District 7870 and the Rotary Foundation - What a Year!

Rotary year 2023-2024 was an amazing year for collaborations with The Rotary Foundation through District and Global Grants. Twenty-seven Clubs secured District Grants to help them to do big things in their communities. They provided scholarships, beautified public areas, improved park access, provided school supplies and backpacks, worked on affordable housing and much more. The impact that Rotarians have in their communities is amplified by receiving funds from The Rotary Foundation to make their projects possible.

District 7870 also had eight Global Grants approved in 2023-2024. These ranged from an Ambulance in Turkey to Check Dams, Blood Banks and Menstrual Health Education in India to a Pediatric Dental Facility in South Africa. Reading the words on the page does not convey how powerful these projects are and the lives they change. A big shout out to the Clubs who were international partners and participants in these grants.



I got a call from PDG Venu Rao after he visited prior years' Global Grant projects in India in the Spring. He was overwhelmed by what he witnessed. He had visited a hospital where the local Rotary Club had established a Human Milk Bank in the neonatal ward. One hundred and fifty babies are born each week in that hospital and 15-20% of those are premature and their mothers are unable to nurse them in many cases. Before the milk bank, the babies were fed formula and developed many infections and illnesses, after the milk bank all the premature babies stayed healthy because they received immune protection from human milk. The head of the hospital was astounded and thrilled at such an outcome.

I am thrilled at this outcome! I get teary eyed writing about it. I have learned so much since becoming involved with Global Grants. We have human milk banks in the US and they play an important role in the health of premature infants. How exciting for Rotarians to see this need elsewhere and then through the power of the Rotary Foundation and collaborating Rotarians, Clubs and Districts around the world bring an amazing solution to a community in need. Many of you have heard me say that The Rotary Foundation is my charity of choice because I know that the funds are used by Rotarians to make a difference in the world. When I see the wonderful, inventive, high impact things that you are doing with District Grants and hear the stories from Rotarians participating in Global Grants, I know the money I donate to the foundation is being put to good use. Thank you to each of you for being good stewards of The Rotary Foundation's dollars.

Please Save the date, **Saturday, November 16** for a District Foundation Event. It will be a lunch event and it will be a great opportunity to learn more about The Foundation and how it helps bring the Magic of Rotary to your clubs, our District and the world.

Call for Nominations for District Governor 2027-2028

Nominations are now being accepted for the position of District Governor for the Rotary year 2027-28. Please consider nominating a qualified candidate from your club. Application materials and a job description are available on the District Website http://rotary7870.org in the site pages section entitled "District Governor Application Materials". Note: you must be logged into the District website to access these materials. District Governor (to serve 2027-2028).

Qualifications for District Governor are as follows:

- Nominee must be a Rotarian in good standing of a Club in the District
- Nominee must be of outstanding personal caliber and must maintain full qualifications of membership · The integrity of the Nominee's classification must be without question
- Nominee must be a member of a functioning club, in good standing, that has no outstanding indebtedness to Rotary International or District 7870
- Nominee must have served as a Rotary Club President for a full term · Nominee must have been a Rotarian for at least seven (7) years at the time of taking office
- Nominee must demonstrate willingness, commitment, and ability, (Physically and otherwise, to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of the office of District Governor) Traditionally, the nominating committee also looks for Nominees with a record of club and district participation, an outstanding attendance record, and demonstrated civic interest in their community.

Rotary International suggests that Nominees have necessary computer skills, and Rotary International also mandates attendance at the Governors-Elect Training Seminar and the International Assembly.

Please upload all nominations and supporting documents on the District Website http://rotary7870.org under the Site Page "District Governor Application Materials" no later than September 6th,2024. Submissions uploaded after September 6, 2024 will NOT be considered. Interviews of the candidates for District Governor 27-28 will take place during October 2024, invitations will be forwarded to each candidate. Specific times will be assigned to each candidate. Failure to appear for any reason will automatically eliminate the candidate from consideration.

Thank you for ensuring that all qualified candidates receive this information.

Jaffrey-Rindge Rotarians Learn About Rwanda Project

With a number of guests present at the Cathedral of the Pines early morning meeting, the Jaffrey-Rindge Rotary welcomed fellow Rotarian Katherine Richards and Jennifer Paone, both from the Elm City Rotary Club in Keene, who presented information on the Rwanda One4One program that they have been spearheading the past several years.

Jenifer is working to obtain grants to support the Rwandan community by providing genocide widows with an income opportunity crafting native fabrics. Katherine, pictured, shared the sad story of how over one million





Rwandans were victims of genocide in 1994 as a result of two feuding tribes. Yet, from the ashes of despair, Rwandan women, with the help of the Elm City Rotary Club, are learning how to use native plants to extract dyes and to create attractive colorful scarves that can be sold to generate income, both in Rwanda and outside the country.

Elm City Rotary Grants Scholarship to Community's Unsung Heroes

The Keene Elm City Rotary Scholarship Committee is pleased to announce the winners of the 2024 Unsung Hero and Ken Jue Scholarships. The club's annual Unsung Hero Scholarship recognizes individuals of the Monadnock Region who have engaged in significant service above self. Such service may be in the applicant's community, place of worship, school or family and may have come at a cost to that person's academic or personal career.

This year's Unsung Hero scholarship winners received \$1,340 each. All graduated from Keene High School.

