and motivated.
- Accountability: Goals create shared expectations. They make it easier to track progress and hold the club accountable throughout the year.
- Recognition: Rotary International recognizes clubs that achieve their goals through programs like the Rotary Club Excellence Awards (formerly the Presidential Citation), offering an opportunity to celebrate the club's hard work.

Clubs that set and monitor goals consistently grow stronger and have a greater impact in their communities and around the world.

How to Enter Club Goals on Rotary Club Central

Rotary Club Central is the online platform where clubs set, track, and report their goals. It is accessible through My Rotary on rotary.org. Here's how to enter your club goals:

- 1. Sign In:
 - Visit<u>www.rotary.org</u> and click Sign In at the top. Enter your My Rotary username and password.
- 2. Access Rotary Club Central:
 - Once signed in, hover over Manage at the top menu.
 - o Under Club & District Administration, click on Rotary Club Central.
- 3. Select Your Club:
 - If you have leadership access (e.g., club president, secretary, or executive secretary), you will be able to manage your club's goals directly.
- 4. Choose the Rotary Year:
 - At the top, select the correct Rotary year for which you are setting goals.
- 5. Enter Goals:
 - Under each section (Membership, Service, Foundation Giving, Public Image, and others), click Edit to enter your club's goals.
 - Be sure to save after entering each goal.
- 6. Monitor Progress:
 - Throughout the year, you can return to Rotary Club Central to update your progress. Regular updates help you stay on track and make adjustments if needed.



Important Tip:

Rotary Club Central is designed to be dynamic — goals can be adjusted if circumstances change. However, setting thoughtful, realistic goals early in the year provides the best foundation for a successful Rotary year.

Final Thought:

As our founder Paul Harris once said, "Whatever Rotary may mean to us, to the world it will be known by the results it achieves." Setting and achieving goals is how we transform vision into meaningful service. Let's start strong, aim high, and make this next Rotary year our best yet!

Derry Village Rotary Club supports the Greater Derry Diaper Drive

The Derry Village Rotary Club proudly reaffirmed its commitment to the 2025 Greater Derry Diaper Drive with a generous donation of \$1,000 and active participation. Rotarian Susan Ochoa initiated the drive in 2014, and after her joining Rotary in 2018, the club has consistently sponsored this event. The collected diapers are donated to The Upper Room, a family resource center in Derry, aiding their TIPS Program (Teen Information for Parenting Success).



Ochoa collaborates with local businesses to set up drop-off locations and promote the drive. This year, around 10 local businesses and non-profit organizations participated. In addition to the \$1,000 check, another \$3,000 was raised for purchases, and approximately \$1,000 worth of diapers were collected.

Derry Village Rotarians actively bring their causes to the club, ensuring that the community receives vital support through various initiatives. The Derry Village Rotary Club is proud to support this important cause and looks forward to continuing its involvement in the future.

Springfield VT Rotary Donates Trex Bench to Springfield Community Players Theatre

The Springfield Rotary Club has once again made a positive impact on the community by donating a Trex outdoor bench to Springfield Community Players Theatre, following a successful effort by local residents to collect 1,000 pounds of thin film plastics for the Trex Thin Film Plastics Challenge.

As part of the Trex Recycling Program, Trex awarded this <u>eleventh</u> bench to the Springfield Rotary after Springfield residents contributed to the collection. The plastics for this donation came from several local contributors: 55% was gathered at the Springfield Town Library, 16% from



Magee Office Products, 12% from Springfield Food Co-op, and the remaining amount was collected from Bibens Ace Hardware, Casey CDJR of Springfield, Springfield GMC, and Springfield Hospital. Since February 2023, the Springfield Rotary Club has collected over 9,144 pounds (more than 4.5 tons) of thin plastic film.

The Trex Thin Film Plastics Challenge is designed to encourage recycling of items such as grocery bags, bread bags, produce bags, cereal bags, ice bags, bubble wrap, Ziploc bags, and other similar plastic films. When participants collect 1,000 pounds of these materials, Trex rewards the group with a 48" Yacht Club Bench, which is part of the Trex Outdoor Furniture line through Polywood.



These benches are made using recycled plastic, including milk jugs and water bottles, while the collected plastic is upcycled into Trex decking.

Plastic pollution is a significant environmental issue, as plastic materials don't fully decompose, breaking down into microplastics that pose risks to wildlife and are difficult to clean up. The Trex Challenge offers a creative solution to reduce plastic waste, which can damage mechanical equipment in curbside recycling programs. By participating in the challenge, Springfield residents are helping to reduce harmful plastic pollution while making a lasting contribution to the community.

This donation marks the eleventh Trex bench placed around Springfield. Previous benches can be found at locations such as The Common, the Park Street School, the North Springfield Bog Trailhead, Main Street, the Springfield Town Library, and Elm Street School. Volunteers from the Springfield Rotary Club and from the Springfield Town Library collect and weigh the bags, report the bags' weight to Trex, and deliver the bags to Trex's closest participating drop-off retailer location, Shaw's Supermarket in Springfield. The Trex Bin will remain in place at the Springfield Town Library.

Looking ahead, the Rotary Club has already begun collecting plastic film for another bench as part of their ongoing efforts to support the community. The benches are dedicated to celebrating the 95th anniversary of the Springfield Rotary.

Hopkinton Initiates Successful Global Grant with Brazilian Rotary Club

Isabella, a Brazilian Rotary exchange student for the school year 2023-4, asked the Hopkinton Rotary club if it might know if a club from our Southern New Hampshire, Southern Vermont district would be interested in partnering with her home city sponsor, Curitiba in a Global Grant. The grant would fund a much needed highly technical medical instrument needed for the main hospital in Curitiba, a city of nearly 2 million located south of Rio de Janiero. The instrument, a Stryker SPY, indicates lack of blood flow/potential for infection for major operations and would significantly reduce the incidence of infection and potential death.

Hopkinton saw the \$105,000 grant as an opportunity and agreed to take on the responsibility of being Curitiba's international partner. Through club and individual donations and with district and The Rotary Fund matches, nearly \$44,000 was raised here and the balance of the \$105,000 required came from Curitiba Rotary clubs, district and The Rotary Foundation matches.

This is how Rotary's magic happens - through 46,000 clubs and 1.4 million members, one Rotarian working with another together for a common goal, across town or across the world.