- Chase Johnson will study Musical Theater at UNH Durham.
- Betzy Mills will study Marine Biology at Roger Williams University.
- Aaliyah Tacy will study High Performance Automotive Mechanics at University of Northwestern Ohio.
- Eleanor Haywood will do graduate studies in Social Work at London South Bank University.
- Evelyn Proctor will do Doctoral Studies in Biochemistry at UNH Durham.
- Evelyn Proctor was also awarded \$1,000 for the Ken Jue Scholarship. The Ken Jue Scholarship recognizes an Unsung Hero who has personal experience in or plans to study or work in the areas of mental health, physical health, social work or advocacy for inclusion of marginalized persons.

Elm City Rotary Club has awarded more than \$105,000 to Monadnock area students since the Unsung Hero Scholarship was started in 2002. Applicants for the Unsung Hero are automatically considered for the Ken Jue Scholarship, which was created in 2022, after the death of long-time Rotary member Ken Jue. Jue was a mental health advocate, who was active in non-profits throughout the Monadnock Region and beyond. In addition to a cash award, students are also assigned a mentor from the Elm City Rotary Club who is available to assist them with networking throughout their studies and after graduation.

Scholarship applicants must be a Monadnock Region resident, at least 16 years old, already accepted to an accredited institution of further learning or training and in need of financial support. Candidates do not need to be a full-time college student in a degree awarding institution. The scholarships are designed to include part-time students who are enrolled in the trades, continuing education and certifications.

Souhegan Valley Rotary Club Works with the Hillsborough County Court Drug Court

The Drug Court, which is coordinated by the Hillsborough County Court under the direction of Judge Jaclyn Colburn, has been nationally recognized for its service. Clients of this program go through a grueling process to turn their lives around from addiction and crimes related to this insidious habit. At the end of this process clients go from years of recidivism and jail time to being productive citizens, and in many cases, return to responsible family lives.



Souhegan Valley Rotary Club has participated in the Drug Court graduation program for several years by sponsoring personalized graduation gifts to every graduate. Last year, the club started a ToolShip program to support the graduates. ToolShip is like a school scholarship, except in this case tools of the trade are offered to a graduate of the Drug Court.

This year, a graduate of the program, Stefan Baringer, who was back in the community and had started his own DryWall and Framing business was identified as a recipient of the \$1000 Souhegan Valley Rotary Club ToolShip award. He was presented with a DeWalt table saw, a framing nailer and a pneumatic air hose. Last year, Jesse Harbeck, who was gainfully employed as a car mechanic was presented with tools worth \$1000.

Judge Jaclyn Colburn had this to say about the partnership between Souhegan Valley Rotary Club and the Drug Court: "The community partnership between the Hillsborough County South Adult Drug Court and the Souhegan Valley Rotary Club has been incredibly valuable. The rotary club has been a steadfast supporter of our program. Its contributions, including the "Toolship" (tool scholarship) provided to a graduate to assist them in furthering their trade, is a prime example. The support of community organizations like the Rotary club, aids us in helping our participants to better their lives and by extension to make our community safer."

Bennington, VT July 4th Bell Ringing Celebration

The Bennington Rotary Club presented the 11th year of the Rotary Bell Ringing Celebration on July 4th. It is appropriate to recognize what the Founding Fathers did that July 4th in 1776 when they put their signatures on the Declaration of Independence. Thomas Jefferson knew the importance of the document that he wrote and he encouraged his countrymen to celebrate that day and every July Fourth thereafter.



The Rotary July 4th bell ringing event was inspired by Rotarian and Past President Jerry Albert. His research revealed that in 1963, both houses of Congress passed Concurrent Resolution #25 which reads in part: "Whereas the tolling of the Liberty Bell at Independence Hall, Philadelphia, Pa., at 2 o' clock in the afternoon of the 4th day of July, 1776, proclaimed the signing of the Declaration of Independence; now, therefore, be it Resolved, that the Congress hereby (1) declares that the anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence should be observed each year by the ringing of bells throughout the United States at the hour of 2 o' clock, eastern daylight time, in the afternoon of the 4th day of July, or at such other time on that day as may be determined by local authority, and (2) call upon civic and other community leaders to take appropriate steps to encourage public participation in such observance.

Bells were once the fastest means of communications in any town. U.S Navy ships also have bells. Used for signaling, keeping time, and sounding alarms, bells are an important part of a ship's routine and readiness. Our bell comes from USS Bennington, an aircraft carrier that served our nation from 1944 through 1970.

Members of Bennington Rotary ring the bell 13 times. Once for each of the original states. This year DG Bill Stevens rang the bell for Delaware with ADG Diane McCormick ringing for Georgia. As I am sure many of you know, Vermont is the 14th State in the Union. The State of Vermont was born in Bennington. So it is only fitting that we ring our bell one more time...for Vermont! Each year Bennington Rotary recognizes an outstanding individual or organization with the honor to ring the bell the 14th time. This year we honor the Bennington Fire Department and to ring the bell for Vermont was Lieutenant Jazmine Hollister of the Bennington Fire Department. She joins past recipients including the Bennington Historical Society, Oldcastle Theater, Miss Teen Vermont Pageant, the Bennington Rescue Squad, Mount Anthony Interact Club, the Vermont National Guard, the North Bennington Village School, the MAU Chamber Singers, and Patricia Johnson, RN-SVMC. Concluding the July 4th Bell Ringing Ceremony members of the Green Mountain Boys reenactment company (which includes several Bennington Rotarians) closed the ceremony with a musket salute.
